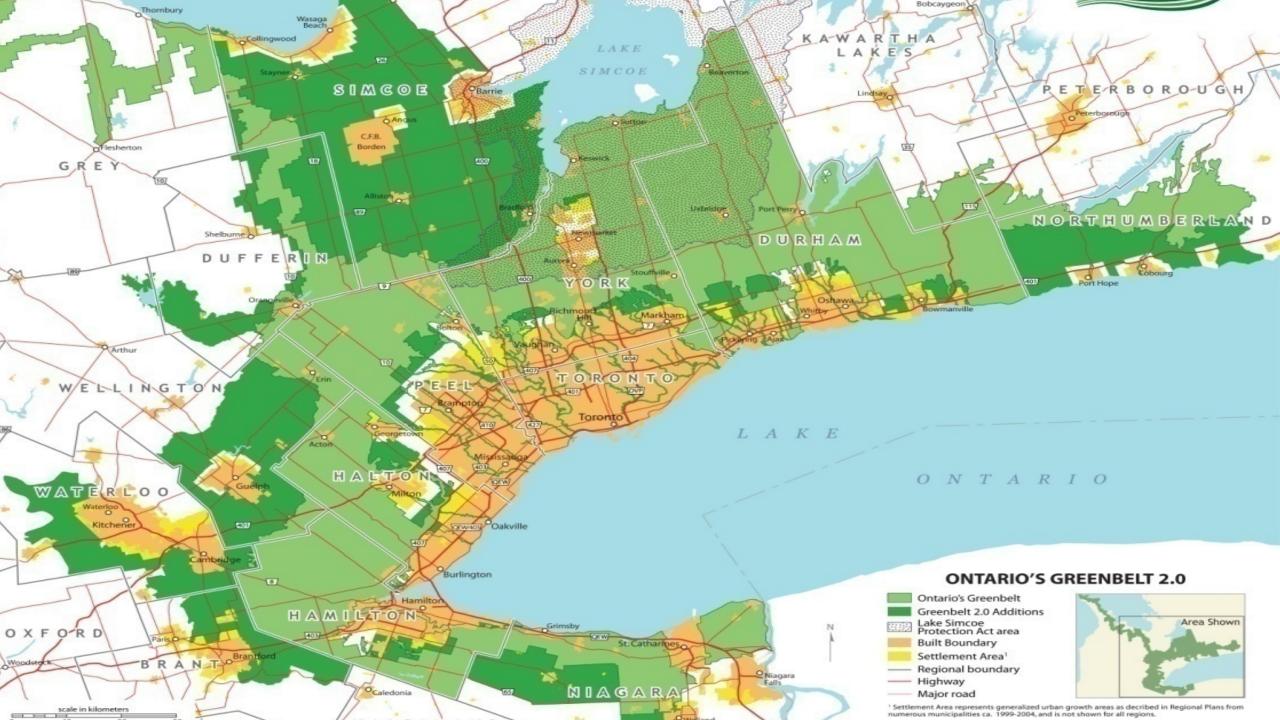

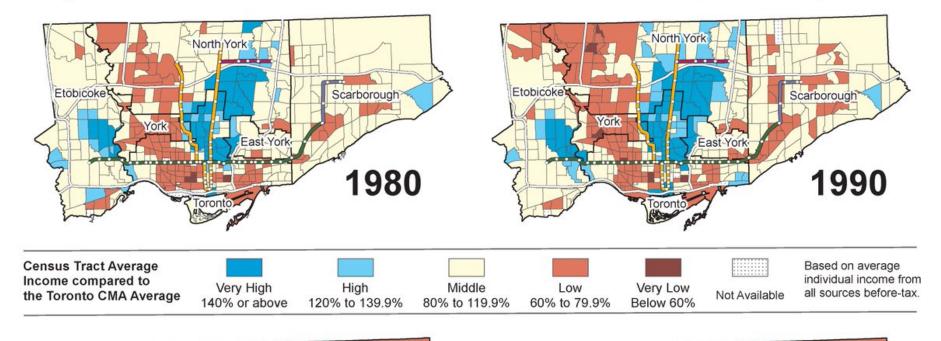


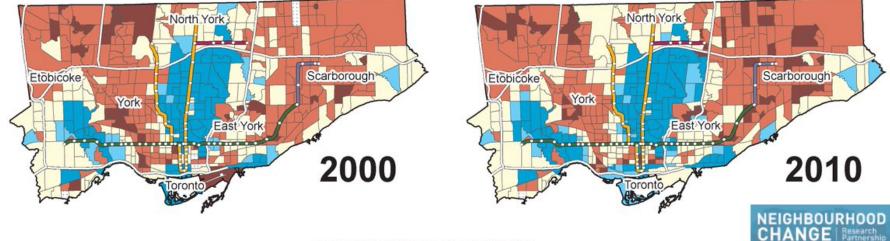

Average Individual Income, 1980–2010 **City of Toronto**

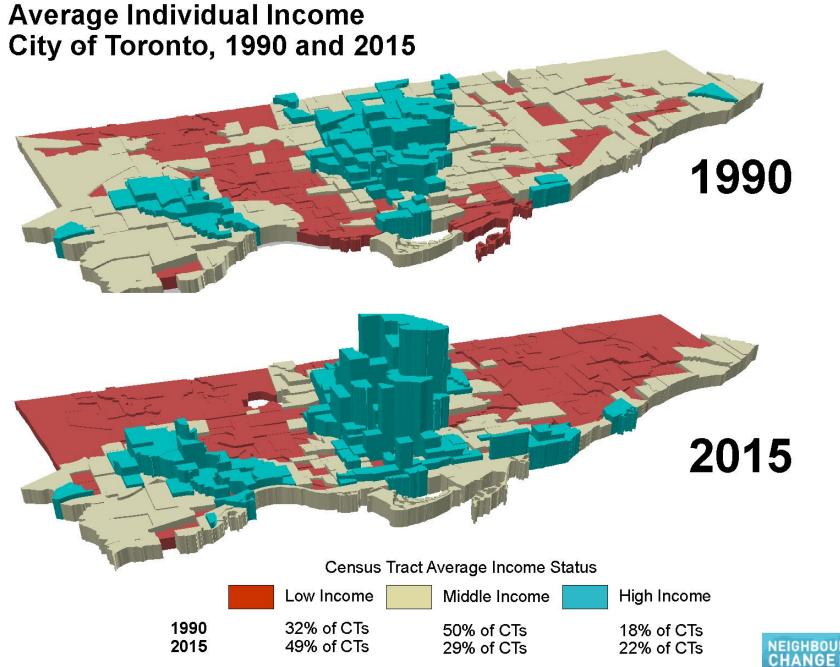
