Meeting Called to Order

The meeting was called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Vice Chair LaGrieta Holloway.

Approval of April 30, 2018 Minutes

A motion was made by William Curlis to approve the April 30, 2018 minutes, seconded by Pauline Edwards; motion passed.

Holloway welcomed guests, Grant Huling, prospective member, and Christina Tatum, Walsh's new executive assistant.

Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Report

Walsh reported that MORPC took a team of stakeholders from Central Ohio to Los Angeles and Las Vegas to see Hyperloop. They first visited the LA headquarters, then the DevLoop site in Nevada. They discussed the future of the project and where MORPC is in the process, as well as economic development. Hyperloop officials described the technologies. Stakeholders are having conversations in their communities about Hyperloop technology and the proposal.

On Friday, the C-pass program rolled out with partners in the Special Improvement District (SID) and COTA. This is a no-cost program for those within the SID to ride the bus. This is a 2.5-year program for \$4.5 million. We received countrywide press on the rollout. The program assists those who work in the downtown area and cannot afford to park here. Curlis asked how many riders are involved. Walsh replied that there are about 45,000 eligible workers.

Walsh also reported on the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) progress. The Draft Transportation Plan is on MORPC's website. A live webinar will be held on June 12.

DATABus met with MORPC team members and Measurement Resources Company (MRC) to kick off the DATABus Mission & Visioning Project. MRC will lead two stakeholder discussions in June and July to create a new mission and vision for DATABus.

- Air Quality Update

Brooke White updated the committee on air quality. Her PowerPoint presentation is located [here](#).

Bob Roehm said he had trouble logging onto the Commuter Challenge website last year. Walsh said she would look into it.

- COTA Update

Doug Arseneault from COTA announced the C-pass launched last Friday and has already exceeded expectations. He said there were 8,000 downloads as of Friday for the new COTA app. There were some glitches, but mostly there was a lot of positive feedback. Things are working well with mobile ticketing. COTA is the first system in the country to have mobile ticketing that uses scanning.

Arseneault reported that COTA's annual luncheon will be on August 16 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. The keynote speaker has not yet been announced, but the theme is "Mobility Matters."

New President/CEO Joanna Pinkerton has "hit the ground running" and has been at many events throughout the region.

Ridership on weekends is up more than 40 percent. Ridership is still down slightly, about ½ percent, but COTA is optimistic that it will be back up.

COTA continues to meet with communities to learn how to bridge the first-mile/last-mile gap.

2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Maria Schaper updated the committee on the proposed goals for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan. Her presentation is located [here](#). She asked for comments on the proposed goals.

Holloway asked if there had been many issues when applying these goals. Schaper replied that they are working well and allow room to find better ways to measure them. Joel Spokas asked what has been the most difficult goal to achieve within the available resources. Schaper said that Safety continues to be a challenge, as well as per capita energy consumption. Walsh added that we need a better percentage of funding from non-public sources on transportation projects, and we are not on target with jobs reachable within 20 minutes via automobile. Spokas summed that up by saying that there is a greater push by MORPC to engage with economic development officials throughout the region to help achieve this goal. Walsh said that MORPC is working with economic development to push transit-related information. Walsh said that more challenges to the goals include vehicles driving in congested conditions and region-wide uncertainty.

Proposed Resolutions

- T-8-18: "Amending the State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2018-2021 Transportation Improvement Program." Nick Gill explained that this is the quarterly TIP amendment resolution. One project (I-71 South widening) is being split into two phases, delaying the construction of the latter phase to SFY 2021. The bridge replacements over Big Darby Creek will remain in SFY 2019. MORPC is requesting an additional \$100,000 of MORPC-attributable funds for supplemental planning activities in SFY 2019 to be consistent with the amount included in the SFY 19 Planning Work Program.

Bill Allman moved to approve Resolution T-9-18, and Ira Weiss seconded; the motion carried.

MORPC Monthly Metropolitan Transportation Organization Summary

June 2018

Transportation Systems & Funding

Transit, Mobility & Human Services

Gohio

Worked with partners to promote the Central Ohio Commuter Challenge running from July 16th to 27th. Staff continues to research Emergency Ride Home policies, additional projects and transportation providers. Staff attended and staffed a table at the Smart Columbus Experience Center vanpooling, air quality, Commuter Challenge and Gohio Commute.

DATABus

MORPC staff supported and assisted consultant Sheri Chaney Jones of Measurement Resources in her facilitation of the DATABus Mission and Visioning Stakeholder meeting on June 14, 2018. Approximately 40 people were in attendance from various areas of interest, including engineers, economic development, local agencies, elected officials, passengers, and families of passengers.

COTA

COTA, MORPC, and the Capital Crossroads SID successfully launched the C-pass program for eligible downtown workers unlimited access to the entire COTA transit system. Staff continues to meet weekly with COTA and the SID. Along with COTA and the SID, MORPC staff reviewed draft employee and employer surveys as part of the C-pass evaluation

MORPC attended First Mile/Last Mile meetings with COTA at Grove City, Westerville and West Jefferson. Attended a meeting on workforce development for the 43232 zip code at Goodwill on Brice Rd.

5310 Designated Recipient

Staff continued working with FTA to execute MORPC's slate of Section 5310 projects to purchase vehicles to be used by older adults and people with disabilities.

Rapid Speed Transportation Initiative (RSTI)

Selected consultants have been announced for the RSTI Studies. AECOM was selected for the Hyperloop Feasibility Study, and WSP was selected for the Tier 1 EIS Components Study. Contract negotiations are underway with both consultants.

Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO)

Earlier this month, CORPO released a draft of their 2018 -2040 Long Range Transportation Plan. CORPO held a Virtual Open House on June 12 detailing the activities CORPO completed over the last two years, as well as an overview of the 2018-2040 CORPO Transportation Plan. The public comment period ended on June 15, and comments were incorporated into the plan. The CORPO Committee adopted the plan on June 18. The plan will be submitted to ODOT at the end of June, a requirement for the state to designate CORPO as a Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) for the counties of Fairfield, Knox, Madison, Marion, Morrow, Pickaway, and Union.

Infrastructure Funding

MORPC Attributable Funding

Screening Applications for new commitments of funding and Update Forms for outstanding commitments were due June 11. An estimated \$30 million to \$40 million is available for SFYs 2019-2025. MORPC received 40 Screening Applications requesting \$200 million. There are 38 outstanding commitments, requesting a total of \$167 million, representing an increase of \$24 million above the current commitments. The Attributable Funding Committee meets on June 27 to consider the requests to modify outstanding commitments and be briefed on the Screening Applications. A revised estimate of funds available for new commitments, based on the AFC's preliminary recommendation for modifying outstanding commitments, will be posted on July 2. MORPC will respond to the applicants by July 13 with feedback and guidance for Final Applications, which are due August 13. A summary of the Screening Applications and Updates are posted at www.morpc.org/funding.

Working together, local agencies and ODOT were able to deliver approximately \$46 million of attributable funds for the transportation system. MORPC teamed up with ODOT and other MPOs in Ohio to borrow over \$10 million available statewide to award projects ahead of schedule. MORPC agreed to return over \$8 million of the borrowed funds in SFY 2019. With demand projected to be over \$50 million, the program's estimated deficit for FY19 is approximately \$8 million. The funding team will be looking to partner with ODOT and the MPOs again next year to avoid delays caused by insufficient funds.

The team presented an overview of the program at MORPC's Finding the Money program on June 20.

BUILD and INFRA

At least three applications from the region are anticipated to be submitted for the current round of BUILD (Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development), the successor to US DOT's TIGER discretionary grant program. Confirmed applications includes Columbus Crossroads/Innerbelt (submitted by the City of Columbus), the I-70 and SR 29 interchange in Madison County (submitted by ODOT), and the I-71 and US 36/SR 37/Sunbury Parkway interchange in Delaware County (submitted by Village of Sunbury). Other applications are also being discussed. Applications are due July 19.

Award announcements for pending INFRA applications were released by U.S. DOT in early June. Unfortunately, neither application submitted in the region (Rickenbacker Inland Port Access Improvements and the I-71 & US 36/SR 37 interchange) received funding. Another round of INFRA is anticipated later this year.

Data and Mapping

Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC)

To better facilitate members' schedules, the June 8 Regional Data Advisory Committee meeting, has been rescheduled to July 9. At that time, the Committee will concentrate on the Regional Data Agenda.

Transportation

Several map updates and revisions were prepared for the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization's existing and future conditions report, including detailed bridge data and Points of Interest information. Proposals to redesign the Paving the Way construction notification system were received on May 18 and are being reviewed. Consultant selection is expected in late June.

Data & Mapping staff completed updates and enhancements to the Attributable Funding Application Database, which provides an online tool for local governments and their consultants to update existing and submit new applications for MORPC attributable transportation funding.

Data and Mapping staff are in the process of calculating population and employment projections for the upcoming (2020-2050) Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). The draft future land use for the MTP has been completed in the form of a web map, and local government staff will review and provide comments by June 29.

Data & Mapping staff are currently designing the final deliverable for the Rickenbacker Area Comprehensive Study, which will be in the form of a digital story map. The story map will present the results in a concise, interactive, and information-rich format.

Data & Mapping staff created the Central Ohio Blueways interactive web map, which is now live on MORPC.org. The map is an online tool to help the public find safe and legal access points along the region's rivers and streams.

Data & Mapping staff are working with the Franklin County Engineer's Office to ensure that the updated Location Based Response System road centerlines are acceptable for use in tracking road mileage by jurisdiction.

Data & Mapping Support to MORPC Members, Programs and Projects

The June meeting of the Smart Region Task Force was held on June 19. The topic of focus was broadband, with presentations from Angela Siefer of the National Digital Inclusion Alliance and Lindsay Miller from Ice Miller. The Task Force also worked to finalize a common definition of "Smart Region" and to identify goals for MORPC's Smart Streets Policy.

As part of MORPC's agency-wide focus on diversity and inclusion, the Data & Mapping team continues to provide new and updated data to better understand and track the success of ongoing organizational efforts and additional needs.

The Data & Mapping team continues their work with the Insight 2050 Corridor Concepts Data Committee and consultants with regard to data collection, modeling, analysis, and next steps.

Data & Mapping staff are providing support for the Insight2050 Technical Assistance program, attending regular meetings, and performing data analysis.

Mapping of MORPC membership was updated to reflect the City of Lancaster's status as a member of MORPC.

MORPC Data & Mapping staff are providing data and analysis on the projected population and location of school-age children for the Columbus City School District as it considers future facility needs.

Data and Mapping Outreach and Collaboration

MORPC's work supporting the Smart Columbus Operating System (SCOS) has transitioned from leading use case development to analyzing key performance indicators (KPIs) for the eight smart mobility projects. Following a June 6 meeting of the SCOS Technical Working Group (TWG) to kick-off the second segment of the project, MORPC will lead a group of TWG volunteers working on the KPIs.

Data & Mapping staff were members of the Ohio Geographically Referenced Information Program (OGRIP) committee to review presentation submittals for the September 2018 Ohio GIS Conference.

Planning & Environment

Active Transportation Planning

Non-Motorized System Monitoring

Team members met with ODOT and Toole Design Group staff to discuss non-motorized data collection needs and opportunities at the regional planning level. Regional count programs, data collection sustainability, data analysis, applications, and performance measures were discussed.

Team members met with regional partners to discuss 2018 trail monitoring for the Central Ohio Greenways (COG) system. As part of this effort, MORPC will work to collect pedestrian and bicycle data along approximately 25 segments of COG trails between June and August.

Team members loaned pedestrian count equipment to the Short North Alliance for monthly Gallery Hop count data collection as well as to Orange Township for the collection of non-motorized volume data at key locations throughout the township.

Team members hosted a webinar discussing “Roundabouts that Work for Cyclists & Pedestrians” as a part of the monthly APBP webinar series.

Conduct Special Studies and Projects

MORPC hosted the National Association of City Transportation Officials’ (NACTO) Sister Cities Bikeway Roadshow event from 5-31 to 6-1-2018. The event brought together about 30 planners and engineers from Columbus’ peer cities throughout the Midwest to share current projects and lessons learned surrounding bikeway implementation. The event also included a Design Charrette, where attendees applied concepts learned to recommending design changes along a portion of East Broad Street in Columbus.

Meeting Participation

Team members attended the June Health Works Franklin County meeting to discuss the release and implementation of the Franklin County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

Team members attended the Central Ohio Regional Ohio Trail Plan Meeting, organized by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Ohio Trails Partnership. Meeting attendees, including trail managers, planners, advocates, and users, provided input on the state’s next plan for trails across the state.

insight2050

Outreach

insight2050 was the topic of a panel discussion at the International Town-Gown Association Conference held at the Ohio Union. Staff also presented insight2050 to the Violet Township Zoning Commission. An overview of insight2050 and Corridor Concepts was presented to about 70 people at the Westgate Neighbors Association.

insight2050 Corridor Concepts Study

MORPC and consultants have nearly completed data gathering for the study. All five Corridor Working Group meetings have been held, as well as a special meeting with the development

community. Consultants have begun analysis, and initial findings are being presented at the next Project Working Group meeting at the end of June.

Technical Assistance (TA) Program

Team met with each community to advance tasks/deliverables. Delaware has been engaging its residents and businesses on Complete Streets concepts and participated in a Yay Bikes staff training ride to understand the issues facing cyclists. Violet Township and MORPC staff have worked closely to design a future street network for the Refugee/Pickerington Road site. To assist the township in discussing the site with its stakeholders, MORPC developed guidance for various land use/transportation typologies. In Westerville, stakeholders are meeting with city staff to give input into the future of Brookside. MORPC is assisting the city in this effort. Worthington recently contracted with a consultant team to execute a bike/ped strategic plan, into which MORPC's coordinated efforts on a Complete Streets policy will be integrated.

Transportation Safety

Assistance to Members

Team members met with City of Dublin and Columbus Age-Friendly staff to discuss mobility and accessibility considerations for older adults and people with disabilities in Dublin as part of the city's recent planning efforts.

Participation in Local and State Safety Committees

Team members attended the Franklin County Traffic Fatality Review Board meeting, facilitated through the Franklin County Safe Communities Program. Eleven fatal crashes occurring on the county's transportation network between November 2017 and February 2018 were reviewed by transportation planning, engineering, enforcement, and health representatives. Fatalities related to statewide transportation safety focus areas include three pedestrian crashes, five impaired driving-related crashes, one distracted driving-related crash, and four crashes involving not wearing seatbelts.

Team members attended the quarterly Franklin County Safe Communities General Body Coalition meeting. Safe Communities presented on upcoming events and initiatives, including the 2018 Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Kickoff and Columbus Public Health's recent acquisition of a distracted driving simulator.

Sustainable2050

The MORPC team has shared the summary findings of the Sustainable2050 Program Pilot to the Sustainability Advisory Committee. The recommendations include adjustments to membership requirements and the "Identifying Your Tier Status Checklist," as well as an estimate of expected MORPC and community team staff hours needed to manage and participate in the program, as well as an estimate of additional funding needs for program management and development of tools & resources.

The Sustainable2050 Communities met on June 13 at the Columbus Zoo & Aquarium, where a representative from the zoo presented on its sustainability efforts, both past and present, and on the Zoo's Encouraging Environmental Excellence (E3) Program Platinum award. The MORPC team then presented on the findings and recommendations of the Program Pilot, and answered questions regarding the proposed changes to the program. Partner updates include Marysville's feasibility study on installing solar at the city's water treatment plant; Hilliard's new mobile 311 program and centralized call center; Grove City's 4th Annual Ecofest to occur in August; and COTA's installation of CNG fueling stations at the Fields Avenue Garage.

Greenways & Water Resources Program

Water Resources Working Group

The Water Resources Working Group (WRWG) met for the regularly scheduled meeting, where the group received the regular policy updates, Central Ohio Watershed Council updates, subcommittee updates, and MORPC programmatic updates. The group heard a special presentation by Franklin County Sanitary Engineering on the purpose and overview of the department; common customer concerns; and completed and upcoming engineering projects. The group also heard a presentation on, and provided feedback on, the MORPC Green Stormwater Infrastructure Toolkit. The Nature Conservancy also provided an update on the Ohio Scioto River Basin Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP), a program of the U.S. and Ohio Departments of Agriculture in the Scioto Basin, which is expiring in 2019.

Riverfest

Last year, MORPC put about 500 people on the water. This year, MORPC and its partners nearly doubled the number to almost 1,000 people. The event would not be possible without its many partners: the Greater Columbus Arts Festival, Columbus Recreation, HERO, the American Kayaking Association, Franklin County Engineer's Office, Metro Parks, Columbus Department of Utilities, Franklin Soil and Water, and Ohio Department of Natural Resources

COG Board Update

The Central Ohio Greenways Board met at the end of May to adopt a *Regional Trail Vision Map* for Central Ohio. The map was also adopted by the Sustainability Advisory Committee during the June meeting. The COG Board also adopted *Trail Design Guidelines*, which are available on the Central Ohio Greenways website. Several of the board members attended the first National Trail Summit in Milwaukee to learn more about trail branding, development, and marketing. The team brought back ideas for furthering the COG vision and developing the story of COG.

Sustaining Scioto

The Sustaining Scioto Working Group has been tasked with developing an implementation plan for the short-term strategies of the Adaptive Management Plan and has drafted a document to better categorize and target these efforts. In addition, the group has conducted a survey of programs and efforts underway in the region to identify opportunities for new programs and efforts.

Energy & Air Quality

Air Quality

Three Air Quality Alerts have been issued for ozone in June so far: June 16th, 17th and 18th. Coverage of the alerts has been wide spread, including during evening weather segments by all local TV networks and as news stories, as well as by MORPC and multiple partners across social media.

Air Quality Staff is working with the National Weather Service (NWS) regional forecasting office in Wilmington, Ohio to develop a collaborative partnership and process for issuing Air Quality Alerts through the National Weather Service warning system. As part of our collaboration with NWS, MORPC has the opportunity to recognize its partnership with NWS by becoming a Weather Ready Nation Ambassador.

Air Quality Staff is working with the vendor for media services for the summertime 2018 Air Quality Awareness campaign. The campaign includes creation of video and photo along with pre-roll video and social media advertising. Staff will also work with Sinclair on a Good Day Marketplace morning show interview scheduled in late June. Air Quality staff had successful meetings with weather anchors at all major local TV networks during the month of June to share resources for air quality information and messaging and to strengthen these partnerships.

Energy & Air Quality Working Group

The Energy and Air Quality (E&AQ) Working Group Review Committee met on June 12. The Committee worked toward creating overarching goals for the Working Group as well as contributing input towards the creation of a mission statement.

Alternative Fuels/Electric Vehicles

MORPC Team Members continue to work with Clean Fuels Ohio to promote Smart Columbus efforts related to public sector EV deployment. An EV demonstration was held in June, highlighting a first-to-market technology, a half-megawatt mobile power station. This technology can be added to fleets in order to replace other off-road equipment, as well as function as a power source in emergencies. MORPC staff participated in the Mid-West Alternative Fuel Corridor Convening where they discussed current issues and expected solutions for developing a multi-state alternative fuel corridor.

Local Government Energy Partnership

Eight MORPC members are currently enrolled in the MORPC Benchmarking Program. MORPC is hosting a training session for this group at the end of June. The focus is currently on energy benchmarking for local government buildings, and over time, MORPC will be incorporating other sustainability metrics into the tracking, including fleet fuel consumption.

Franklin County Energy Study

Team Members met with Commissioner O'Grady in June and reviewed the recommendations resulting from the Franklin County Energy Study. Team Members also met with stakeholders for additional input. The recommendations are in final review and will be released at the end of June.

Rickenbacker Study – Energy Chapter

Energy recommendations are in final review and will likely be submitted by the end of June.

Public & Government Affairs

Press Releases and Social Media

Press releases were distributed on air quality alerts, Riverfest and the launch of the online Central Ohio Blueways map, and the consultants named for Midwest Hyperloop Feasibility Study and Environmental Impact Study for passenger rail.

Social media included posts on the air quality alerts, Air Quality Awareness Week, Commuter Challenge, Downtown C-Pass, DATABus Memorial Day free fares for veterans, and DATABus summer fixed-route youth passes.

Insight2050 Corridors Concept
