<p>Establish MORPC as Top Transportation Resource to Lawmakers</p>	<p>MORPC Executive Director William Murdock testified at a Ohio House committee hearing on HB 26, the state transportation budget. He highlighted the need for increased transportation revenue, the importance of safety measures, and the role smart technologies can play in the future of the system -- especially as it relates to Ohio's smart corridors.</p>
<p>Promote Energy Efficiency and an Abundant Supply of Safe, Reliable, and Affordable Sources of Energy for our Growing Region</p>	<p>MORPC successfully secured PUCO approval of a program that will establish and advance a local government energy partnership program that involves energy benchmarking, energy audits, community education, and challenge programs and competitions. The intent is to deliver energy services to local governments that help communities meet sustainable energy goals, achieve energy savings and increase participation by community members.</p> <p>In response to a report of the state's Energy Mandates Study Committee, MORPC took the following positions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> » MORPC opposes the indefinite freeze of the Ohio energy mandates. » MORPC supports a combination of incentives and mandates to help achieve the goals of increased energy efficiency and renewable energy for diversity in our energy mix, along with determining the best approach for maximizing the credit of advanced energy projects. <p>This week, HB 114 was introduced to revise the provisions governing renewable energy, energy efficiency, and peak demand reduction and to alter funding allocations under the Home Energy Assistance Program. MORPC will work with members of the General Assembly to ensure that the state has meaningful energy policy as possible.</p>
<p>Establish MORPC as Top MPO Resource on Transportation Issues. Advocate for policies and legislation that enhance regional priorities.</p>	<p>A delegation of 12 MORPC board and staff members traveled to Washington, D.C. last month to discuss and share the the region's priorities to the Central Ohio congressional delegation, and to attend the conference of the National Association of Regional Councils (NARC). In addition, they met with legislators and staff to ascertain the status of transportation funding with the new Congress and the Trump Administration.</p> <p>The delegation will share MORPC's 2017-2018 Public Policy Agenda. The agenda reflects the needs and interests of cities, townships, counties, villages, and governmental entities that comprise MORPC.</p>

Highlight the Valuable Roles, Duties, and Rights of Local Governments	<p>MORPC has been soliciting information about deployment of wireless infrastructure in public rights of way for 5G coverage under the guidance of the Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC) and Regional Policy Roundtable. In December, an amendment was added to Senate Bill 331 that severely limits negotiation opportunities previously available by way of local municipal code between governments and the utilities with regards to location, permit fees and aesthetics of the installations.</p> <p>MORPC has been holding working group meetings to become educated on changes in how small cellular technology will be deployed in the public rights-of-way. The group has identified concerns, possible solutions, and general strategies at federal, state, and local levels.</p> <p>On the federal level, the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) issued a request for public comment in response to a complaint from a company claiming extensive delays in issuing permits (up to two years), as well as inconsistent permitting fees. MORPC provided template language for its members to respond to the FCC request.</p>



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Agriculture

Senator Cliff Hite (R-Findlay) continued the push for changes to the current agriculture use valuation (CAUV) formula in the wake of spiking farmland prices, reviving his proposal from last session to address concerns with the capitalization rate and lack of incentives for conservation practices. Hite's SB36 is the same as his 131-SB246, which got four hearings in the previous General Assembly and was supported by the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation (OFBF) and Ohio Farmers Union.

Attorney General

Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine is asking Congress to intervene in a dispute between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and state officials over Ohio's manganese ferroalloys industry, which constitutes one of two remaining production plants in the nation. He says the push for tougher regulations threatens not only the country's ferroalloy production but the entire U.S. steel industry it supports.

FY18-19 Budget

Budget Director Tim Keen gave further explanation of the administration's proposals for education funding, assistance to counties for lost Medicaid sales tax revenues and a shift in Local Government Fund (LGF) distribution based on local revenue capacity. At a roundtable with reporters at the Office of Budget and Management (OBM) offices, Keen stressed repeatedly the argument that schools with "appreciable" reductions in student headcount should not keep getting paid the same amount. At the same time, he also shared analyses showing many of the districts' losses to be minimal. Because of that phenomenon, as well as the parameters developed for the proposed reductions, Keen expressed confidence the proposal would fare better than previous administration attempts to cut into funding guarantees.

The Office of Budget and Management (OBM) announced the release of the simulations for its proposed redistribution of a portion of the Local Government Fund (LGF) based on capacity by counties, cities, tax-levying and non-income tax-levying villages and townships. The Ohio Consumers' Counsel (OCC) is back before the General Assembly with a proposal rejected during the FY16-17 budget process: to allow OCC to answer questions that come into their office instead of referring consumers to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) call center, despite the administration's proposed 2 percent budget cut.

The House Finance passed the transportation budget bill, HB26 (McColley), on a bipartisan vote, following adoption of a substitute bill and additional amendments. The changes increase registration fees and retain current law on the point of taxation for motor fuel rather than adopt an administration proposal, among other revisions.

Elections 2018

Although she has not officially announced her 2018 plans, Lt. Governor Mary Taylor filed paperwork to form a campaign committee allowing her to raise money to run for governor. Taylor filed paperwork, including a designation of a treasurer, for the "Mary Taylor for Governor" campaign committee, becoming the first 2018 hopeful to specifically form a gubernatorial committee. She has also launched a website, www.marytaylorforgovernor.com.



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Three Ohio legislators made their 2018 plans known, with Senator Joe Schiavoni (D-Boardman) becoming the first Democrat into the gubernatorial race, Representative Dorothy Pelanda (R-Marysville) entering into the secretary of state's race before any other candidate, and Representative Robert Sprague (R-Findlay) announcing his run for treasurer. Schiavoni, who has been exploring a potential run, jumped in after U.S. Representative Tim Ryan (D-Niles) said he wouldn't seek the office.

Energy

A state tribunal has once again struck down an effort by landowners in Crawford and Richland counties to block construction of the proposed Black Fork Wind farm under its original 2012 permit and to impose larger wind turbine setbacks enacted in 2014 by mid-biennium review (MBR) 130-HB483 (Amstutz). The Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB) said its 2016 decision granting Black Fork two more years to commence construction did not constitute a substantive amendment requiring the permit process to start over under newer, tougher requirements.

Federal

Ohio Democrats are standing against the potential roll-back of an Obama-era labor policy aimed at protecting Americans from unsound investment advice. U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown (D-OH), U.S. Representative Marcy Kaptur (D-OH) and U.S. Representative Tim Ryan (D-OH) joined Micah Hauptman, financial services counsel at Consumer Federation of America, and Barbara Sykes, state director of AARP Ohio, on a conference call to speak out against delaying or cancelling the policy that is currently set to be implemented on April 10.

General Assembly/Statehouse

Representative Keith Faber (R-Celina) gave sponsor testimony on HB51 before the House State and Local Government Committee, explaining that the bill requires all state agencies to submit to a performance review by the Legislature every four years in order to continue operating. Calling the bill a replacement for last session's 131-SB329, Faber opened his testimony by suggesting that the state budget is too cumbersome to be an effective method of reviewing state agencies.

The House session included passage of HB1 (Sykes-Manning), allowing civil protection orders for victims of dating violence; and HB34 (Hambley-Ryan), to allow electronic notices in the place of certified mail in some cases.

Governor

Gov. John Kasich asked the General Assembly to authorize moving the "State of the State" address to Sandusky on Tuesday, April 4, continuing his tradition of taking the annual speech out of Columbus.

Local Government

Treasurer Josh Mandel and Representative Candice Keller (R-Middletown) announced legislation prohibiting local jurisdictions from limiting local officials' ability to work with federal authorities regarding a person's immigration status. The bill, which has not yet been introduced, would also create criminal and civil penalties for elected officials in "sanctuary cities." Local officeholders could face a fourth-degree felony for crimes committed in their city by undocumented immigrants, meaning the possibility of up to 18 months in prison and fines up to \$5,000. A victim of



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a crime committed by an undocumented immigrant could also file a civil action against the jurisdiction for \$1 million in compensatory damages for personal injury or \$500,000 for property damage.

Two Northeast Ohio Democrats pushed back against the proposal to prohibit and criminalize “sanctuary cities.” Calling the legislation fiscally irresponsible and dangerous, Representatives Dan Ramos (D-Lorain) and Stephanie Howse (D-Cleveland) said they plan to introduce a bill protecting sanctuary cities and ensuring immigrants and refugees feel welcome in Ohio.

Military Affairs

U.S. Rep. Steve Stivers (R-Columbus) was promoted to the rank of brigadier general by the Ohio National Guard (ONG). The Ohio National Guard noted that Stivers is the first general officer in the ONG in more than 100 years to concurrently serve as a member of Congress. He has served in the Ohio Army National Guard for over 30 years.

Natural Resources

Chairman Troy Balderson (R-Zanesville) of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee is setting an expedited hearing schedule for the reintroduction of water quality mid-biennium review (MBR) 131-SB333, which he says ran out of time last year in the lame duck session. The strongly bipartisan SB2 (Hite) seeks to protect surface and drinking water in Lake Erie and other waterways.

The Buckeye Lake Dam construction project is likely to be completed in the fall of 2018, according to Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Communications Director Bethany McCorkle. The project was originally scheduled to be completed in 2020, and the timeframe for completion was moved up to 2019 last year.

Public Safety

Completing the work originally laid out for it nearly two years ago, the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board finalized a new standard on “bias-free policing,” bringing to seven the number of statewide standards issued by board members since the governor first established the collaborative in 2015. Those standards address community engagement, agency recruitment and hiring, use of deadly force, use of force, body-worn cameras and telecommunicator training.

Taxation

The Senate opened hearings on Senator Kevin Bacon’s (R-Minerva Park) legislation to extend for another year Ohio’s early August sales tax holiday for school clothes and supplies. He told the Senate Ways and Means Committee in sponsor testimony on SB9 (Bacon) that he’d like to see the tax holiday made permanent, but is addressing the concerns of the Kasich administration in proposing a single-year extension.

Representatives Greta Johnson (D-Akron) and Brigid Kelly (D-Columbus) picked up three Republican co-sponsors in Representatives Niraj Antani (Miamisburg), Michael Henne (Clayton) and Nino Vitale (Urbana) among the 20 co-sponsors as they reintroduced legislation in the Ohio House that would eliminate the sales tax on feminine hygiene products.



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Technology

Representative Mike Duffey (R-Worthington) and Christina Hagan (R-Alliance) reintroduced their “DataOhio” transparency legislation that twice passed the Ohio House and which, they said, “seems to have inspired Governor Kasich to follow suit with government data initiatives in his proposed budget.”

Transportation

Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Director Jerry Wray faced lawmakers once again, explaining some of the proposed motor fuel tax changes in the transportation budget, while deferring to Ohio Department of Taxation [ODT] Director Joe Testa on others.

The transportation budget was approved by the House, sending the approximately \$7.8 billion measure to the Senate for consideration. HB26 (McColley) passed 83-13, with seven Republicans and six Democrats voting against the legislation.

Members of the Senate Transportation, Commerce and Workforce Committee began informal consideration of the transportation budget, hearing from representatives of seven state agencies. Those appearing before the committee offered agency testimony similar to that given while the bill was being considered in the House Finance Committee.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has moved nearly \$35.3 million in federal earmarks to fund existing state transportation projects. The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) announced the option for states to repurpose unused earmarks in March 2016. According to a breakdown provided by ODOT, roughly \$38.7 million was available for repurposing.

Unions

Representative John Becker (R-Cincinnati) reintroduced legislation that would allow public sector workers to opt out of union representation, saying it is only a matter of time before Ohio joins other states with so-called “right-to-work” laws. HB53 will remove mandatory union membership requirements for public employees, but would also allow non-union employees to voluntarily make financial contributions to a union. Becker also said the legislation would free unions from the responsibility of representing non-union employees.

Utilities

Governor John Kasich announced the appointment of Lawrence Friedeman, vice president of regulatory affairs and compliance for IGS Energy and former vice president of regulatory affairs for Vectren Retail LLC, to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) seat originally vacated by former Chairman Andre Porter and recently vacated by former Commissioner M. Howard Petricoff, who stepped aside in the face of pressure from the Ohio Senate. For the seat to be vacated by Commissioner Lynn Slaby in April, the governor appointed Daniel Conway, energy and telecommunications partner at Porter, Wright, Morris & Arthur LLP in Columbus.

Down to two voting members and lacking a quorum, the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) took the rare



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position of allowing a request for rehearing to expire without action by the commission. PUCO further denied applications for rehearing in a number of major rate cases, though it did grant rehearing in a single matter involving Columbia Gas of Ohio.

The expansion of the electricity market into new forms of small-scale, distributed generation and onsite energy storage drew a formal thumbs-up from the state of Ohio, when the Ohio Attorney General's Office filed comments with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) supporting the entry of smart technologies into wholesale markets governed by PJM Interconnection and other regional transmission organizations (RTO) across the U.S.
