EPA CLEAN PROJECT UPDATES



- "Community Led Enhanced Air Quality Network" (CLEAN), co-led my MORPC and Franklin County Public Health
- Collocating (calibrating) 40 PurpleAir sensors against the EPA's monitors to test performance
- Crafting outreach materials and plan
- Assembled a Project Advisory Committee (PAC) of 14 Franklin County professional- and communityleaders
- Engaging the PAC on sensor siting



Franklin County

EPA PAC HEAT MAP

- Responses collected from our Project Advisory Committee between December 2023 and January 2024
- Next steps:
 - MORPC analysis to determine representative sensor placement
 - Working with PAC on outreach to potential site hosts

UPCOMING 2023 END OF SEASON REPORT



- Release date: March 1, coinciding with start of 2024 ozone monitoring season
- 11 Air Quality Alerts issued in the monitoring season
 - PM2.5 was the primary pollutant of concern on 9 of the occasions
- Ozone: Four days with Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups
 Air Quality Index (AQI) levels were observed during the
 ozone forecast season <u>the most recorded since 2016</u>.
- PM2.5: Two days with Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups AQI levels and three days with Unhealthy AQI levels – the first time in 12 years we've seen this category in Columbus.

NEW EPA PM 2.5 STANDARD



- February 7, 2024, the EPA revised the level of the primary (health-based) annual PM2.5 standard to 9.0 micrograms per cubic meter (µg/m3); previously this was 12 µg/m3.
- EPA estimates that the new standard will prevent "an estimated 4,500 premature deaths every year and ultimately yield \$46 billion in net health benefits annually."
- What does this mean for Ohio?
 - Most areas are already in attainment and projected to continue to be in attainment in 2032.
 - Cuyahoga, Hamilton, Montgomery, and Stark Counties are currently in nonattainment but will be given 3 years to reach the new standard.

CPRG PHASE 2 NEXT STEPS



Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) Program | US EPA

Regional leadership selected a combination of ReCES solar on public buildings and LinkUS W. Broad Mobility as the best fit for the region and for this grant opportunity

- CPRG community engagement and earlier engagement efforts show widespread support for transit options and solar on buildings, and for these two project concepts
- LinkUS tackles the largest source of GHG emissions by sector (transportation) and location (Franklin County)
 - With addition of CPRG funds, the W. Broad corridor can become a model of success for future transit corridors in the region – allows inclusion of sidewalks, bike lanes, trails, mobility hubs, bike programs, in addition to an electric vehicle fleet
- ReCES makes large scale solar arrays affordable for libraries, schools, water utilities, and other public buildings
 - CPRG dollars would leverage the Columbus Region Green Fund and make solar more regionally available and scalable

Project Name	Regional Community Energy Strategy (ReCES)
Leading Entities	MORPC, City of Columbus, Columbus Region Green Fund (CRGF), Impact Solar
Approximate Cost	\$37.6 Million – \$77.2 Million

- Fund solar arrays on public buildings & space—schools, libraries, local governments, and water / wastewater treatment plants
- Establish a power purchase agreement (PPA) to reduce the cost of solar installations and lower regional energy usage
- Leverage private sector investment
- 5-year program of either: 8MW, 25MW, or 50MW



Project Name	Central Ohio Food Rescue and Waste Reduction
Leading Entities	City of Columbus, Columbus Public Health, SWACO
Approximate Cost	\$20 million

- Regional composting facility operated by SWACO to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
- Establish and manage 20 new food scrap drop-off sites across Central Ohio for community engagement.
- Enhance food rescue capabilities by providing cold storage for non-profits to capture and distribute rescued food.
- Launch a pilot curbside household composting program in Columbus with potential for scalable replication in other communities.



Project Name	Central Ohio's Solar and Energy Efficient (COSEE) Homes
Leading Entities	MORPC, PICCA, IMPACTCA, LEADS, LFCAA, OHCAC, CRGF, BCAP, HAPCA, Impact Solar

Approximate Cost **\$25.5 Million**

- Increase capacity of existing home weatherization and energy efficiency programs to serve a larger LIDAC population
- Establish a robust solar PPA to provide solar panels at no cost for households at 80% median income or less
- Reduce residential GHG emissions by at least 20% for 2,141 units
- Leverage private sector investment



Project Name	West Broad Mobility
Leading Entities	COTA and City of Columbus
Approximate Cost	\$63 million

The West Broad LinkUS corridor and associated transportation initiatives will provide premium bus rapid transit and first mile/last mile mobility options. Each project has GHG benefits on top of public safety and transportation improvements.
