Clean Ohio Fund

- Approved by Ohio voters in 2000 & 2008
- Called for \$400 million bond program to be spent to:
 - Conservation Program: preserve natural areas & protect streams
 - Agricultural Easement Purchase Program: preserve farmland
 - Trails Fund: develop recreational trails
 - Revitalization Fund: Clean up brownfields for redevelopment
- In 2018, \$100 million was allocated for the Clean Ohio Program through the capital budget.






Clean Ohio Conservation Program



- Purpose
 - Acquire "open space" parks, forests, wetlands, natural areas
 - Protect and enhance riparian corridors or watersheds
- Eligible Applicants
 - Local Governments
 - Non-Profit Organizations
 - Soil & Water Districts
 - Other Political Subdivisions (Conservation/Parks/Recreational Districts)
- Minimum Match 25%
- Administered by the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)
- OPWC has 19 Districts

OPWC Districts





District 3 – Franklin County



A project located in part of a subdivision that is located outside of Franklin County is deemed a part of the district in which the population is greatest.

Natural Resources Assistance Council (NRAC)

- Committee in each District that selects applications to fund
- Develop local criteria
- Review & score applications
- Recommend project approval
- Forward applications to OPWC for implementation & award of funds

- 1 member of the Public Works Integrating Committee (PWIC)
- 1 member appointed by Franklin Soil & Water District
- 9 members selected from <u>five</u> groups (must have 1 from each):

- Establishes & maintains riparian buffers with native vegetation
- Restores permanent natural stream channels using natural channel design principles
- Restores & maintains natural function of the floodplain such as through the removal of streamside levees
- Removes artificial in stream structures such as low-head dams and old bridge piers
- Employs & maintains "best management practices" to improve water quality

Restoration projects will be required to provide a concept plan and demonstration of resource improvement at the time of the application.

Section 1: Project Emphasis



- Check all criteria that apply

- No points awarded without written description or documentation
- Each of the 13 questions can receive a raw score of 0 to 5 points
- Each question's score is multiplied by a weight:
 - High Interest weight of 10
 - Medium Interest weight of 6
 - Low Interest weight of 2
- Total weighted points possible = 390
- Maximum score Section 1 (total/5) = 78 points (32% of total)

High Interest (Weight of 10)



- Protect rare species or preserve viable habitat for plants & animals (question 3)
- Preserve wetlands or scarce natural resources (question 4)
- Enhance educational opportunities & provide physical links to schools (question 5)
- Part of a stream/watershed plan (question 9)

Medium Interest (Weight of 6)



- Preserve or restore water quality & natural features (question 6)
- Reduce or eliminate non-native, invasive species of plants or animals (question 7)
 Higher Interest for Round 15
- Fee simple acquisition of land or acquire conservation easements (question 11)
- Restore or preserve headwater streams (question 12)

Low Interest (Weight of 2)



- Support comprehensive open space planning (question 1)
- Enhance economic development related to recreation & eco-tourism in lower income areas (question 2)


Land Acquisition

- New standards for Round 15
- Appraisal Report or a Restricted Appraisal Report required with Final Application
- By an appraiser who is a certified general real estate appraiser holding a current certificate as issued by the Ohio Department of Commerce and is also an Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Prequalified Appraiser credential in Appraisal
- Construction or Restoration
 - Formal estimate provided by an architect, landscape architect, or other professional.
 - Price quotes



PART 5: Required Certifications

- Certified copy of authorization for an official to sign the application
- CFO certification of local matching finds
- Cooperative agreement (if applicable)
- Resolution of support (if required)
- OPWC Proposed Declaration of Restrictions







Program Policies



- 1. In-Kind Contributions
 - Required in-kind contributions are not eligible and will not considered as part of local match.
- 2. Donation of Easements
 - The donation of an easement other than those required above is considered a private contribution.
 - The value of the easement determined by the appraisal which accompanies the application.
- 3. <u>Score Tie Breakers</u>
 - 1st tie breaker project with highest % of match dollars.
 - 2nd tie breaker project receiving the most points under 'community benefits.
- 4. Time Extensions
 - No time extensions for applications will be granted.
 - Extensions for active projects will be considered by the NRAC and approved by OPWC.
- 5. Last Project Offered Partial Funding
 - Applicants have 30 days from the time of the award to decide to whether accept the partial funding.

Program Policies (cont'd)



- 6. Minimum Points
 - Projects that obtain 50% or less of the total possible maximum points will only be funded in full or part upon a majority vote of NRAC members and if funds are available.
- 7. Appraisal
 - Application shall be accompanied by an Appraisal Report or a Restricted Appraisal Report by a certified appraiser.
- 8. Clean Ohio Signage
 - All funded District 3 projects are encouraged but not required to erect signage following District 3 signage guidelines. The cost of a sign is reimbursable.
- 9. Purchase Price
 - Justification must be provided to the NRAC for any acquisition contemplated above the appraised value but cannot exceed 5%. Any difference greater than 5% must be paid for with other funding outside the project.
- 10. Life Estate
 - The Ohio Revised Code allows the Clean Ohio Greenspace Conservation Program to acquire properties with life estates. In a life estate, two or more people each have an ownership interest in a property, but for different periods of time.

- Clean Ohio advisories are separate from infrastructure advisories

Subdivision Applicant Codes

- Local political subdivision
- Nonprofit organization (as defined in ORC Sec.164.20 (B)
 - Request a subdivision code from OPWC
 - Request in writing on nonprofit organization's letterhead
 - Signed by CEO
 - Include documentation on purpose and IRS tax exempt status





Advisories



Long Term Ownership & Control Requirements:

- Land or rights in land acquired shall remain in the ownership and control of the grant recipient in perpetuity.
- Future transfer of ownership must be approved in writing by Director of OPWC.
- Must record deed restrictions or conservation easements as stated in application.

Policy clarifications:

- COCF \$ can be used to make an open space area accessible to the public.
- The cost of property or conservation easements acquired with COCF \$ may exceed its appraised value, by no more than 5%. Purchaser must be able to justify the higher cost to their NRAC & OPWC
- Value of future costs for monitoring conservation easements, deed restrictions or maintenance is not an eligible cost to meet the minimum 25% local match requirement.

Advisories



Policy clarifications:

- No improvements on easements
- Project Schedule acquisition within 1 year of receiving agreement, improvements completed 2 years after that

District 3 Administrative Fees



- OPWC provides funding for program administration but does not cover indirect costs.
- MORPC requests an administrative fee of up to 1% of the award amount to cover indirect costs.
- Outlined on Application Submission Checklist signed by CEO and the Local Match form signed by the chief financial officer
