




Governor's 150 Intersections




\$425M in safety improvements at 150 locations

37% of fatal and serious injuries occur at intersections



Record Levels of Funding to Locals



Revenue coming from increase in state gas tax

Majority of serious crashes on local roads – 40% city or village



Three Funding Applications

\$140M available through 2025

- Traditional/Formal/Hot-Spot Application
- Abbreviated Application
- Systemic Application
- Study Assistance

*Will often supplement TAP, Small Cities, Safe Routes to School, and TSMO projects if they provide safety benefits



Traditional/Formal Applications



Due September/April 30th with presentations in October and May

- Open to projects on all public roadways
- 90% Federal Requires 10% match (typically)
 - Signs, signals, pavement markings and guardrail eligible at 100%
- Can fund all phases of project development
 - Planning, design, ROW, construction
- Funding caps per application round
- Targeting projects FY25 and beyond



Projects can be funded up to \$10M, though they are typically \$5M or less.

- Example Projects
 - Intersection Reconfigurations
 - Rural curve realignments
 - Interchange upgrades







Criteria

• 3+ crashes per year over a 3-to-5-year period

• 30% fatal or injury crashes



Process

What Information Do I Need?

- Safety Study that links the crash pattern with the project request.
- How will the project solve the crash problem?
- Is the funding request in line with the safety need?

- Cost Estimate
- CAMTool
- FCAT
- Safety Key Metrics (TIMS)
- Other relevant studies

LOCAL MAJOR BRIDGE (LMB) PROGRAM

- Provides Federal funds to counties and municipalities for bridge replacement, rehabilitation or demolition
- Moveable/lift bridge or a deck area greater than 35,000 sq. ft.
- Currently 54 LMBs
- Applications accepted annually from September 1 through October 1



LMB ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Meet the definition of a Local Major Bridge

Have a General Appraisal of 4 or less or legally posted for load restriction

Open to vehicular traffic

Be structurally deficient

Have completed a feasibility study



LMB SCORING CRITERIA

- Applications accepted annually starting
 July 1 through August 15

MB ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Be owned by a city, village or RTA

Open to vehicular traffic

Meet the Federal definition of a bridge

Sufficiency rating of 80 or less

General appraisal of 5 or less

Be structurally deficient

SMALL CITY (SC) PROGRAM

Provides Federal funding to small cities

- Population from 5,000 to 24,999
- Outside of a Metropolitan Planning Organization's boundaries
- Used for pavement rehabilitation, widening, safety and signal projects
- Applications accepted annually from May 1 through June
 15

TAP OVERVIEW

- STW Rural program
 - Annual allocation of \$11 million
 - Eligible applicants not located within MPO unless Allen, Belmont, Licking, & Washington Counties



- Federal 80% maximum based on eligible costs for Construction and Construction Engineering
 - Currently 95% using Toll Revenue Credit through SFY 2027
- Local 20% cash match and all costs associated with engineering plans, environmental studies and documentation, ROW plans and acquisition



TAP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- Local governments, Regional Transportation Authorities, Federal and State resource agencies
- Project must demonstrate a public benefit
- Accessible to the general public or targeted to a broad segment of the general public
- Be available for public use throughout its reasonable life
- Publicly-owned and on existing publicly-owned property (except for acquisition projects)



TAP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA CONTINUED

Local cash match must be committed and identified

- Commitment to maintain the project after construction is complete
 - Does not have to be the local government that applied for the grant



 No major maintenance issues with past performance concerning liability, negligence or safety

TYPES OF TAP PROJECTS

- Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities
- Rail Trails
- Safe Routes for Non-Drivers
- Other Community Improvements
- Environmental Mitigation











BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES

- Construction of on-road or off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized forms of transportation
 - Includes sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting, and other safety-related infrastructure and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.









RAIL TRAILS & SAFE ROUTES FOR NON-DRIVES

Rail-Trails

 Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridors as trails for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized transportation users

Safe Routes for Non-Drivers

- Construction of infrastructure-related projects and systems that will provide safe routes for non-drivers to access daily needs
- Includes children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities

OTHER COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

- Archaeological activities relating to impacts from implementation of a transportation project eligible under this title
- Construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas
- Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities
 - Historic projects must be listed on or determined eligible for National Register of Historic Places
- Landscaping and scenic enhancement features, including junkyard removal and screening, may be eligible as part of the construction







ENVIRONMENTAL MITIGATION

- Any environmental mitigation activity, including pollution prevention and pollution abatement activities and mitigation to -
 - Address stormwater management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff
 - Reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality
 - Restore and maintain connectivity among terrestrial or aquatic habitats



TAP PROJECTS & SAFETY

- 2018 ODOT Safety Department started a new application process
- Abbreviated Safety Application
 - Year-round application submissions
 - \$500,000 or less
- 2020 TAP applications were scored by safety department
- 5 projects were awarded Safety totaling \$2,075,000

TIPS FOR APPLICATIONS

- Try to combine multiple funding sources (TAP & Small City)
 - Incorporate TAP features into projects already scheduled to be constructed
 - Streetscaping when road is being resurfaced
 - Look to combine multiple funding sources (TAP & Small City)
- Break up large (expensive) projects into multiple phases
 - TAP funding only \$11,000,000 per year
 - 2020 Received 59 applications requesting over \$95,000,000 in funding
- Make sure you are checking application and estimate for ineligible costs (Including Contingency costs)
 - Make sure to account for Inflation as projects Awards are a few years out



TIPS FOR APPLICATIONS

City of Urbana - 2019 Application

- Awarded \$750,000 in TAP
 Funding (Sidewalks & Bike Lanes)
- Awarded \$1,348,163 in Small City Funding (Roadway Realignment)
- Awarded \$1,000,000 in Safety
 Funding (\$500,000 for TAP & \$500,000 for Small City)





PROJECT AUDITS

- Projects are eligible to be field audited after the project has been completed (closed in FMIS) for 5 years.
- Field audits are comprised of walking and inspecting the project for signs of project up keep.
- A written report will be sent to the LPA with the findings and any action that needs to be undertaken.

- October 1 Letter Of Interest available
- October 31 Letter of Interest due
- December 1 Invitation to apply distributed
- January 31 -Application due
- Late March Early April Notification of Award

MORPC-Attributable Funding



- Approximately \$36 Million Annually
 - Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) ~\$23M/yr
 - Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) ~\$11M/yr
 - Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) ~\$2M/yr
- Solicit Project Applications Every 2 Years
 - Updates to previous funding commitments
 - Applications for new commitments
- Pending requests to modify outstanding commitment

Available Funding for 2022 Cycle



- About \$70 million is expected to be available for new projects
- Most of funding in SFYs 2028-29
- Depends on requests to modify outstanding commitments

Funding Management Process



Application Timeline 2022-23 (Tentative)



- Summer 2021 February 2022: Review and update attributable funding policies
- March 2022: MORPC adopts Policies
- May 2022: Applicant workshop
- July 2022: Commitment Update Form due
- July 2022: Screening Applications for new funding due
- **July 2022:** Staff completes review of Updates. Provide feedback to applicants and revised forecast of available funding.
- September 2022: Final Applications due
- October November 2022: Staff review and score applications & AFC review and recommends funding commitments
- December 2022: Draft list of funding commitments available for public review and comment
- March 2023: MORPC adopts list of attributable funding commitments


- Roads & bridges
 - Construction
 - Widening
 - Reconstruction & maintenance
- Road projects must be on <u>federal-aid system</u> (local roads not eligible)
- Bridges can be on any public road
- Intersection or corridor signalization
- Transit
- Construction of bicycle and pedestrian facilities (on- or off-road)
- Primarily for capital (not operating)

Activity Categories

MORPC

- Major Road Widening/New Roadway
 - Add through lanes or new roadways
 - New or expanded interchanges
- Minor Road
 Widening/Intersections/Signals
 - Add center turn lane
 - Expand intersection capacity
 - Coordinated signal systems
- Road/Bridge System Preservation
 - Replace existing infrastructure only
 - No capacity addition

- Public Transit
 - Replace vehicles
 - Park & rides, transit centers
 - Enhanced bus stops
 - New service capital projects
- Stand Alone Bike and Pedestrian
 - Add path, bike lanes, sidewalks
 - Not part of a larger project
- Other
 - Does not fit others categories
 - Education & enforcement
 - Engine retrofits, alternative fuels stations, etc.

- Follow ODOT project development process
- Submit an updated application each cycle until project is sold
