MORPC SUSTAINABILITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES January 17, 2018 2:30-4:00 p.m.

Welcome & Introductions, *Jim Schimmer, Chair* – The Chair welcomed the group and initiated introductions. He announced that Michelle Crandall and Kate Bartter were reappointed for two more years. Dan Sowry with Ohio EPA and Justin Milam with the City of Upper Arlington were also appointed to serve two-year terms.

New Member Spotlight, *Justin Milam, City of Upper Arlington* – Justin gave a presentation about the great work that Upper Arlington is doing around sustainability (see slides). There are several local projects in place or in development to demonstrate the community's progress toward the Regional Sustainability Agenda goals. In the past, UA participated in the carbon footprint assessment through MORPC which has been used in consideration with building projects. They have pursued LEED eligibility for several buildings. UA participated in the AEP Community Energy Savers program which resulted in funding to install energy efficient lighting at a local park. UA also permits solar on buildings. They are considering a CNG station and considering more EV charging stations with two currently in place. There was some discussion around the new waste and recycling program in UA and but UA expects to maintain about the same level of waste diversion.

Sustainable2050 Update and Next Steps, Amelia Costanzo, Planning & Environment, MORPC – MORPC has begun working through the pilot phase to figure out the Sustainable2050 processes involved with ranking communities and recertification, identifying common goals, and understanding the fiscal and time constraints. The program is meant to be a service rather than a burden to communities. Amelia encouraged the group to share any tools or resources that may benefit the local governments in the program. William encouraged the SAC members to help reach out and convince other communities to join Sustainable2050.

Policy Update, Joe Garrity, Public and Government Affairs, MORPC – MORPC submitted comments in opposition to HB 114 which attempts to weaken energy efficiency and renewable energy standards, turning them into voluntary goals. The Senate leadership is working on a compromise bill with Kasich to send to the House. A wind energy bill introduced by Senator Dolan may move this year, which addresses setback requirements. MORPC is also working with the Trails Caucus and partners on a Senate Resolution that would make 2018 the Year of Trails.

Working Group Reports - (see attached report)

• Water Resources Working Group, Glenn Marzluff – At the last meeting, Franklin Soil and Water Conservation District presented about efforts they are leading, called Be the Change for Water. The Nature Conservancy also presented on an invasive species program that has been successful elsewhere and they are trying to bring it to Central Ohio.

- Energy & Air Quality Working Group, Dale Arnold- At the last meeting we heard from Clean Fuels Ohio on vehicle and fleet infrastructure which dovetails into the Smart Columbus initiative. The working group is also following the lead of the Water Resources Working Group and undergoing a reorganization over the next few months. More updates will be shared on this process at future meetings.
- Central Ohio Greenways Board, Tony Collins The Board adopted four county plans for trail connections and there are five altogether. They also adopted the new trail signage guidelines presented to the SAC in a previous meeting. The COG continues to look for new members as well as private partners who can help fund their efforts. There was a question about how the trails are cleared, and Tony said that they can't mandate how communities do this but can offer ways to do it. The City of Columbus and Metro Parks have a partnership to keep trails clear. Kate also provided an update about an OSU event addressing the greenway trail between OSU campus and downtown.

Summit on Sustainability, *Kerstin Carr, Planning & Environment, Christina O'Keeffe, Energy & Air Quality, MORPC* - The Summit was a sold out event with more than 500 in attendance. We had record fundraising and sponsorships to support the event and more member attendance than any other Summit event. The morning plenary session was a hit. Julie Sweetland delivered the keynote followed by a panel of experts engaged in sustainability at the federal level. The lunch program included the Sustainable2050 launch, Green Region Awards, and Pecha Kucha style presentations. Mayor Compton provided tree saplings as a way to recognize each of the Sustainable2050 members.

- Awards are great for sharing recognition and awareness of regional efforts.

- Reach out further for speakers from other cities or countries.
- Record breakout sessions and make them available on the website since you can't attend every one.
- Figure out how to broaden the attendance, address those who are not represented.
- Consider extending the length of the event in the future and finding a larger space if attendance grows from the 2017 event.

Zoning Code

- Requires new sidewalks/shared use paths and bike racks for all development;
- Includes maximum parking requirements (except for Lane Avenue) and maximum development cover; and
- Permits solar panels on all conforming buildings.

- Complete Streets policy since 2014;
- New trash service goes into effect on February 5th and includes larger recycling bins (no more trash stickers!);
- 61% of total collected waste is recycled. 47% of household waste is recycled;
- Sidewalk Connection Program in 2017;
- All traffic signals (51) and pedestrian crossing signals (234) were converted in 2011 from incandescent to LED; and
- All street lights will be converted from induction (which were incandescent) to LED in 2018.



- Efficient lighting and timing/sensors installed in all City buildings several years ago;
- Host several e-waste drop-offs per year;
- Top 7 in 2016-17 Mayor's Challenge for Water Conservation;
- Partnered with Marble Cliff to connect Scioto Trail;

- Traffic island beautification program called Bright Spots;

- Working with JadeTrack to better monitor and track energy data; and
- UAHS seniors working on proposed native species and bee ordinances.

MORPC Sustainability Advisory Committee Working Group Report January 17, 2018



Central Ohio Greenways Board (Chair: Tony Collins) Next meeting: January 24, 2018

A Central Ohio Greenways Board meeting was held on Wednesday, November 29, 2017. The Board adopted the Delaware County Trail Corridor Plan and presentations were given related to funding sources. In addition, the board

discussed the opportunity to hold a Board Retreat which is scheduled for February.

In 2018 the Board will focus on developing a fundraising campaign and making the first ask to a corporate donor. The Board will also finalize the Communications & Design Guidelines and Trail **Development Guidelines.**



Energy & Air Quality Working Group (Chair: Dale Arnold) Next meeting: January 23, 2018

The Energy and Air Quality Working Group met on November 28th and the next meeting is on January 23rd. In November, the working group heard a featured presentation on Clean

Fuels Ohio's Drive Electric Ohio and other initiatives. The working group also discussed implementation of a process to refocus and refresh the working group. At the next meeting, the working group will focus on implementing a process similar to one used by the Water Resources Working Group in order to develop working group goals that align with regional sustainability goals, and increase the group's membership, networking opportunities and advisory capacity. The group will also provide input for a comment letter to address the Ohio EPA's draft VW Mitigation Plan as MORPC's Energy & Air Quality Department begins to play a more active role in electric vehicle planning.

Greenways Water Quality



Water Resources Working Group (Chair: Glenn Marzluf) Next meeting: January 25, 2018

The Water Resources Working Group (WRWG) last met in November of 2017. The group heard a presentation on the Be The Change For Clean Water effort undertaken by Franklin and

Delaware Soil & Water Conservation Districts (SWCD). The WRWG will work with Franklin and Delaware SWCDs in the future to provide input on regional water quality messaging as related to the project. The group additionally heard a presentation from The Nature Conservancy on a project currently under development: Central Ohio Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISM). MORPC team members will serve on the steering committee, and the project will come back to the WRWG for input/presentations regularly. The WRWG is scheduled to meet again January 25th, where the group will discuss priorities for 2018. The Data and Sustaining Scioto subcommittees are scheduled to meet in the first quarter of 2018.



Sustainable2050

Next meeting: April 11, 2018; 9:30am at MORPC

After the official launch of Sustainable2050 at the Summit in November, the MORPC team has been working with the six Pilot Communities to fine tune the Sustainable2050 Program. Working one-on-one with this small group of communities and organizations, the MORPC team will learn the best processes, tools, and resources to provide this technical assistance program to members. They will test the tier certification process: Is your community a Bronze, Silver, Gold, or Platinum Sustainable2050 Community? They will assess which tools and resources are most useful to the Sustainable2050 members, and identify which ones exist or need to be developed. This includes understanding how best to collect data and track progress of communities toward their sustainability goals. The team will also get a clear estimate of the costs and benefits of membership to both the Sustainable2050 Communities and MORPC as an agency. The Pilot Period will end in spring 2018, at which time the MORPC team will share the findings with the Sustainability Advisory Committee and Sustainable2050 Members, adjust the program as necessary, and then fully unroll the Program.

The Sustainable2050 Communities and interested communities met on January 10th to review their tier certification worksheets, hear a special Sustainable2050 Community Showcase presentation by the City of Pataskala, and learn how they can utilize existing sustainability programs to reach their residents and businesses such as Green Spot at The Mayor's Challenge.
