INTRODUCTION TO 2020-2050 COLUMBUS AREA METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN


As the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the metropolitan Columbus area, the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) conducts a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process. Every four years, the results of the process produce a Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) that looks at least 20 years into the future.

The plan provides the basis for how federal transportation funding is spent to improve highways, transit, freight, bikeways, and pedestrian facilities.

As our region continues to grow and funding availability becomes more limited, Central Ohio must be prepared with innovative transportation solutions to address increasing infrastructure needs. The MTP is a long-range planning document that brings together local governments from around Central Ohio and other local, state, and federal agencies to identify and coordinate transportation goals and policies over the next three decades.

The MTP will identify transportation needs, strategies and projects, and provide the basis for how federal transportation funding will be spent to improve highways, transit, freight, bikeways, and pedestrian facilities.

The current MTP planning area includes: Franklin and Delaware and Franklin counties; Bloom and Violet townships in Fairfield County; New Albany, Pataskala and Etna Township in Licking County; and Jerome Township in Union County.




Planning for the 2020-2050 MTP is guided by federal legislation, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. The federal legislation sets a framework for the MTP to:

- Reflect a balance between regulations and state and local plans
- Involve a comprehensive, coordinated, continuous planning process
- Be performance-driven, outcome-based
- Consider all modes of transportation
- Address environmental mitigation
- Result in a fiscally balanced plan
- Meet air quality conformity
- Avoid negatively impacting transportation-disadvantaged populations
- Be accomplished through an open and transparent public process
