Eligible Project Scopes :

Land acquisition for a trail

Trail development – *making connections!*

Trailhead facilities – *only if small portion of project*

Engineering - design - *as a part of a trail project -*

& if within 2 yrs. of agreement with prior approval.



Clean Ohio Fund Recreational Trails

- **Maximum project award: \$500,000.**
- **Time to complete Project: 15 months**
- **Projects must be open to the public for a min. of 15 years.**

Required Match:

- **Minimum 25%**
- **Donated labor, materials (new) & land are allowed.**

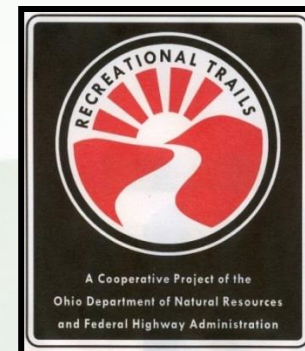
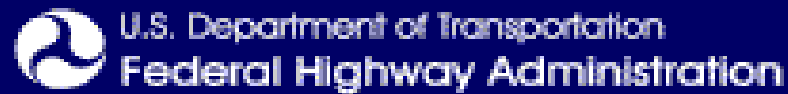




Recreational Trails Program

**Authorized by US Congress in the
Intermodal Surface Transportation
Efficiency Act of 1991.**

**Reauthorized: Fixing America's
Surface Transportation (FAST) Act**





Recreational Trails Program

- **Eligible Projects:**

- Trail development
- Land acquisition for a trail
- Trail maintenance / restoration / equipment
- Trailhead facilities
- Education - safety & environmental protection (5% limit)
- Engineering/Design (as a part of a trail project)



- **Eligible Sponsors:**

- Political Subdivisions
- State & Federal Agencies
- Non-Profit 501 C3s





Recreational Trails Program

- **Required Match:** 20%
- **Project Size:** Awards are capped at \$150,000.
- **Time to complete project:** 15 months
- Projects must be open to the public for a min. of 15 years.

Motorized Requirement:



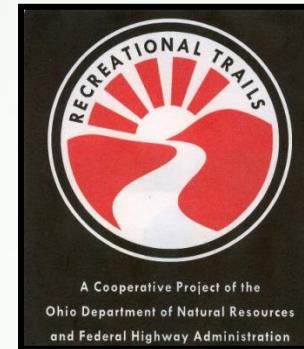
Thirty percent of Ohio's yearly allocation must fund motorized public recreational trails.



Trail Grant Applications

Clean Ohio Trail Fund & Recreational Trail Program applications must be postmarked by February 1st each year.

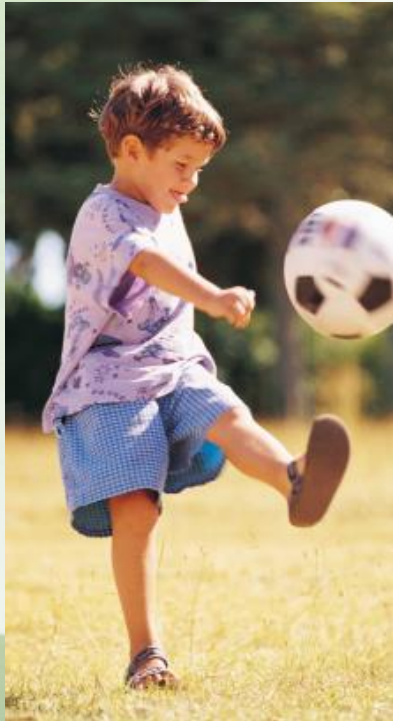
Recommended projects are announced in October/November





Nature Works

Created through the Ohio Parks & Natural Resources Bond Issue, approved by Ohio voters in 1993. Funded with tax exempt state bonds.

Nature Works

- **Eligible Projects:**
 - Public Park & Recreation Areas
 - Acquisition of parkland
 - Park development of all kinds: Trails, playgrounds, shelters, sprayparks, skateparks, ballfields & courts, restrooms, boating access...etc.
 - Rehabilitation
 - Engineering design as a part of project
- **Eligible Sponsors:**
 - Local Subdivisions of Government.
 - Must own property (or long term non revocable lease).
 - School districts & non profits are NOT eligible





Nature Works

▣ Required Match:

- Minimum 25%, 20% of which must be local.
- Donated land and labor are allowed – if within grant period
- May be used to match federal LWCF funds in same project.
- Future Use Requirement :
 - Grant project property must remain in public recreational use for 15 years after project closeout.

▣ Time to Complete Project: 1 ½ to 2 yrs.



NatureWorks Allocated by County

- **2/3rd Equal Distribution**
- **1/3rd Per Capita**
- **Applicants compete with applicants from same county only.**
- **Unrequested county funds carry over to following year/round. (If NO funds are requested for two funding cycles, in the third funding cycle the unrequested funds are reallocated to highest scoring unfunded projects in the state.)**

Land & Water Conservation Fund

**Established in Land & Water Conservation Fund Act.
Passed by Congress 1964...2015 sunset.
Extended for 3 years via 2016 federal
omnibus bill. Permanently reauthorized
by Congress in 2019.**



**Funding to states via NPS.
Source of funds includes Outer Continental
Shelf and Gulf energy lease royalties.**

**Ohio received \$147 million + in 50 yr. period.
Half of funding has been used for local park projects,
half for ODNR development & acquisition in State
Parks, Forests & Natural Areas.**





Eligible LWCF Projects:

Public Park & Recreation Areas:

Acquisition

Development (Sponsor must own property)

Rehabilitation (Sponsor must own property)

Engineering design as a part of the project.

Eligible Sponsors:

All Local Subdivisions of Government



Required Match: 50%

Max Award: \$500,000. Minimum: \$50,000

Local grant program will be offered every year. Applications for 2022 are due Nov. 15, 2021. Check ODNR website for application.

Perpetuity Requirement: Project property must remain in public recreational use *forever* (Section 6(f)).



Section 6(f) Language



'The perpetuity requirement'

Property acquired or developed with LWCF assistance shall be retained and used for public outdoor recreation *in perpetuity*.

Property so acquired and/or developed shall not be wholly or partly converted to other than public outdoor recreation uses without the approval of NPS pursuant to Section 6(f)(3) of the LWCF Act.





Conversion provisions of Section 6(f)(3), 36 CFR Part 59 apply to each area or facility for which LWCF assistance is obtained, regardless of the extent of participation of the program in the assisted area or facility.

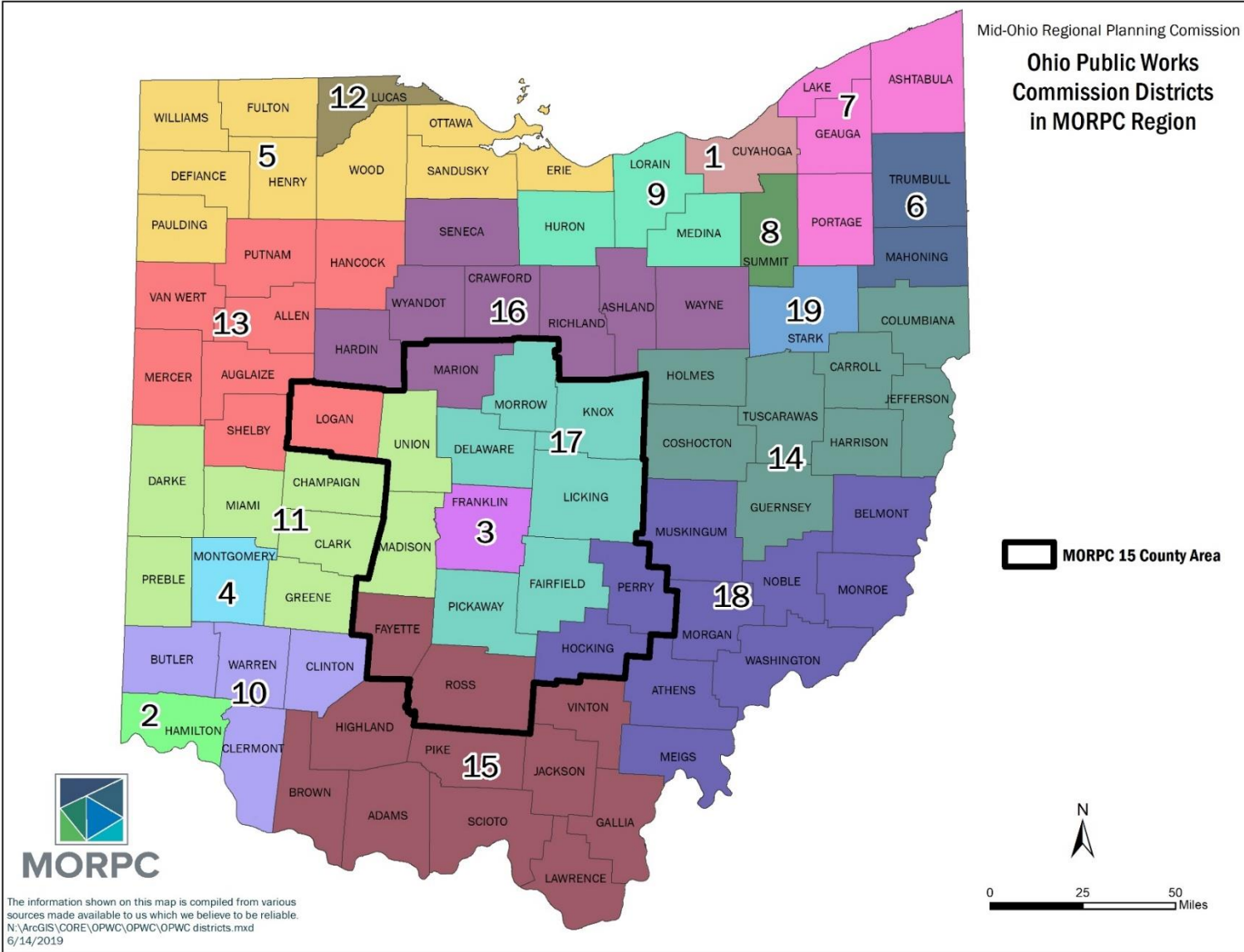

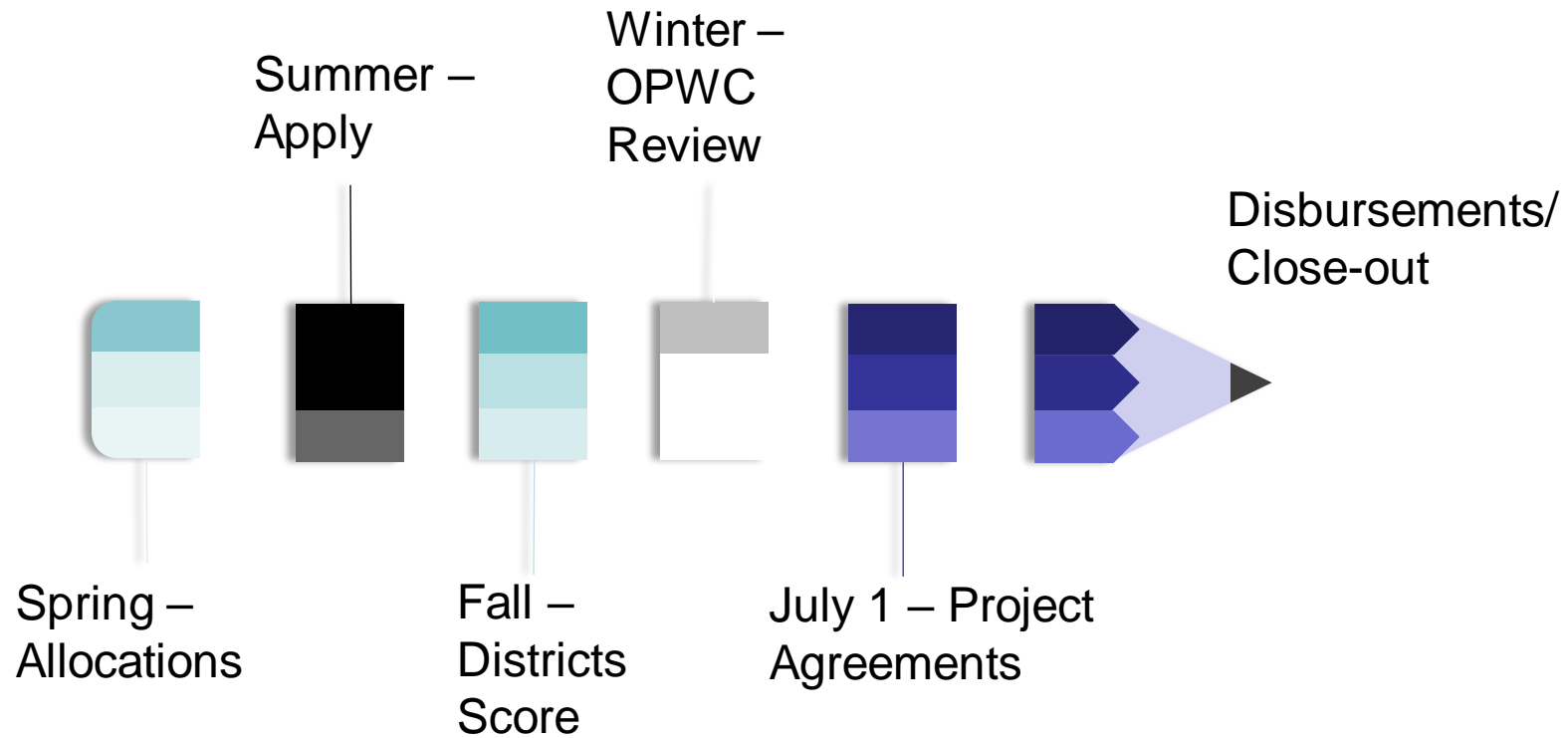

Application Procedures

- OPWC application and District supplemental forms are on the OPWC website
- Application materials include samples of required attachments
- Due dates vary by District
- Applicants will be required to submit application in new WorksWise web portal starting this round

Project Administration

- E-sign Project Agreement
- Signed disbursement form with supporting documentation for disbursements
 - Detailed invoices
 - In-kind documentation
 - Proof of payment for reimbursement

State Capital Improvement Program (SCIP)

- Created in 1987 and renewed in 1995, 2005 & 2014 by amendments to Ohio Constitution allowing state to use general revenues as debt support and issue general obligation bonds
- \$200 million/year; FYs 2022-2026

- Provides a portion of motor vehicle fuel tax per year for roads & bridges
- Annual amount fluctuates with gas tax receipts
- Grant

- Immediate threat to health & safety
- First come, first served
- Pre-application



SCIP / LTIP Project Selection

- Funds allocated to 19 District Public Works Integrating Committees on a per capita basis – we were not able to incorporate 2020 census data for FY 23 (Round 36) funding
- Committees made up of local government & private sector representatives (ORC 164.04)
- Local decision-making: projects scored/ranked based on factors in state law (ORC 164.06 & 164.14), but methodologies vary by district

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

- \$37.5 million annually statewide
- 19 districts: Natural Resource Assistance Councils (NRACs)
- Local governments & 501(c)(3) non-profits eligible
- Grants up to 75% of costs
- Deed restrictions required
- Land acquisition to preserve:
 - Passive parks
 - Forests
 - Wetlands
 - Connecting corridors
- Stream corridor protection & restoration:
 - Establish riparian buffers
 - Improving public access
- Ineligible activities:
 - Hydro-modification projects (dams, dredging, etc.)
 - Accelerate untreated water runoff
 - Encourage invasive, non-native species
 - Current legal obligations (fines, penalties, litigation expenses)
 - Facilities other than those required to provide public access to or use of open space
 - Facilities for active recreation, such as tennis courts, ball fields or recreation centers
 - Stormwater facilities as primary purpose

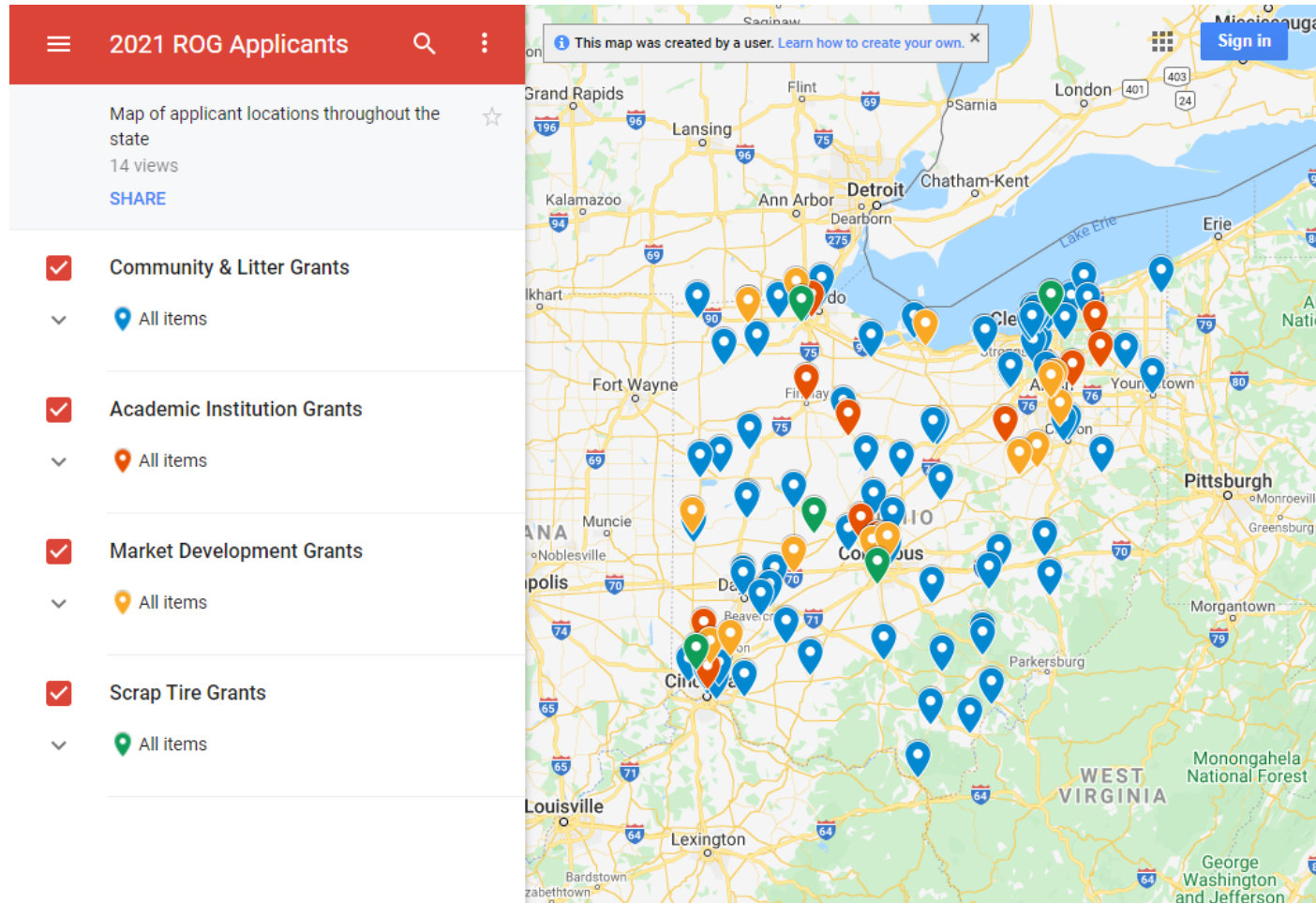

Recycling & Litter Prevention Grant Money at Work
