Regional Policy Roundtable

October 29, 2019 was the Regional Policy Roundtable's last meeting of the year. Members received an update from COTA on their recently completed strategic plan. Mayor Kim Maggard presided over her last meeting as chair of the Roundtable. MORPC will provide tentative dates for 2020 in November and will continue to keep members informed of bills at the Statehouse and in Washington.

House Bill 288

MORPC is meeting with legislators at the statehouse who serve on the House Civil Justice Committee regarding House Bill 288 (HB288) prohibiting the use of eminent domain for the purpose of providing a recreational trail. HB288 is not in alignment with MORPC's Public Policy Agenda. It infringes on a local government's and park district's ability to exercise home rule power. Without the ability to utilize eminent domain, local governments and park districts would not be able to connect gaps that are essential to connecting regional trails, such as our Central Ohio Greenways network.

Legislators plan to offer amended language that would only impact park districts where they can still use eminent domain. Currently a property owner can reach out to a probate judge to request a veto of the park districts eminent domain. The language would add two more veto opportunities with the addition of city council and township trustees. If you are interested in providing opponent testimony to the committee, MORPC will share the draft language.

State Capital Budget

Team Members are working closely with regional partners and local government members to ensure they submitted state capital budget questionnaire applications to the Columbus Partnership. MORPC is giving support and input into the review process of capital projects to be recommended to the State Legislature. MORPC will continue to keep members apprised of future state capital budget deadlines and assist in project applications.

The results of the third quarter of the diversity metrics on staff demographics and procurement were compiled and will be distributed to senior leadership. The 2019-2020 Diversity & Inclusion Work Plan was finalized.

Summit on Sustainability

MORPC hosted the Summit on Sustainability on Friday, October 11, 2019 at the Hilton Columbus Downtown. The conference had over 550 people in attendance. The theme, Shaping Resilient Communities, looked at how a growing region, can be sustainable while being inclusive, providing needed amenities, and serving as a good steward of the environment.

Parts of the discussion at OU included cooperative partnerships with our Planning & Sustainability Team by engaging subject matter experts, aligning potential studio work, capstone projects and internships for students.

Transportation & Infrastructure Development

Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)

Team Members are working to develop quantitative project level data for the purpose of applying adopted evaluation criteria. This will allow Team Members to review each candidate MTP project to determine which projects will best help advance regional goals and objectives.

To determine which projects are cost feasible, Team Members are developing cost estimates for each project. Expected revenues available for transportation through 2050 are also being forecasted. Project evaluation and fiscal balance analysis are key determinants in creating the draft list of projects to be included in the MTP. Team Members are working to develop the draft project list and make it available for public comment in November.

Transit, Mobility & Human Services

Throughout September and October MORPC Team Members have been working with 5310 subrecipients on any invoicing issues they may have had. Team Members will continue to assist these stakeholders through the reimbursement process as needed. The 5310 application for next cycle will be ready for upload to the Transit section of MORPC's website in early November.

MORPC Team Members scheduled a December informational meeting regarding the 5310 application process and will be working with DCTB to schedule a similar meeting in Delaware County.

Gohio

Gohio Team Members and the CoGo Bike Share Advisory Group discussed the bike share's ridership and use of stations installed in the last year. The group discussed the coming electric bikes and potential locations for new stations. CoGo Bike Share and Lyft TDM campaigns were also discussed in relation to the Commuter Challenge and other partnership opportunities.

Gohio Team Members and the Central Ohio Mode Shift Coalition discussed a new strategy for regional outreach and education for sustainable transportation. The concept includes experiential based programming, tactical urbanism demonstrations, and opportunities for public participation. The group also discussed COTA's Mobility Innovation Test and the Mobility Hubs coming late winter/early spring.

Gohio Team Members reviewed past Commuter Challenges to understand how to improve the program for the future. This information was also reviewed by external partners. Next steps are to have a 2020 Strategizing meeting with external partners to collaborate on innovative TDM campaigns for the coming year.

Rapid Speed Transportation Initiative (RSTI)

The Environmental Impact Study (EIS Study) consultant completed passenger rail components of the environmental work, including the existing conditions report, passenger rail route alternatives report, and draft purpose and need statement for the passenger rail project. MORPC completed public officials debrief meetings in Lima, Marysville, Kenton and Dublin, between October 7 and October 28. Technical staff debriefs for Smart Columbus and City of Columbus staff will take place in November.

MORPC, the Hyperloop Feasibility Study consultant and Virgin Hyperloop One reached an agreement on the study's economic demand analysis methodology and incorporating revisions to the final reports. The feasibility study was included in the public officials debriefs and the study's key findings were also presented at the Ohio Transportation Engineers Conference (OTEC) on October 30.

Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO)

Governor Mike DeWine officially designated CORPO as Ohio's sixth Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) on October 9. CORPO and ODOT completed seven CORPO Subcommittee/ODOT Rural Consultation meetings. This is an important first step in the RTIP process.

CORPO staff participated in an informational meeting hosted by First Knox Bank and Knox County on October 22. This meeting updated stakeholders in Knox County on the efforts, projects, and milestones reached by Smart Columbus.

MORPC Attributable Funding

The Attributable Funding Committee (AFC) is currently evaluating policy changes and improvements. The committee will consider draft text changes in November, with a goal of finalizing the policies by mid-winter. The next attributable funding round is expected to open at the end of spring 2020.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

The Public Works Integrating Committee's (PWIC) will review and discuss the 31 applications received at the next meeting on November 15

Natural Resources Assistance Council (NRAC)

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund application materials for communities in Franklin County (District 3) are posted on MORPC's website. Preliminary screening applications are due December 13, 2019 and final applications are due March 20, 2020. Awards for the approximately \$3.8 million in funding will be announced April 23, 2020.

Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

In order to advance identified CAP priorities, MORPC has launched an Innovative Funding Strategies Development Activity with Ice Miller LLP. Six primary projects, along with several secondary projects, have been selected to participate in a series of workshops and develop financing strategies. The selected projects are listed below by their workshop and project type:

Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC)

The Data Policy Needs Survey & Toolkit Working Group met twice in October to work on the development of the Data Policy Needs Survey and the Survey Mailing List. The next meeting is October 30.

The Regional Data User Group Working Group met October 22 to discuss the future User Group, focusing on candidates, outreach, meeting format, and a final name. The Group meets again November 21.

The Regional Municipal Fiber Strategy Working Group met October 9 to prepare for a presentation to the Central Ohio Mayors and Managers Association (COMMA) on November 1. The group meets again November 8.

The Sustainability Dashboard Working Group met October 8 for a demonstration of the Sustainability Dashboard which was updated in preparation for the Summit on Sustainability. The Working Group also discussed metrics used in the 2018 Sustainability Report Card and meets again November 5.

Smart Region Task Force

The Smart Region Task Force will meet on November 12. Team Members continue to work on the Smart Region Playbook and the Smart Region Resource Guide, the Task Force's final two deliverables.

Transportation

MORPC participated in an update call on the Transportation Energy Analytics Dashboard (TEAD). TEAD is funded through the U.S. Department of Energy and is being developed in partnership with the National Renewable Energy Laboratory and the University of Maryland's Center for Advanced Transportation Technology Laboratory.

Data and Mapping Outreach and Collaboration

The 2020 Population Estimates were presented to and approved by the Commission on October 10.

For the 2020 Census, the Local Government Subcommittee of the Complete Count Committee met October 2 to discuss a presentation for the Central Ohio Mayors and Managers Association (COMMA) on December 6. Subcommittee members also identified talking points for local governments and the use of social media and Census materials for outreach. The Subcommittee meets again November 7.

MORPC is working with the Ohio Census Advocacy Coalition (OCAC) on outreach to encourage full participation in the 2020 Census, with a focus on historically "hard-to-count" populations.

The Smart Columbus Operating System Charter Team and MORPC Team Members held a joint workshop on October 3. The workshop helped Smart Columbus understand data needs and problems faced by local municipalities. The purpose of the workshop was to explore the uses and value of the Smart Columbus Operating System as a regional data platform for public sector agencies in Central Ohio.

Data and Mapping Team Members partnered with ULI to host a two-hour Development Dashboard Use Case Workshop on October 23. The goal of the new dashboard is to gather more timely and complete information on individual development projects, and to better understand larger development trends in the region.

Team Members are working on the Alliance for the American Dream grant from Schmidt Futures. The Alliance for the American Dream is a project designed to reduce inequality and relieve poverty in the United States. There are approximately ten organizations competing for \$25,000 - \$1,000,000 in grants. MORPC Team Members completed the first-round competition on October 19.

Planning & Sustainability

Active Transportation Working Group (ATWG)

Team Members secured a free Active Transportation Academy workshop through the Ohio Local Technical Assistance Program (LTAP) that will be hosted at MORPC on December 10. The workshop will cover the topic of “Creating a Vision Zero Action Plan” Interested participants must register in advance through this link: <https://www.eventbrite.com/e/77032764071>.

The final Active Transportation Working Group meeting for 2019 was October 24. Team Members provided updates to the working group on upcoming training opportunities, the Regional Complete Streets Policy update, the Central Ohio Transportation Safety Plan, and the current status of the MTP – all as they relate to active transportation and how the group can be engaged. The City of Worthington also presented to the group on the development of their recently adopted Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan.

The short duration counts for the trail count monitoring program were completed at the end of September/early October. The data collected from the short duration counts will be used to factor into the annual trail usage data for 2019.

Team Members reviewed Complete Streets initial design documents for the Agler Road bridge project and the feasibility report and proposed alternatives for the Cassady Avenue widening project. Recommendations were made for consideration of minor improvements that would enhance the complete streets elements of each project.

A steering committee is being established for an update to the Regional Complete Streets Policy and the first meeting is November 13.

insight2050

Team Members presented the results of Corridor Concepts to about 40 attendees of the October WTS luncheon.

The fall insight2050 academy was postponed to spring 2020 and will coincide with the roll-out of the Regional Housing Strategy. A half-day housing and insight2050 workshop will take place on Tuesday, December 10. More details and a link to register will be provided in early November.

The Technical Assistance Program (TA Program) received six applications from five MORPC member communities. MORPC Team Members presented the application scoring criteria to the evaluation committee of nine regional stakeholders from ODOT, OSU, COTA, ODH, and MORPC. The evaluation committee will complete their review next month. MORPC Team Members continue to prepare for TA Program projects to begin in January by coordinating with interdepartmental staff to create report and map templates.

MORPC released a community housing survey designed to gain insights from residents and service providers to help inform the regional landscape scan of existing housing conditions. The survey remains open through November 8.

Project sponsors received a progress report and preview of the next in-person meeting taking place in November. The progress report was shared via a webinar and conference call on October 23. The timeline for this project was modified; a report roll-out originally slated for April will now occur in June, allowing for a more comprehensive review of the local and national housing landscape and more time for input from and engagement with project sponsors,

advisors, and the community. The modified timeline will also allow us to expand on a comprehensive process for local housing action agendas.

Transportation Safety

Team Members met with partners, including the Franklin County Safe Communities Coalition and the MORPC Active Transportation Working Group, to discuss and receive feedback on the implementation of the safety plan. The MORPC Team is working to initiate key action items identified in the plan for short-term implementation.

The City of Gahanna passed a resolution recognizing September as Safe Driving Awareness month. This action is in line with the initiative promoted by MORPC encouraging other communities to adopt similar resolutions, as well as local ordinances prohibiting distracted driving.

Greenways & Water Resources Program

The Central Ohio Greenways (COG) Board met October 23rd to review and advise on Greenways working group activities including:

- COG Trail Development Working Group: The trail development working group has finalized the Greenway Prioritization project scope. The Greenway Prioritization project will rank trail and trail access projects across Franklin County. The project's primary funding partners will be City of Columbus Public Service and Franklin County Engineers, and the project will officially kick off in early November. The group is also collaborating with Metro Parks, City of Westerville, City of Worthington, and City of Columbus to submit an application to JP Morgan Chase's Advancing Cities Grant Program to fund a trail project near the Chase campus on Sancus Road.
- COG Partnership Working Group: The partnership group is working to acquire funding for an "Impacts of Trails" study to look at the benefits of trails on the economy, health, equity, and environment. The group also began work on a Trail Funding Resource Guide to help local governments identify appropriate funding strategies for their trail efforts.
- COG Marketing Working Group: The marketing group is developing a "Taste of the Trails" event strategy aimed to activate trail heads along trails and invite people of all backgrounds to experience the trails. The group is also beginning to develop a scope of service for a "Trails2Health" initiative aimed at partnering with the four major health networks in Central Ohio to encourage more use of trails to promote wellness.
- COG Operations and Access Working Group: The operations group asked for guidance from the board on developing a tactical urbanism program that tests urban greenway trail infrastructure. The board was supportive of developing the concept further.

Sustainable2050

MORPC Team Members continue to meet with Sustainable2050 members to work through the Tier Status certification process. A modified Tier Status workbook, which facilitates the certification process for non-government members, was provided to associate members.

Energy & Air Quality

Air Quality Team Members are working with marketing consultants to finish the Green Giveaway incentive campaign to award the contest prize. Team Members worked with Smart Columbus to help develop their program concept beyond 2020, after the current round of funding.

To support the low-cost air quality monitoring subcommittee, Air Quality Team Members are preparing documentation of low-cost air quality monitoring program strategies and best practices based on successful programs in other regions.

MORPC is currently preparing for the Local Government Energy Partnership (LGEP) Benchmarking Participant Workshop on December 3. This workshop will include additional training as well as one-on-one assistance between the utilities and members.

The LGEP Progress Report was submitted to AEP Ohio. All deliverables were met and program delivery continues through 2020.

The Federal Highway Administration AFC Deployment Plan proposal did not receive funding. There will be an attempt to secure alternative funding for this project.

Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC)

Team Members began the process for MORPC to work toward Sustainable2050 tier status certification and invited members of the SAC to provide additional verification to demonstrate that we are following a process consistent with the other certified members. The goal is to document relevant activities and submit the tier status workbook for consideration at the December 18 Sustainability Advisory Committee meeting.

The MORPC Team worked with CURA at OSU to develop a Summit breakout session focused on the value of data and measuring progress toward sustainability goals. The sustainability dashboard was also featured as an example of regional efforts to provide better access to information. The Sustainability Dashboard Working Group, made up of members from the Sustainability Advisory Committee and the Regional Data Advisory Committee, continues to meet on a monthly basis to inform the development of the dashboard. While CURA has been working on the dashboard development and user interface, MORPC has been working to identify the appropriate metrics and data sources.

Residential Services

Housing

The COCIC program has three homes completed and five more in contract. In the Milo Grogan Area, eleven new projects are in contract or construction. Four projects are complete with all others in some phase of production.

Marketing & Outreach / Intake

October 8 was the Weatherization Showcase. Approximately 60-70 people were in attendance including a PUCO Commissioner.

The MORPC Intake Team began a 10-day consultation process with two outside Consultants that focus on process improvement within the intake team, improved customer service, and dealing with change. Recommendations for additional change within the intake team are forthcoming from both consultants.

WarmChoice

MORPC's website application tracking was added to the IMS system. This will allow better reporting as to the amount of traffic coming in directly from MORPC.org. Team Members are exploring an alternate path for intake structure in the system.

Residential Services Team Members gave a presentation to Columbus City Code Enforcement. Columbus is excited about partnering with MORPC as a resource to help remedy code violation and red-tagged appliances. Production is increasing – currently 356 inspections and 342 completions. Team Members have met with, and/or spoken to, the contractors to alert them that

there will be a drastic increase in workload in the coming months. Some of the larger companies are being asked to explore the possibility of adding additional crews so that jobs do not stack and instead get completed simultaneously.

HWAP production is steady and ahead of goals.

AEP/EPP production goals are on pace; EPP goals are currently behind.

The CAP60 program is currently being reviewed for future viability within the department.

Chair Rory McGuinness called the Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to order at 2:10 p.m.

Metropolitan Planning Organization Report

- **Transportation & Infrastructure Development – Thea Walsh, MORPC Transportation & Infrastructure Development Director**

Thea Walsh reported the Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) shared their draft list yesterday and made the following funding recommendations:

- Delaware Point Project - \$8 million
- I-71/Stringtown Road - \$10 million
- Far East Freeway Phase 1 - \$74.5 million
- 33/161/Post Road - \$4.25 million
- Thornwood Area in Licking County - \$3 million

- **Planning & Sustainability – Kerstin Carr, MORPC Planning & Sustainability Director**

Kerstin Carr reported MORPC is getting ready to review the Complete Streets Policy adopted in 2010. Back then, our policy was a leading policy in the country and many other regions have adopted policies with similar language since then. That said, many design guidelines are evolving, and it is time to review our policy to add items such as green streets/green infrastructure. The review will begin in November and be complete by spring 2020.

- **Data & Mapping – Aaron Schill, MORPC Data & Mapping Director**

Aaron Schill reported MORPC is still targeting October for the Paving the Way launch. Team Members are working behind the scenes populating projects and inputting users in the system. MORPC hosted five training courses over the last few weeks for staff and consultants. Team Members developed online training resources. Mr. Schill asked each community to identify a primary contact person and send the information via email to pavingtheway@morpc.org.

Census outreach activities are ramping up. Presentations have been made to the League of Women Voters, Gahanna City Council, and Ohio Mayors & Managers. Let Mr. Schill know if you would like a presentation in your community. Behind the scenes work includes updating programs that have been built since last year and collecting building information to get to the Census Bureau.

Transportation Policy Committee Consent Agenda

2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update – Thea Walsh, MORPC Transportation & Infrastructure Director

Meeting Called to Order – Rory McGuiness (City of Columbus), MORPC Chair

Chair Rory McGuiness called the Commission meeting to order at 1:32 p.m. followed by the pledge of allegiance. Chair McGuiness congratulated Chris Harkness on the birth of his fifth child.

Eileen Leuby introduced guests: Joe Bengoeche and Ryan Griffin from the Ohio Department of Veterans Services, and Andy Harman from One Columbus.

One MORPC One Voice: Ohio Department of Veterans Services – Debbie Ashenhurst, Director of the Ohio Department of Veterans Services

General Ashenhurst shared that Central Ohio represents almost 140,000 veterans. There are 800,000 veterans in Ohio. It is important to know who your veterans are. They bring in over a billion dollars to the state. Every veteran that registers with the Veterans Administration brings in a couple thousand dollars. This money goes to infrastructure in the State of Ohio. General Ashenhurst urged members to encourage the veterans in their communities to register at their Veteran County Service Office.

The Ohio Department of Veterans Services has a Workforce Team that will work with companies that want to hire veterans. The Team helps businesses reach, understand and retain veterans. Veterans are great employees – they are loyal, disciplined, on time, have a great work ethic, etc. There are two veterans homes in Ohio for those beyond the help of their families.

The Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame recognizes veterans that continue to serve in their community and the state. Up to 20 veterans are inducted each year. To nominate a veteran in your community, visit OhioVets.gov.

If you can think of something to make Ohio more attractive to bring veterans back to Ohio, reach out and let General Ashenhurst know.

Community Leader Spotlight: One Columbus – Kenny McDonald, One Columbus President and Chief Executive Officer

Kenny McDonald thanked MORPC. It has been 10 years since he moved to Columbus and started Columbus 2020. MORPC was instrumental in getting Columbus 2020 started, which is in a good position going into the next decade. Columbus 2020 is focused on growth and moving forward. It took an enormous amount of cooperation in Central Ohio to get here.

Mr. McDonald provided copies of the [One Columbus Strategy](#). The vision of One Columbus is to be the most prosperous region in the United States. We have a unique ability to attain that goal not only economically but moving forward with social factors as well. To reach that vision, Central Ohio needs to do four things over the next decade:

1. Sustain our economic momentum
2. Develop, inspire and attract a talented, adaptive and diverse workforce
3. Enable the innovation capacity
4. Increase global identify and connectivity

Page 22 of the strategy presents the plan. It is important to take care of the businesses we currently have. We brought in 20 or 30 new employers each year over the last decade. One Columbus is predicting 10-15 percent more work over the next decade. The last decade was the greatest period of economic growth in the region's history.

Mr. McDonald expressed his desire to speak to as many members individually as possible. Email Mr. McDonald to set-up a meeting.

Mr. McDonald was asked if One Columbus is addressing the economic equality/equal housing issue. One Columbus has a powerful platform to talk about why we win and lose. A lot of our

clients are now asking about our future capacity. One Columbus provides a client perspective and can be the voice for the market. Great people are working on these problems. Talking about them from an economic development view helps move the conversation forward.

Executive Director's Report – William Murdock, MORPC Executive Director

William Murdock thanked the speakers. One Columbus and MORPC are hand in hand on many issues. MORPC would not be as effective without their partnership. Mr. Murdock appreciates what General Ashenurst is doing for veterans across the state. Veterans are part of MORPC's diversity and inclusion strategy.

MORPC's Diversity & Inclusion Strategy was finalized last week. The plan will be posted on MORPC's website next week. The work force recommendations were incorporated in the plan.

Mr. Murdock congratulated Historic Downtown Delaware, the German Village and the Short North for being recognized as Great Places in America by the American Planning Association (APA).

MORPC was recognized at the Ohio APA Conference for insight2050 corridor concepts.

MORPC continues to push transportation safety efforts and needs members' help in getting hands-free legislation enacted.

The annual Return on Investment (ROI) information is being sent soon. This information was fine tuned to reflect the appropriate percentage of value each member receives on their eligible benefits. The new calculation is a more accurate and comprehensive approach to show MORPC members the value for their membership.

October is Energy Awareness Month. MORPC offers energy efficiency services in Franklin County. Our Local Government Energy Partnership is available to MORPC members and offers free energy benchmarking tools to help monitor real time energy usage and look for ways to reduce cost and be more sustainable.

Fifty-six people attended this year's Weatherization Showcase. Each year one of MORPC's weatherization clients hosts the event that showcases real people and real stories. MORPC Team Members led tours through the client's home showing the energy efficiency upgrades made to the home.

Applications to request local government interns were released this month. MORPC's Local Government Summer Intern Program matches students who want to work in government with the needs of our local governments. It is a low-cost, high-impact program.

MORPC is hosting an Access Ohio Public Meeting on Tuesday, October 22.

Cities Better Lived is a short film series celebrating Columbus Design Week. MORPC partnered with planning professionals for the special film night on Monday, October 28. The event includes a reception, viewing of several 5- to 10-minute films, and a panel discussion featuring Kerstin Carr. Registration is required for the free event.

The Regional Collaboration Meeting for the Southeast Area is December 3, 9-10:30 a.m. at the Wigwam Conference Room in Violet Township.

Five hundred, sixty-five people are registered for the October 11 Summit on Sustainability. This year's theme is resiliency.

Mr. Murdock recognized Bernice Cage who is about to retire after 31 years at MORPC. Ms. Cage began working for MORPC when Bill Habig was director and worked with many of the attendees present through the years. Ms. Cage shared she is most proud that her work made a difference in Central Ohio. On behalf of the Commission, Chair McGuiness thanked Ms. Cage for her service to the region.

Proposed Resolution 16-19: "Establishing population estimates as a basis for 2020 annual participation fees to be assessed members" – Aaron Schill, MORPC Data & Mapping Director

Aaron Schill noted highlights from the 2020 population estimates. There are almost 2 million people in MORPC member communities. There are about 2.41 million people in MORPC's 15-county region. The 2019-2020 growth was a little slower than 2018-2019. Last year's estimate was slightly high. It is better to look at trends rather than year to year. Looking at the last three to five years, the region is still experiencing strong growth. The City of Columbus is the largest member city with 915,000. The City of Dublin is the second largest with over 50,000. The Cities of Delaware and Westerville are both over 40,000 and each will gain an additional representative on the Commission. MORPC is now gathering detailed information for the several counties that joined the Commission this year.

Kim Maggard made a motion to approve Resolution 16-19, a second was made; motion passed.

Chair McGuiness welcomed new Upper Arlington City Manager Steve Schoeny.

Chair McGuiness called the Transportation Policy Committee Session to order at 2:10 p.m. The session adjourned at 2:22 p.m. Separate minutes are attached.

Sustainability Advisory Committee – Mike Compton (City of Pataskala), Sustainability Advisory Committee Vice Chair

Mike Compton presented the [Sustainability Advisory Committee Report](#). In September the Sustainability Advisory Committee approved a proposal to restructure the Water Resources Working Group to the Sustaining Scioto Board. The restructure reflects the focus on the Sustaining Scioto Adaptive Management Plan which identified short-term and long-term strategies. One of the short-term strategies was to create a formal leadership body, similar to the Central Ohio Greenways Board. The new board will kick-off in January. Let Rachael Beeman (MORPC Team Lead) or Brandi Whetstone (MORPC Sustainability Officer) know if you are interested in serving on the board.

Mike Compton and Kerstin Carr recognized the City of Worthington for being certified as Platinum for Sustainable2050. Tier Status is determined by a combination of completing three mandatory activities, completion of one or more eligible activities, and carrying out the eligible activities across one or more categories.

Regional Policy Roundtable – Kim Maggard (City of Whitehall), Regional Policy Roundtable Chair

Kim Maggard presented the [Regional Policy Roundtable Update](#). The Regional Policy Roundtable held a special meeting regarding HB 163 which creates a process for withholding local government funds from municipalities. Steve Tugend and Andy Shifflette from Kegler Brown Hill + Ritter provided insight and the possible economic impact on the region. MORPC will not take a stance on the bill but will continue to monitor it. The next Regional Policy Roundtable meeting is October 29 at MORPC.

SUBJECT: Proposed Resolution 17-19: **“Revising established population estimates as a basis for 2020 annual participation fees to be assessed members”**

The attached resolution provides a revision to the population estimates for January 1, 2020, previously adopted by Resolution 16-19, for the purpose of assessing participation fees from member jurisdictions.

On October 22, 2019, MORPC’s population estimate for Knox County was called into question, which prompted a thorough review of the estimate for that member, as is done whenever a member estimate is questioned. Upon identifying an error in the calculation of Knox County’s estimate, all other member estimates were also reviewed and errors for Hocking and Logan Counties were also identified. After confirming the accuracy of the source data and identifying and correcting the calculation errors, revisions were made to the 2020 population estimates, attached to Resolution 17-19 as “2020 Population Estimates and Dues Assessment of MORPC Members (Revised).”

The following text from the Resolution 16-19 memo is provided for reference:

Six new members (City of Bellefontaine, Fairfield County, Logan County, Morrow County, Truro Township, Washington Township [Delaware, Franklin, and Union counties]) were added to MORPC in 2019. The member participation fees (“dues”) are calculated using the rates adopted in Resolution 10-19.

Included with the proposed resolution is a detailed list of the 2020 population estimates, member dues, and Commission representation for each MORPC member. Dues and Commission representation information from the prior year and population information for the past two years are included for each member in the detailed list for reference.

After consultation with the Delaware County Regional Planning Commission, MORPC decided to use that organization’s population estimates for all MORPC member communities located entirely within Delaware County.

WHEREAS, the population estimate for each MORPC member jurisdiction was reviewed and no other errors were identified, and representatives of the three affected counties have been notified in advance; and

WHEREAS, Attachment 1 sets forth the revised population and dues assessments for MORPC members; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

- Section 1. That this resolution updates and replaces resolution 16-19, passed on October 10, 2019.
- Section 2. That the revised January 1, 2020 population estimates, as documented in the Attachment, are hereby adopted for the purpose of assessing 2020 participation fees, as listed in the Attachment.
- Section 3. That the executive director is authorized to take such other action and execute and deliver such other documents as, acting with the advice of legal counsel, he shall deem necessary and appropriate to carry out the intent of this resolution.
- Section 4. That this Commission finds and determines that all formal deliberations and actions of this Commission concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were taken in open meetings of this Commission.
