208 Planning and Areawide Designation Process

The 208 committee continues to review and provide input on key decisions, such as the operational structure and funding considerations for standing up a designated areawide planning agency. MORPC anticipates completing these initial steps for establishing an Areawide Planning Agency in the first quarter of 2025 for Board consideration. Following approval, MORPC will work with the Ohio EPA to conduct a public engagement process with affected stakeholders.

Regional Water Study

The Central Ohio Regional Water Study consultants requested an extension through February to complete the Water Study. The delay is due to significant modeling efforts to account for numerous growth and weather scenarios over the next few decades. It is expected that the consultants will hold a Licking County Specific Workshop with elected officials in mid-December, with the full report occurring sometime in February 2025. Transportation Safety

Team Members are collaborating with the Heart of Ohio Family Health Center since they were awarded an <u>AARP 2024 Community Challenge Grant</u> to conduct walk audits in the Whitehall community. MORPC coordinated and led two walk audits, engaging community members, along with staff from COTA, Franklin County Public Health, the Age Friendly Innovation Center, and the Ohio Traffic Safety Office.

Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

In celebration of their tenth anniversary, the Conference of Minority Transportation Officials (COMTO) hosted "COMTO Columbus Week." MORPC joined the signature event as a community partner. Councilmember Barroso de Padilla recognized COMTO at a Columbus City Council meeting with a council resolution.

MORPC's DE&I Committee organized a guided tour to the National Veterans Memorial & Museum in honor of Veterans Day. This museum is the only site in the country that honors veterans from each branch of service.

Team Members facilitated a virtual "Coffee and Chat," hosted by the Central Ohio Diversity Consortium. The event promoted a culture of belonging and informed attendees how this contributes to higher engagement within the workplace.

Gohio Commute

Gohio Commute welcomed a new vanpool from Chillicothe to the Chalmers P. Wylie VA Clinic. Team Members promoted Gohio Commute at the Licking County Chamber HR Management meeting and the Nationwide Children's Health & Benefits Fair.

Active Transportation Planning

ODOT announced a special Active Transportation focused funding solicitation toward the end of October. Team Members are sharing information and collaborating with local partners to assist with developing funding applications for this unique opportunity. The funding is available to any political subdivision within the State of Ohio. Many types of projects, studies, and other initiatives are eligible.

Central Ohio Greenways (COG)

The COG Board met November 20 and heard Working Group, legislative, partner, and program updates. The board also discussed the progress of Regional Trail Vision.

 The COG Trail Towns Working Group is developing a brand for the program. The group continues to build consensus around the brand and is seeking funding to refine the brand with a designer. The group is also seeking funding for a Trail Town Ambassador Training Program, the Trail Towns in the Nation's Heartland Project, and Operational Funding.

In 2025, Central Ohio Greenways will begin adding "Gateways of Regional Significance" to the map to identify existing and proposed locations for premier trail heads that offer the amenities trail users need to travel the trails safely and comfortably.

Central Ohio Blueways

Central Ohio Blueways Working Groups continue to prioritize and define their 2025 goals. The Environmental Stewardship Working Group is focusing on assembling guidance for Onion Bag Project Installations. The User Experience Working Group continues to advance the formation of a hazard removal consortium. The Water Trail Designation Working Group is refining an editable field map to distribute to communities along the waterways so they can provide details on amenities at access points, and any useful information on the waterways' navigability and seasonality.

Regional Housing Strategy

Team Members continue having conversations around housing issues with MORPC member communities. Staff continues to promote the identification of barriers and solutions related to housing for members through connections with MORPC's Community Assistance Programs and by giving presentations to councils and other organizations. Team Members continue to identify ways to expand upon the previous work of the regional Housing Strategy.

If you are interested in a housing/growth workshop for your community's elected officials, staff, or community leaders, MORPC is accepting requests for presentations and workshops. Our Team will work with you to

Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC)

The next Sustainability Advisory Committee meeting is December 18 at the Jeffrey Mansion in Bexley and includes a special holiday celebration. Sustainable2050

The next Sustainable2050 meeting is December 5. The agenda includes updates on the Regional Sustainability Agenda and a presentation from Jennie McAdams, Franklin County Public Health, about a recent countywide tree canopy study in partnership with the City of Columbus.

Sustainable2050 membership is open to all MORPC members, and current Sustainable2050 members interested in earning their tier status certification should contact Brandi Whetstone (bwhetstone@morpc.org). A certification workbook will be provided, and a kick-off meeting is encouraged to review the process. Once a completed workbook is submitted and reviewed, the next step is to present the proposed certification to the SAC for approval.

Sustaining Scioto Board

The next Sustaining Scioto Board Meeting is December 11 and will focus on the transition to a Regional Water Advisory Council. The proposed Regional Water Advisory Council will continue to advance broad regional water priorities including sustainable water resource management, climate resiliency, and adaptation in the face of growth, development, and changing weather patterns.

Energy & Air Quality

The Energy and Air Quality Working Group met November 20 and heard updates on the Central Ohio Climate Action Plan. The work group is looking for candidates to serve as Chair and Vice Chair. If interested, contact Brian Filiatraut (bfiliatraut@morpc.org).

MORPC is in the final stages of awarding and contracting out the full scope of work for the \$2 million U.S. DOT/FHWA Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator (EVC RAA) award to repair and/or replace non-operational EV chargers throughout the 15-county region. Team Members plan on starting EVC RAA work this month and progressing into 2025 to fulfill the award completion deadline of August 2025.

MORPC is moving forward with finalizing the grant agreement with FHWA on the \$15 million MORE EVS project award to install over 400 EV charging ports in thirteen counties as part of the U.S. DOT/FHWA's Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Round 1B Program. As soon as the grant agreement is completed, MORPC will issue an RFI to set up the RFP process. Reach out to Brian Filiatraut (bfiliatraut@morpc.org) for more information.

Work on the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Central Ohio Climate Action Plan (COCAP) continues. The COCAP Team, led by Sustainable Columbus, MORPC, and others continues to develop a more comprehensive climate action plan and pollution reduction strategies through the COCAP for the 10-county Columbus Metropolitan Statistical Area. MORPC completed the regional greenhouse gas inventory which will serve as a roadmap and benchmark mitigation strategies developed over the coming months. Neighborhood Air Monitoring Project/U.S. EPA Project

Team Members, in partnership with Franklin County Public Health, made great progress on the U.S. EPA funded air monitoring project. Under the advisement of the air quality modeling consultant, Ramboll Americas Engineering Solutions, MORPC created an interactive map of where sensors should be deployed and began sharing this with local community partners. MORPC extended the deadline for sensor deployment to December 31 to ensure the best possible placements for analyzing local PM2.5 levels within Franklin County. Of the forty newest Purple Air sensors, fifteen were installed by the end of November and the remaining 25 are scheduled for installation in the coming weeks.

Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC)

The RDAC met October 1.

- Cyber Security Working Group: The Working Group met November 19 to discuss takeaways from
 the October 31 "Cybersecurity for Local Leaders" event. Four MORPC member communities and
 one community stakeholder signed up to engage with the Working Group for assistance in advancing
 their cybersecurity objectives. Interested parties should complete a Cybersecurity Working Group
 Interest Form.
- Data Day Working Group: The Working Group sent out a Call for Proposals for Data Day 2025. The
 group is also focusing their efforts on identifying potential morning and lunch speakers. Send
 speaker suggestions to Jordan Inskeep at jinskeep@morpc.org.
- DEI & Data Working Group: The Working Group met November 19 to evaluate progress and identify support needed to complete proposals for DEI-focused sessions to be held at Data Day 2025.
- Regional Data Coaching Working Group: The Working Group met November 21 to coordinate marketing and coverage for their second pop-up event at the Columbus Metropolitan Main Library on December 7. Members also discussed 2025 outreach plans.
- Workforce and Job Quality Working Group: The Working Group met November 21 and continued to define regional standards associated with five dimensions of job quality: earnings, schedules, benefits, safety/security, and learning/development.
- Central Ohio GIS User Group: The group met November 2, GIS Day. Andrew Wilson, City of Hilliard, presented on ArcPro, with discussions on all things GIS, including potential future uses of ESRI AI assistants and the steep data management requirements needed to efficiently leverage some of ESRI's more advanced features.
- Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG): RIDG met November 13. The meeting focused on Data Privacy. The next RIDG meeting is in the first quarter of 2025. The RIDG Steering Committee and MORPC Team Members are working to develop topics for 2025 and evaluating the structure and charter of the Committee to assess areas for improvement and streamlining.

Data & Research Activities

Team Members expect to launch the next Leaders Listen Survey in early December.

Team Members are collaborating with a group of graduate students in The Ohio State University Master of Translational Data Analytics program to conduct a property tax productivity analysis (aka "value per acre") for parcels in Delaware County. Past studies in other locations revealed that traditional walkable neighborhoods characteristic of those built prior to World War II produce significantly more tax value per acre than automobile-oriented development characteristic of post-WWII development patterns. The project is structured as a two-semester capstone course ending May 2025. The students are carrying out the analysis under supervision from MORPC Staff. A key project goal is that the analysis will be reproducible and easily adaptable to other counties. The processes for working with county parcel data may also facilitate other critical MORPC work including sub-county population estimates.

DRIVE INVESTMENT

LinkUS Mobility Initiative

With the passage of the transit levy, MORPC continues to work with COTA, the City of Columbus, Franklin County, and other partners to implement the LinkUS initiative, including the formalization of the transit-supportive infrastructure program, equitable transit-oriented development policies, bus rapid transit corridor planning, and initial fixed-route and COTA//Plus services enhancements.

Passenger Rail

MORPC continues to work with the City of Fort Wayne on planning for the Midwest Connect corridor between Chicago and Pittsburgh. Staff participated in a Rally for Rail and panel discussion in late October. Representatives from the Central Ohio Passenger Rail Committee (COPRC) also met with Fort Wayne Mayor Sharon Tucker to discuss short- and long-term goals and to strengthen interregional collaboration.

The Central Ohio Passenger Rail Committee met November 12 and heard updates from the Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC), the Midwest Connect consultant team, and Amtrak.

ORDC is accepting public comments on the State Rail Plan update, including topics related to passenger rail, through an online survey. The survey is available at https://metroquestsurvey.com/isd72. Comments or questions may be submitted to staterailplan@dot.ohio.gov through the end of December.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)/Economic Development District

MORPC hosted a panel, *The Future of Infrastructure: Building a Blueprint for Tomorrow*, at the December 6 ED411. Panelists from Nevada, Arizona and Texas shared lessons learned whilst securing large scale projects, including how they addressed regional challenges and prepared the region for transformative growth.

In partnership with the Ohio Department of Transportation, MORPC is hosting a Rickenbacker Area Freight Alliance workshop on December 16. The purpose of the workshop is to create synergies between ongoing economic development initiatives in the area and the planned transportation infrastructure investments to meet the needs of this important regional economic asset.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)

Team Members ensured applications for MORPC Attributable Funds, OPWC, and other infrastructure funding and technical assistance programs were evaluated in congruence with adopted MTP goals.

Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

The relaunch of the Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP) program is on hold until federal funding priorities, particularly those of the U.S. Economic Development Administration, are clear.

Brownfield Assessments

MORPC applied to the U.S. EPA's Community Wide Brownfield Assessment grant on November 12. If successful, this grant could fund phases 1 and 2 of hazardous material assessments as well as clean up planning. The grant targets the Linden and South Side Area of Columbus as well as Mt. Vernon in Knox County but all members will be able to utilize funds. Award announcements are likely in Q2 2025.

Federal Competitive Programs

The United States Department of Transportation opened the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) FY25 grant program on November 1. The current solicitation includes two rounds of funding where only applications that obtained a Project of Merit status in the previous RAISE round can participate in round one. MORPC's application, titled "Trail Towns in the Nation's Heartland Planning Project" was a Project of Merit in the previous RAISE round and was resubmitted into round one of the current RAISE solicitation.

The United States Department of Transportation opened the Regional Infrastructure Accelerator (RIA) program on October 28. MORPC is interested in participating in this program to assist with delivery of Transit Supportive Infrastructure that is included in LinkUS. The grant could also help inform the implementation of the Central Ohio Greenways (COG) vision. MORPC leadership will meet to discuss next steps.

MORPC established a process for Letters of Support requests. The process will not only help Central Ohio communities and other partners receive MORPC's support letters in a timely manner but will also help track and record internally the letters provided for different funding opportunities. Drive Investment Portal

Mobility Management

Team Members created a "Getting Around Franklin County" guide to highlight the available transportation options for seniors and people with disabilities. The guide is available to the public and interested agencies.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient

The 5310 Advisory Committee met to select awards for the 2024 solicitation cycle. Fifteen recipients are recommended for a total of \$1,760,329 in federal funding.

Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO)

The CORPO Committee met November 4 and appointed Jeff Stauch (Union County Engineer) the new chair and Brian Ball (City of Mount Vernon Engineer) the new vice chair.

Team Members began the process of drafting the 2026-2029 CORPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with rural consultation at the September CORPO Subcommittee meetings and continued this month with submitting documentation from the rural consultation meetings, attending training sessions for the E-STIP platform and beginning the drafting of the TIP document.

The Functional Classification Review process started with a training session at the beginning of the month. CORPO will be coordinating with counties and local jurisdictions to complete the Functional Classification Review process over the next year to be submitted to ODOT and FHWA by August 2025.

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Team Members prepared a TIP amendment for consideration by CAC, TAC, and the Transportation Policy Committee in December. Coordination with ODOT is ongoing for smaller administrative modifications to the TIP.

MORPC-Attributable Funding

Staff provided applicants to the MORPC-Attributable Funds program with draft scores for their applications in early November. Applicants were offered the opportunity to discuss their draft scores and provide clarification where needed. Revised draft scores were shared with applicants on November 22. The AFC reviewed these scores and discussed funding scenarios at their December 4 meeting.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

Applicants to District 3 (Franklin County) for FY26 SCIP/LTIP assistance were provided draft scores for their applications in early November. Applicants were offered the opportunity to meet with MORPC Staff, who scored the applications, to discuss their scores and provide clarification of their applications where needed. The District 3 PWIC reviewed these scores at their December 6 meeting.

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

- Transfer \$100,000 out of the main operating account to the Operating Reserve.
 - This authorization is for the purpose of transferring positive net income from certain program groups to be invested in the Operating and Management Reserves in accordance with the Operating Reserve Policy.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The MORPC 2025 operating budget is \$30,436,359 an increase of \$6,806,941 (28.8%) from 2024's budget of \$23,629,418.

Looking toward 2025, MORPC's finances are strong. The agency will continue to make investments strategically, while also prioritizing the preservation of cash to ensure the long-term sustainability of its operations. With relatively high interest rates persisting, uncertainty continues around the national economy. However, MORPC remains optimistic – economic development projects in the region continue to grow, large amounts of federal funding are available to the region, and nationwide inflation is on the decline. This budget seeks to continue a balanced approach of using resources responsibly, while still targeting investments that will improve services for members and the region.

MORPC will continue to aggressively pursue grants and contracts that will benefit its members. While some increases have been budgeted, a mid-year budget amendment will be completed if needed to adjust for new funding and programs as we move through 2025.

This budget focuses on MORPC's Strategic Framework Goals, which include:

- Drive Investment;
- Pay It Forward;
- · Create an Environment for Prosperity; and
- Build Value for Our Members.

MORPC is pursuing a number of initiatives to continue to advance these goals, which include the following:

Drive Investment

- To attract investment to the region and create opportunities for members and all of Central Ohio, MORPC will continue to devote more resources toward efforts in the areas of economic development and regional investment. This includes continued funding in the following positions: Economic Development Director, Regional Investment Officer, Economic Development Planner, Grants Coordinator, and Grants Intern. The MORPC team continues to implement the Economic Development District that was recognized by United States Economic Development Administration (USEDA) in late 2023.
- MORPC will continue to support planning efforts around major projects, such as the Intel Project in Licking County. MORPC is budgeting funding received from ODOT to support this planning work.
- MORPC continues to develop the Regional Water Plan and implement the process for 208 clean water quality management planning.
- Through LinkUS, MORPC will continue to invest in smart development to connect communities and create opportunities for a more equitable and sustainable region for everyone by helping to address growth, affordability, and opportunity gaps in Central Ohio. In collaboration with the City of Columbus, Central Ohio Transit Authority, and the Franklin County Board of Commissioners, LinkUS will bring more Bus Rapid Transit to the region, create more walkable communities, expand access to opportunities, and more.





MORPC continues to work on multiple rail projects and stood up the Central Ohio
Passenger Rail Committee to advise and help steer passenger rail planning and
ancillary work in Central Ohio. This includes work on the collaborative effort called
Midwest Connect to connect Chicago, Fort Wayne, IN, Columbus, OH and Pittsburgh
with passenger rail service, as well as continued work on the 3C+D corridor to connect
Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton and Cincinnati.

Pay It Forward

MORPC will continue to enhance public service leadership and build capacity in Central
Ohio communities by training local elected officials and appointed leaders; provide
extensive member-focused forums, briefings, and special events; and connect young
leaders to public service through MORPC's Local Government Internship Program.
 MORPC continues to expand our partnership with colleges and universities in the region
to offer educational discounts to employees of all member agencies.

Create an Environment for Prosperity

- MORPC will continue to deliver essential tools for the region to get better as it grows bigger, including expanded research, visual tools, and proactive briefings; continued expertise to tackle the housing challenge; and programs and tools to inform and drive sustainability and mobility efforts.
- MORPC will implement two large electric vehicle (EV) charging projects in 2025, including the largest grant ever received by the agency. These programs are designed to support the maintenance and expansion of electric vehicle charging to improve access to clean transportation and facilitate the transition to sustainable energy solutions.

Build Value for Our Members

- In response to the challenges of growth and staffing in many of the region's local governments, MORPC continues to develop the recently added resources for planning assistance. This includes a staffing pool of planners available for short-term assignments with MORPC members to assist with planning and development staffing needs. MORPC also developed a task order consultant program to streamline the process for local governments to engage pre-negotiated services from a network of planning and development firms and consultants.
- MORPC will be an excellent steward of regional resources. In this budget, MORPC is using \$405,215 in funding to bolster its operating reserve, which will further strengthen MORPC's finances, improve financial resiliency, and support MORPC's 60-day or more operating reserve balance target.
- MORPC will continue to be a strong resource and collaborative forum for Central Ohio communities. MORPC members will continue to have access to the newly renovated space and will benefit from virtual meeting tools.
- MORPC will continue to provide a strong return on investment (ROI) for all local government members.

The details below show some changing initiatives and new programs. Here are some notable highlights for 2025:

MPO& CORPO (Jointly Funded Projects)

 The Federal Highway Administration funds decreased to \$3,393,968 in 2025 from \$4,016,119 in 2024. This decrease was due to more carry-over funds available in 2024





than in 2025, primarily the result of significant turnover in 2023. This timing difference is expected to be balanced out by non-jointly funded project work in 2025.

Programming and Planning

- The increase in programming funding for 2025 can be attributed to several key factors. FTA 5310 Enhanced Mobility Program has seen significant growth, with more funding available in 2025 compared to 2024. This increase is primarily due to a resolution of nationwide supply chain issues that had delayed vehicle purchases for subrecipients in previous years. With these issues now resolved, more funds are expected to be utilized in the upcoming year.
- In 2025, more funding is being secured through various programs, such as the Safe Streets for All program, which provides resources for transportation safety and infrastructure improvements.
- Funds for the newly established Economic Development District are expected to contribute to the increased funding for programming.
- Various transportation projects include projected funding for rail and the RAISE for trail towns.
- Planning is budgeted to increase due to 2 new grants related to Electrical Vehicle charging. The Charging Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Grant will add funding of \$3,429,785 and the EV Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator Program will add an additional \$1,917,611. The projects will repair/replace, maintain, and expand EV chargers throughout the Central Ohio region.

Residential Services

• The 2025 budget for Residential Services (RS) shows a slight reduction in funding with an overall reduction in Weatherization and an increase in Home Repair. Specifically, the HWAP budget will decrease from \$4,382,032 in 2024 to \$4,028,831 in 2025. The Columbia Gas budget also decreases from \$2,095,620 in 2024 to \$1,363,840 in 2025. These decreases are due to a combination of right-sizing the budgets for contractor costs and a decrease in eligible applicants reaching the programs. However, there are still efforts underway to boost efficiency and revenue generation in MORPC's Weatherization programs, including additional installation of funded measures by MORPC team members. In addition, MORPC is increasing its focus on broader home repair and renovation efforts, including radon mitigation and lead safe programs. The service area for these initiatives is expanding to include the City of Westerville, with plans to continue broadening outreach to other communities. The Home Repair budget has received a significant increase of \$847,635 raising funding from \$2,102,901 in 2024 to \$2,950,535 in 2025. This boost will help MORPC continue providing critical support to families in need.

The Detailed Revenue by Department schedule, which is in the Appendix, shows additional detail on program fluctuations from year to year.





This budget also makes investments in staffing that will increase program focused positions that will support the priority programs of the agency. The budget also shows a similar level of turnover/soft funding assumption associated with staffing based on recent turnover trends, which is in line with the expectations of other organizations due to the current employment climate.

The fringe rate will rise to 59% of wages in 2025, which is slightly increased from 57.5% in 2024. Additionally, the indirect cost allocation rate will lower to 61.0% of direct labor (i.e., wages and fringe), which was 62.5% in 2024. The net impact of these two modest changes will result in a near net zero change to the direct programs.

SOURCES (Funding Sources - Page 11)

Total 2025 sources of \$30,436,359 are greater than the 2024 sources budget of \$23,629,418 with the large increases for the EV programs and additional fluctuations in some funding sources and programs as is typical for MORPC.

Revenue from federal sources is budgeted to increase to \$21,861,781 (or by 44%) from \$15,210,779. Federal sources account for 72% of the operating budget. The increase can primarily be attributed to the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Grant (CFI) and the Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator Program (EV Charger) funds.

Local and other budgeted revenue is projected to increase by 13% to \$4,013,175 in 2025 from \$3,099,673 in 2024. Housing Local Contracts is the largest increase primarily as a result of the new City of Westerville Home Repair program with other modest increases in Planning and Data related funding areas.

USES (Page 6)

Salaries and fringe benefits are budgeted to increase from \$10,983,466 to \$11,478,913 (or 4.51%) as a result of new positions, across the board wage increases, some promotions/wage adjustments, and fringe benefit cost increases. Staff was budgeted at 95.3 FTEs in the 2024 budget and is budgeted at 96.3 FTEs in 2025.

MORPC will increase the amount of funding it is setting aside for its operating reserve to \$405,215 to further strengthen MORPC's finances, improve financial resiliency, and support MORPC's 60-day or more operating reserve balance target.

Services & Charges are higher primarily due to more being budgeted in 2025 for FTA 5310 Enhanced Mobility Program subgrant funds.

Subcontractors are expected to increase significantly from \$6,996,347 in 2024 to \$11,473,672 due to the addition of several programs that will need to utilize subcontractors including the EV Charger, CFI, Lead Safe, and City of Westerville Home Repair.



Depreciation and Amortization increased from \$189,684 in 2024 to \$795,559 in 2025 due to the implementation of a new GASB pronouncement that records amortization differently for lease payments in prior year budgets. The depreciation amount included within the 2025 budget (of approximately \$186,000) is consistent with the 2024 budget amount for depreciation alone.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES (Page 6)

The capital expenditures budget for 2025 is \$97,500 down from the 2024 expense of \$120,000. The 2025 expense is attributable to the planned purchase of a new van for Residential Services weatherization and other various equipment for IT and other areas.

USE OF MEMBER DUES (Page 7)

The total 2025 member dues budget is \$1,666,760 (a 5.7% increase compared to 2024). Dues funding is provided by MORPC members. Revenue is increasing due to the addition of new members, an increase in population, and a Commission-approved increase to member dues. Of the 2025 budgeted amount: \$405,215 of the dues are being set aside to bolster MORPC's operating reserve in support of the Commission-approved 60-day operating reserve target (similar to the \$400,000 in 2024), \$21,009 is being used to cover CORPO transportation matching requirements (MPO transportation matching requirements are being met using other local funds), and \$187,599 is for building lease expenses.

Services to Members makes up the majority of the dues budget with \$900,893 budgeted for work for members such as executive director services, proactive legislation, public policy work, member services coordination, and other services (including regional investment work). Member Dues represent approximately 5.5% of the operating sources budget. Dues are provided by 82 participating local government members (counties, townships, municipalities, and villages) at annual rates set by the Commission. Finally, associate members, which includes eight regionally-oriented units of local government, are currently participating as members of MORPC at an annual rate of \$1,250 each.

APPROPRIATIONS (Page 8)

The appropriations are similar to the agency operating expenses, coming in at \$30,250,675 for 2025.

The Public Policy Agenda was forumulated by a working group of MORPC members and community leaders, and approved by the Regional Policy Roundtable on November 21, 2024.

The Public Policy Agenda (PPA) Working Group was chaired by the Regional Policy Roundtable Vice Chair, Mayor Sloan Spalding (New Albany). The PPA Working Group was comprised of a diverse group of local business, non-profit, and government leaders, many of whom are MORPC commission members, from rural, urban, and suburban communities and representing a variety of political perspectives. The Working Group met on three occasions between August and October 2024.

The Regional Policy Roundtable recommends passage of Resolution 18-24 at the December 12 Commission meeting to allow for public circulation at the beginning of the new U.S. Congress and Ohio General Assembly in Q1 2025.

There is currently a vacancy for the liaison role for this district. Should MORPC assume this responsibility, the role would begin in January 2025 with a total budget of \$17,500 through March of 2026 allocated for administrative costs. MORPC also reserves the right to assess applicants a voluntary fee of up to one percent per approved project. Key responsibilities would include planning and hosting NRAC meetings, ensuring compliance with program requirements, processing applications, and facilitating the selection of projects for awards.

<u>Meeting Called to Order</u> – Chris Amorose Groomes (City of Dublin), MORPC Chair Chair Chris Amorose Groomes called the Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to order at 2:23 p.m.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Report</u> – Parag Agrawal, MORPC Chief Mobility & Infrastructure Officer & Senior Director of Programming

Parag Agrawal presented the Metropolitan Planning Organization Report. Mr. Agrawal provided an update on the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) and Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) leadership. The CAC is comprised of volunteers representing a broad segment of Central Ohio. The new CAC Chair is Erin Synk from the Southside Area Commission and the new Vice Chair is Eric May from Bold Penguin. The TAC includes representation from federal, state, and local transportation officials as well as from environmental agencies. The new TAC Chair is Fritz Crosier from the Franklin County Engineer's Office and the new Vice Chair is Tom Komlanc from the City of Gahanna. The Conference of Minority Transportation Officials (COMTO) President serves on the CAC. Mr. Agrawal thanked the City of Columbus for passing a resolution celebrating COMTO's 10-year anniversary.

Mr. Agrawal gave an update on the infrastructure funding and technical assistance programs.

- MORPC has approximately \$50 million from various federal programs to help members create a multi-modal transportation system in Central Ohio. This year we received 20 applications seeking \$167 million. The Attributable Funds Committee is evaluating applications and developing draft funding recommendations that will go out for public comment in January 2025.
- MORPC manages the FTA Section 5310 funding program that enhances the mobility of senior citizens and people with disabilities. We received 21 applications seeking approximately \$3.1 million for the \$1.7 million available this round. The evaluation committee meets later this month and will send their recommendations through the various advisory committees and to the Transportation Policy Committee for approval.
- MORPC provides technical assistance to enhance active transportation to MPO member communities. We received four applications for 2025. The review committee met yesterday to identify the communities receiving assistance in 2025. MORPC will notify the winning communities tomorrow.
- MORPC administers the funds for Ohio Public Works Commission District 3 (Franklin County). Applications totaling \$49 million were received for the \$32 million available.

MORPC's Emma Strange is the Mobility Coordinator for Franklin County. She is responsible for providing education for transportation options for residents. The Franklin County Getting Around Guide is meant to empower people of all ages and abilities to find transportation options that work for their specific needs. It promotes accessible transportation options and includes information on biking, walking, and rolling. Copies were available for members.

MORPC continues to work with partners to bring passenger rail to Central Ohio. The Passenger Rail Committee met November 12 with presentations from Amtrack and the Ohio Rail Development Commission. On October 31, Central Ohio leaders went to Fort Wayne to meet with Mayor Tucker. Fort Wayne is the primary applicant for the Midwest Connect project.

MORPC is working with various member communities and COTA to manage the LinkUS Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI) program. MORPC is proposing 83 projects in the next five years with a combined investment of more than \$260 million.

<u>Safe Streets – Safer Communities: A Comprehensive Overview of MORPC's Roadway Safety Program</u> – Maria Schaper, MORPC Transportation Study Director and Lauren Cardoni, MORPC Active Transportation & Safety Program Manager

Maria Schaper and Lauren Cardoni presented <u>Safe Streets – Safer Communities</u>. One of the goals of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is to provide transportation and mobility options to benefit the health, safety, and welfare of all people. Targets adopted for that goal include reducing crashes by at least two percent annually, one hundred percent sidewalk coverage for arterials and collectors within the urban area, and over 1,000 miles of low stress bikeways by 2050.

While the region is making great strides in improving accommodation for people walking and bicycling, the same is not true for reducing fatalities and serious injuries on our roadways. The latest crash data shows that 2023 was the deadliest year on record for the MORPC MPO area. Traffic safety continues to be a challenge in our region. Over the past year, we grew our team of transportation safety experts and leveraged federal dollars to create new local partnerships to improve safety on our regional transportation system.

MORPC has been a partner in transportation safety efforts throughout the region since 2005 when MORPC first established the regional safety program. Through this program, we conduct crash data analyses to understand trends throughout the region and provide technical assistance to local agency partners to address safety challenges. In the nearly 20 years this program has existed, the needs of our communities regarding transportation safety have grown and changed. MORPC is working to not only expand our service area but also to evolve the program to better align with national best practices.

The first big change for our program came with the release of the Central Ohio Transportation Safety Plan in 2019. This plan was the first regional comprehensive safety action plan in the State of Ohio. It represents the first time we took a deep dive into the fatal and serious injury crashes in our region to better understand why they occurred.

We have also been successful in expanding our safety programming to include our CORPO communities. Through the Safe Streets and Roads for All program, MORPC was awarded \$200,000 to develop a similar comprehensive safety action plan for the CORPO planning area. Since the adoption of the CORPO Safety Action Plan in May 2024, Team Members created the CORPO Safety Action Plan Dashboard. The dashboard provides valuable data and insights regarding crashes that are reported in the CORPO planning area and is a new resource available to anyone in the CORPO area.

Through the Safe Streets and Roads for All program, MORPC was awarded additional funding to update the Central Ohio Transportation Safety Plan, to do supplemental work with local community partners, and to work with the Ohio State University Injury Biomechanics Research Center to do indepth investigations into fatal crashes occurring on our roadways. The Safe Streets and Roads for All program has now awarded more than \$18 million to Central Ohio communities.

MORPC is working across the agency and with external partners to figure out how we can better integrate safety into all our policies and programs.

Transportation Improvement Program"

Proposed Resolution T-13-24 will add or modify four (4) projects to the SFY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with commitments totaling over \$96 million. These changes are necessary to enable the projects to advance and to maintain fiscal constraint. In January, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) will ask the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to amend the Statewide TIP to include these changes.

Continued maintenance of the TIP is a key element of implementing the strategies in the 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation (MTP). The projects included in this amendment specifically relate to implementation of these MTP strategies:

- OP 5: Improve connections and coordination among transit system operators
- OP 7: Improve demand response transit service
- OP 8: Manage, improve and coordinate human service, private and public transportation, to better meet the needs and fill the gaps
- PRES 1: Repair or replace bridges in poor physical condition
- PRES 4: Replace transit vehicles that are beyond their useful life
- TRAN 5: Implement appropriate additional/innovative service to address first/last mile needs
- RDWY 1: Add capacity, where appropriate, to alleviate existing or anticipated congestion along existing freeway and at interchanges

Attachment 1 to the resolution provides a description of the funding and scope of the projects, including a description of the bicycle and pedestrian components. Two projects include MORPC-attributable funding.

An explanation of the proposed changes to the TIP follows.

<u>Delaware County Transit:</u> The following modification to the TIP is being made for a DCT project:

 PID 118103: DCT 2025 Vehicle Replace. Adjusting funding to allocate for related activities in later years. Total of \$713,167 removed in SFY2025.

<u>Franklin County TID:</u> The following modification to the TIP is being made for a Franklin County TID project:

 PID 115792: Alum Creek Dr from SR 317 to Groveport Rd. Moving \$2.5 million from detailed design to preliminary engineering in SFY 2025.

MORPC: The following addition to the TIP is being made for MORPC's FTA Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program:

• PID Unassigned: This program is funded via FFY2024 Section 5310 funding. Fifteen (15) subrecipients are receiving funding through this program. Attachment 2 to this resolution provides additional detail regarding the awards. Total of \$2,410,943 added in SFY2025.

ODOT: The following additions or modifications to the TIP are being made for ODOT projects:

PID 105435: I-71 & I-270 (North Outerbelt), Interchange Modification/Bridge Deck Replace.
 Adjusting funding to reflect updated construction cost estimates. Total of \$13,859,254 added in SFY2025 and SFY2026.

Transportation Safety Performance Measure Targets"

The 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) includes strategies specifically related to enhancing the safety of the transportation system, with many of the strategies and projects included in the MTP advancing this objective in some way. Furthermore, the MTP includes specific performance measures as required by the federal Transportation Performance Management Program. The program is defined by a series of rulemakings that delineate a process in which MPO's and State Departments of Transportation coordinate on target-setting and reporting for a series of federal transportation performance measures.

Safety is one area in which states and MPOs are required to set targets. The rule requires state DOTs to set targets for five safety performance measures by August 31 each year. The five measures are:

- number of fatalities
- number of serious injuries
- fatality rate
- serious injury rate
- number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries

In July 2024, ODOT reestablished their annual statewide safety targets as a 2% annual reduction for each of the five measures. This was based on many factors, including a review of recent trends in safety statistics and an ongoing record level of safety investments statewide.

Each MPO across the state is subsequently required to establish safety targets for their respective planning areas by February 26 each year. Resolution T-14-24 is necessary to explicitly meet these federal planning regulations to establish safety performance measures for the MPO area.

MORPC was a leader in the U.S. when performance measures were first incorporated into the 2012-2035 MTP in 2012. As part of the 2024-2050 MTP that was adopted in May 2024, these performance measures were reestablished via resolution T-3-24, and the 2025 ODOT targets are consistent with these adopted regional targets.

RESOLUTION T-14-24

"SUPPORTING THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION'S 2025 SAFETY PERFORMANCE MEASURE TARGETS"

WHEREAS, the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) is designated as the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) by the governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and in cooperation with locally elected officials; and

WHEREAS, Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) is the federal transportation legislation with which MORPC's transportation planning must comply including performance measures; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) has established transportation performance management rules and processes to be incorporated into metropolitan transportation planning, which includes state and MPO adoption of certain performance measures; and

WHEREAS, MORPC adopted the 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) which includes strategies with regard to enhancing the safety of the transportation system along with safety performance measures; and

WHEREAS, the USDOT rules require the states to set targets for five safety performance measures (number of fatalities, number of serious injuries, fatality rate, serious injury rate and number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries) annually by August 31 each year, and that MPOs set targets for the five measures annually by February 26 each year; and

WHEREAS, in August 2024 ODOT, in collaboration with the Ohio Department of Public Safety, established a 2% annual reduction as the statewide target for each of the five safety performance measures for calendar year 2025; and

WHEREAS, these targets established by ODOT are consistent with the targets for the five safety performance measures included in the 2024-2050 MTP, adopted via Resolution T-3-24; and

WHEREAS, the Community Advisory Committee at its meeting on December 2, 2024, and the Transportation Advisory Committee at its meeting on December 4, 2024, recommended approval of this resolution to the Transportation Policy Committee; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TRANSPORTATION POLICY COMMITTEE OF THE **MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION**:

Section 1.	That it supports ODOT's safety targets established in August 2024 as described above.					
Section 2.	That it will plan and program projects that contribute toward the achievement of the ODOT targets.					
Section 3:	That it directs staff to establish safety targets in the 2024-2050 Columbus Area Metropolitan Transportation Plan that are consistent with the ODOT targets.

Meeting Called to Order - Chris Amorose Groomes (City of Dublin), MORPC Chair

Chair Chris Amorose Groomes called the meeting to order at 1:31 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chair Amorose Groomes led the Commission in a moment of silence for Village of Somerset Mayor and MORPC member Tom Johnson who passed away.

<u>Recognition of Guests and New Members</u> – Eileen Leuby, MORPC Membership Services Officer

Eileen Leuby welcomed consultant and transportation engineer Anthony Srgo.

Executive Director's Report - William Murdock, MORPC Executive Director

William Murdock gave the <u>Executive's Director Report</u>. Mr. Murdock shared the pre-Commission luncheon included Steve Steinour, CEO of Huntington Bank and the head of the Columbus Partnership. The Columbus Foundation shared their Benchmarking Report.

Mr. Murdock thanked those who ran for office, or work for those in office, and/or had initiatives on their ballots. No matter how it went, MORPC appreciates your service to your community. Mr. Murdock also thanked the veterans for their service.

Mr. Murdock gave a preview of upcoming agenda items. Ms. Leuby will share new benefits this morning. The Return on Investment statements are ready to go. Copies of the summary were provided at each seat and will be available <u>online</u>. The Regional Policy Roundtable report includes an election update. With a new president, a new congress, and new members of the state legislature, MORPC is here to work with you in navigating the new landscape.

The regional housing effort is taking an important step on November 19 at Reynoldsburg's City Hall. The City of Columbus is investing in the next step of how to create a regional housing coalition effort to help local governments make housing happen.

Mr. Murdock congratulated the Commission and local leaders on the passage of the LinkUS ballot issue. MORPC began working on this about ten years ago with a committee aimed at making the region grow better. Mr. Murdock is proud of the MORPC Team's involvement and thinking about how this impacts the whole region.

Nearly 700 people attended the October 29 Summit on Sustainability. The morning plenary session featured regional council leaders from across the country. The keynote session with Jeff Speck was great and the four Pecha Kucha presenters brought down the house. Fifteen breakout sessions were offered throughout the day-long event.

The 208 Process Review Committee met yesterday. Former Delaware City Manager Tom Homan chairs the committee that is looking at sewer facility planning that is so important to growth. We are able to learn from other regions around the state who have done this for 40-50 years. The committee will bring their recommendations to the Commission.

The Regional Water Study is looking at how the region can be prepared to have the water we need going forward. The study is slightly delayed. The consultants need more time because of modeling efforts. Recommendations are anticipated early next year. Because of the growth issues and pressures from Intel, the study results for Licking County should be available by the end of this year.

The STEPZ (Strategic Training on Effective Planning and Zoning) Workshop focuses on elected and appointed planning officials and what their responsibilities are, how their role fits into larger-scale community planning, what some of the legalities are to be aware of, and how to read site plans and interact with engaged members of the public. The November 19 workshop at MORPC also features an interactive session in partnership with the Urban Land Institute.

The Grant Opportunity of the Month is the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program. The grant's focus is on plans and projects that help with cybersecurity.

Mr. Murdock congratulated MORPC's Senior Director of Communications & Engagement Ralonda Hampton for being named a Who's Who in Black Columbus.

Tom Homan shared information on the Ohio University's Voinovich School of Leadership and Public Service Governing Essentials for Local Elected Officials program which begins February 28, 2025. The program is a hands-on opportunity to learn the essentials of local government using a number of facilitators. While it is geared toward newly elected officials, they also encourage folks who have been in office for a number of years to consider it as well as appointed officials. Regional Policy Roundtable – Lourdes Barroso de Padilla (City of Columbus), Regional Policy Roundtable Chair

Lourdes Barroso de Padilla presented the <u>Regional Policy Roundtable Update</u>. The Regional Policy Roundtable will officially adopt the 2025-2026 Public Policy Agenda at their November 21 meeting. Councilmember Barroso de Padilla thanked those who participated in the Public Policy Agenda working group and Sloan Spalding for leading the group and Kyle Probert for keeping them on task.

The Roundtable will also be joined by Jo Ingles from the Ohio Public Radio State House News Bureau for a post-election update at the November 21 meeting.

With the passage of Issue 47, Central Ohio has a transportation system that matches what our residents need today and what our residents will need tomorrow with a forty-five percent increase in existing fixed route transit throughout the COTA service area. Councilmember Barroso de Padilla thanked the Public Service Team for their work. Issue 47 also means safe and expanded bike and pedestrian paths. It will bring in about \$60 million annually toward transit supportive infrastructure. Over 360 miles and \$5 million of bike and pedestrian projects are already identified and prioritized.

The transition expands the group's focus to all of MORPC's 15 counties. The board is repositioning itself to be a convening body focused on advancing broader regional priorities, including 208 planning, and the outcomes of the Regional Water Study. MORPC is the lead applicant on this project with the following partners: IMPACT Community Action (Statutory Partner), Nationwide Children's Healthy Homes, Pickaway County Community Action, Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action, and Community Action Commission of Fayette County.

MORPC recently applied for \$55,579,557 via the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Discretionary Grant Program (CFI Program) round 2. The CFI Program is a competitive grant program created by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to strategically deploy publicly accessible electric vehicle charging and alternative fueling infrastructure in the places people live and work – urban and rural areas alike – in addition to along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors (AFCs). MORPC's proposed project, EV ECO, will focus on Corridor Charging.

If funded, MORPC will lead an effort to build two DC Fast Charging (DCFC) hubs serving medium-and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles (ZEVs), as well as continuing to build out a network of publicly accessible DCFC hubs serving light-duty passenger ZEVs in safe, accessible locations in Central Ohio's urban and rural underserved communities. The combined 13 sites will provide at least 144 additional 150-kW charging ports in locations critical to transit corridors that are within 5 miles of an AFC. The project will be further enhanced by education and engagement opportunities that will garner support from key workforce development partners. This is a collaborative effort with 13 site hosts and partners including Prologis Mobility, Smart Columbus, National Center for Urban Solutions, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Electrification Coalition, Tolles Career & Technical Center, the Rickenbacker Energy Consortium, 11 local governments, public agencies, non-profits, and the private sector.
