#### 1. Introductions

Chair Cindi Fitzpatrick called the meeting to order at 10:16 a.m.

### 2. Approval of November 6, 2019 Meeting Minutes

**MORPC** 

Chair Fitzpatrick entertained a motion for the approval of the November 6, 2019 meeting minutes; Bill Ferrigno moved; Ira Weiss seconded; and the motion carried.

### 3. <u>Updated Requests for Previous Commitments</u>

Nick Gill started his presentation by providing a brief overview of MORPC Attributable Funding, stating that MORPC receives approximately \$37 million annually across three programs (STBG, CMAQ, and TAP). He explained that the Attributable Funding process occurs every two years to solicit applications for these funds, as well as update previous funding commitments.

Nick Gill informed the committee that MORPC received commitment updates for 25 projects, 5 of which were component phases of the IR70/71 project. These 25 projects represented previous commitments totaling \$97 million, while the updates included requests for a total of \$105 million representing approximately an 8% increase in funding requested. Nick Gill provided the committee with a virtual handout detailing the updated requests for each of the 25 projects. He identified that the Trabue Rd over the Scioto River project was the only project representing a significant change in requested funding. Nick Gill explained that the significant increase in requested funding for the Trabue Rd project was related to change in the project's approach to including appropriate complete streets facilities on the bridge, and therefore MORPC staff recommended approval of this requested change.

#### 4. Updated Funding Available For New Projects

Nick Gill provided an update on the estimated funding available for new funding requests. This projected that \$69 million in funding would be available for new funding requests. The committee was provided a handout which detailed the amount of funding available for each activity category.

#### 5. Summary of Screening Applications Received

Nick Gill provided an overview of the screening applications received, stating that MORPC received 35 screening applications from 11 different agencies. The screening applications identified \$236 million in funding requested. Nick Gill informed the board of the number of applications and amount of funding requested in each activity category. The committee was provided a handout which detailed the funding amount requested, total project cost, requested funding year, and project scope for each of the screening applications received. Nick Gill provided a brief overview of each of the screening applications and informed the committee that MORPC staff would be further analyzing the activity category of each application in advance of submittal of final applications.

### 6. Timeline and Next Steps - Nick Gill, MORPC

Nick Gill informed the committee that feedback on the screening applications would be provided to applicants in late August, with final applications for new funding requests due on October 9<sup>th</sup> at 5pm. Furthermore, feedback on errors or omissions in the final applications would be provided by October 16<sup>th</sup> and the AFC would meet again on November 4<sup>th</sup> to approve modifications to outstanding funding commitments and provide a summary of the final applications received.

### 7. Other Business

Bill Ferrigno asked MORPC to provide an update regarding the evaluation timeline for the Attributable Funding final applications. Nick Gill stated that the evaluation process would begin in Mid-October with draft recommendations for funding in February of 2021.

Chair Fitzpatrick entertained a motion to adjourn; Ira Weiss moved; James Young seconded; and the motion carried at approximately 10:47 a.m.
