### **I. Welcome & Introductions**

- Chair Young called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. There was a quorum present.

### **II. Approval of February 1, 2023, Meeting Minutes**

- Chair Young asked for a motion to approve the February 1, 2023 meeting minutes. Mr. Nittle moved; Ms. Schamp seconded; and the motion passed.

### **III. Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Report** – Maria Schaper, MORPC

- Ms. Schaper provided an update from Delaware County Transit. They are launching a strategic plan RFP for solicitation on March 6, 2023. The proposal period will close on April 4, 2023. They are also purchasing four used buses from COTA via Share Mobility. Ridership is up over 25% compared to January 2022. They serviced about 8,200 trips. They continue to review internal policies and industry best practices, ensuring they are positioned well to service the continued growth in the region.

- MORPC convened the first Franklin County Mobility Advisory Committee, and they began to revise strategies for Franklin County's coordinated plan and established a monthly meeting schedule.
- Ms. Schaper stated there were five RAISE grant applications submitted by the due date of February 28, 2023. Awarded grants are expected to be announced by the U.S. DOT in June 2023. Four grant applications were submitted from the MPO region and one from Licking County.

#### **IV. Funding Programs**

- **Attributable Funds Project Status Update – Thomas Graham, MORPC**
  - Mr. Graham presented the project status updates for the Attributable Funds Commitments for State Fiscal Year 2023.
  - The right-away commitments for East Broad Street and Cassidy Avenue have been encumbered. A portion of the funding for the Delaware Point Project has been encumbered. There will be more funds encumbered as the project progresses. All projects are moving forward.
- **Proposed Resolution T-2-23: "Adopting MORPC Attributable Funding Commitments" – Thomas Graham, MORPC**
  - Mr. Graham stated the funding recommendations were made available for public review and comment from January 6, 2023, to February 8, 2023. MORPC received a total of 39 comments from the public via email during this time. Staff felt these comments did not necessitate any adjustments to the funding recommendations.
  - Mr. Graham stated there was one request from an applicant to move \$2 million from the Ferris Road project to the Alum Creek Drive project as a result of a federal earmark that was allocated towards the Ferris Road project. Mr. Graham stated he reached out to Attributable Funds Committee members and there were no issues with the adjustment. The funding recommendations that are attached to Proposed Resolution T-2-23 reflects that \$2 million was shifted back to the Ferris Road project.
  - Chair Young asked for a motion to approve Resolution T-2-23; Mr. Ferrigno moved; Mr. Sanders seconded; and the motion passed.
- **Proposed Resolution T-3-23: "Amending the State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program" – Thomas Graham, MORPC**
  - Mr. Graham stated this will be the last amendment of SFY 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program. In July, the SFY will move to 2024-2027 TIP. There will be more information available in the future.
  - Mr. Graham focused on the 2021-2024 TIP program stating Proposed Resolution T-3-23 is one of the normal quarterly amendments. It will add or modify five projects in the SFY 2021-2024 TIP with commitments totaling over \$115 million. Mr. Graham provided a brief overview of these projects.
  - Chair Young asked for a motion to approve Resolution T-3-23; Mr. Weaver moved; Mr. Peoples seconded; and the motion passed.
- **Transportation Review Advisory Council Project List Update – Elliott Lewis, MORPC**

- Mr. Lewis presented the TRAC Draft Recommended Program. There was a total of 30 applications submitted statewide requesting \$815 million in new construction funds. There were six applications from the MORPC MPO area for a total of \$304 million in requests, which was over one-third of the statewide requests.
- Mr. Lewis stated that all 6 projects were funded, with four receiving full funding. Statewide, we had one-fifth of the implications and nearly a quarter of the draft award.
- Mr. Lewis indicated that right now, there is a TRAC Draft Recommended Program. TRAC will vote on a final program on March 29, 2023. The public comment period is currently open until March 23, 2023 and comments can be submitted online at [www.transportation.ohio.gov/programs/trac](http://www.transportation.ohio.gov/programs/trac).

## V. Resolutions

- Proposed Resolution “T-4-23 Adopting Updated Air Quality Conformity Determination for The Central Ohio Ozone Maintenance Area”. – Maria Schaper, MORPC
  - Ms. Schaper stated Resolution T-4-23 adopts and updates air quality conformity determination necessitated by an amendment being made by the Licking County Area Transportation Study (LCATS) to their 2020-2050 Long Range Transportation Plan.
  - Ms. Schaper stated there are six counties in Central Ohio, which span both the MORPC and LCATS geographies, are currently classified as a maintenance area with regard to ozone NAAQS. In March, LCATS is completing their process to adopt an amendment to their 2020-2050 Transportation Plan to a freeway widening project. MORPC, working with LCATS has updated the previous air quality conformity determination document. The updated document is available on the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan section of the MORPC website at [www.morpc.org/mtp](http://www.morpc.org/mtp). Resolution T-4-23 completes our part of the collaborative process with LCATS for this matter.
  - Chair Young asked for a motion to approve Resolution T-4-23; Mr. Nittle moved; Ms. Schamp seconded; and the motion passed.

## VI. 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)

- Ms. Schaper presented a status update and upcoming milestones. Ms. Schaper stated the MTP identifies regional transportation strategies and projects that span 20+ year, are fiscally constrained and is formal document submitted to ODOT and U.S. DOT every four years. It is the guiding document that U.S. DOT refers to when considering federal investments. All projects must be on this plan to be eligible for federal funding. In 2022, we adopted six goals that guided the development of this plan. Ms. Schaper stated that in February 2023, we adopted objectives and performance measures in order to measure progress.
- Ms. Schaper informed the committee that over the course of the next 25+ years, Central Ohio will see a growth of 726,000 people, which equates to 272,000 additional households and 357,000 additional workers.
- Ms. Schaper closed the presentation stating that the current activities of the MTP include 2050 population and employment forecasts, compiling candidate

projects, and developing project evaluation criteria. The 2024-2050 MTP will be adopted in May of 2024.

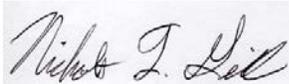
- Ms. Schamp asked if we have changed the way we look at traffic zones and growth rates and can we learn from mistakes made in the past. Ms. Schaper stated that at a regional level, it is a different process than at a local level. From a regional level, it is based on the land use policy that each region has in place and attractiveness factors that would contribute to growth. MORPC is looking at each study and developing creative ways to forecast. It is an iterative process.
- Mr. Nittle asked that within the fifteen county area, what counties are involved in the process of developing the model? Ms. Schaper stated that it is the MPO and CORPO areas, Licking, Logan, and Fayette counties that comprise MORPC's area of interest.
- Mr. Nittle stated that although the MTP is for the MPO area, it seems we are taking into account other areas in the plan. Ms. Schaper confirmed that the MTP is for the MPO area only and further commented that we use the land use allocation model from other areas mainly for planning purposes.

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## PROGRAMMING

### Transportation

#### Metropolitan Transportation Plan:

- Shared county-level 2050 population forecasts and continued work to distribute population forecast to smaller geographies.
- Continued to review local plans and collect candidate projects.
- Began developing project evaluation criteria based upon recently adopted performance measures.

#### Transit, Mobility & Human Services:

##### *Mobility Management*

- The second Franklin County Mobility Advisory Committee (FCMAC) meeting was held; during which two new strategies were added to Franklin County's portion of the Regional Mobility Plan. The mobility manager continued to attend stakeholder meetings such as the Senior Service Roundtable, CACDI, and attended the Mobility Management Roundtable.

##### *FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient*

- 5310 program information was presented to the Franklin County Mobility Advisory Committee in March to discuss the program.
- Work began to incorporate 2022 5310 awards into the federal grants system (TrAMs).

### *Gohio Commute*

- Met with several Job & family Service organizations within our region to discuss Gohio Commute TDM programs to assist with workforce transportation.
- Along with transportation partners CoGo, COTA, Special Improvement District (SID) and Spin Scooters, the team held a transportation fair at 88 E. Broad Street to educate commuters about sustainable transportation options.
- Participated in the Employer Workforce Resource Expo, sponsored by Columbus State Community College.

## Transportation Planning Activities:

### *US 23 Connect Study*

- Worked with the ODOT team and their consultants to review stakeholder feedback and incorporate into the identification of concepts to be advanced in the study process. The next phase of public involvement will be in the summer.

### *LinkUS Mobility Initiative*

- Worked with COTA on an interagency agreement and to identify key milestones in 2023 and 2024 for the development of the Transit Supportive Infrastructure Committee and Capital Improvement Program.
- Supported the LinkUS partners in convening a meeting of the Executive partners to review the MTP timeline and utilizing the MTP process to identify the next corridors to advance in the planning process.
- Participated in a charette on the North Knot with the City of Columbus consultant team to determine viable options for solving the transportation puzzle near OSU with the Northwest Corridor BRT project.

### *Interregional Connections*

- The Rail team worked alongside the City of Fort Wayne to submit a Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) Corridor ID Program application for the Midwest Connect passenger rail line between Chicago-Fort Wayne-Columbus-Pittsburgh.
- The Rail team assisted Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC) with their FRA Corridor ID Program application for the Cincinnati-Dayton-Columbus-Cleveland (3C+D) passenger rail line.

## Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO):

- Submitted the draft FY24 Planning Work Program (PWP) to ODOT. The final PWP will be adopted by the CORPO Committee and submitted to ODOT in May.
- Submitted the draft FY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to ODOT. The final TIP will be adopted by the CORPO Committee and submitted to ODOT in May.
- County-level sub-committee meetings began in late March. These meetings are held twice a year to review the progress of work completed as part of the CORPO PWP.

## Active Transportation Planning:

- The Active Transportation Committee met on Tuesday, March 14<sup>th</sup>. Most of the meeting was spent discussing the Ohio Revised Code, statutory speed limits, and related challenges for local agencies. The City of Columbus shared an update regarding the speed limit changes occurring downtown. ODOT also provided an update on active transportation related funding, technical assistance, and educational resources.
- MORPC hosted a virtual group viewing of the March [APBP monthly webinar](#). The next webinar is on Wednesday, April 19<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 p.m. These webinars are eligible for 1.0 hour of AICP Certification Maintenance credit. Contact Jordan Petrov ([jpetrov@morpc.org](mailto:jpetrov@morpc.org)) if interested in attending any of the MORPC group viewings.
- Work continued with Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) to provide active transportation planning assistance to Franklin Township and help the City of Reynoldsburg develop a Complete Streets Policy.
- MORPC participated in the ODOT Active Transportation Advisory Committee meeting on March 29<sup>th</sup>. Statewide updates included progress on implementation of Walk.Bike.Ohio, initiatives and priorities from local partners, federal and state funding opportunities, and statewide non-motorized data collection planning.

## Transportation Safety:

- MORPC continued work with local, regional, and state partners around key transportation safety initiatives:
  - Hosted an in-depth discussion with the MORPC Active Transportation Committee regarding the Ohio Revised Code, statutory speed limits, and related challenges for local agencies.
  - Participated in the kick-off meeting of the re-convened Speed Zoning Committee.
  - Participated in the State Strategic Highway Safety Plan Steering Committee meeting.
  - Provided important crash data and statistics for the 15-county region as part of official testimony to the state legislature for transportation budget discussions.

## Technical Assistance Program:

- Work has continued with all five communities awarded technical assistance services. Initial meetings and conversations with key stakeholders have been scheduled or are already underway.
- MORPC and Grove City hosted a collaborative stakeholder workshop at the end of March that focused on potential alignments for the continued southern extension of the Scioto Trail.

## Infrastructure Funding:

### *Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)*

- The Final Draft SFY 2024-2027 TIP was published on the MORPC website on March 10<sup>th</sup> for a public comment period lasting through April 10<sup>th</sup>. An open house was held on March 28<sup>th</sup> at MORPC to provide opportunity for additional public involvement.

### *MORPC-Attributable Funding*

- New Attributable Funding Commitments were adopted in March. These commitments are being coordinated with ODOT.

### *Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)*

- The Public Works Integrating Committee for District 3 (Franklin County) met in March to begin considering revisions to the district's methodology for the SFY 2025 funding round.

### *Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC)*

- TRAC released the draft 2023-2026 Major New Construction Program on February 22<sup>nd</sup>. Six projects in the MORPC MPO region are proposed to receive a total of \$100M in this latest round. In addition, two projects from the CORPO region are proposed to receive \$11.3M in funding.
- The public comment period for the draft program ended on March 23<sup>rd</sup>. TRAC will vote on the final program at its March 29<sup>th</sup> meeting.

### *Federal Competitive Programs*

- Held a "Drive Investment" luncheon for members and began holding "Money Mondays" webinars to share information about upcoming opportunities. These are 1:00 on Mondays. Contact Todd Bradley at [tbradley@morpc.org](mailto:tbradley@morpc.org) for more information.

### *Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)*

- Completed an internal assessment of information still needed from CAP partners.
- Identified coordination needs among MORPC teams to update communication materials, including website and mapping.

## Economic Development

### Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS):

- Currently coordinating with the U.S. EDA on grant programs and awaiting approval of EDD designation.

### Brownfield Assessments:

- Working to provide asbestos and universal waste assessments to the City of Powell on a potential brownfield site. The site had a storage tank removed in 1992 and the city is looking to redevelop.

## Community Development

### Central Ohio Greenways:

- The COG Board participated in a retreat on March 3<sup>rd</sup>. During the retreat, the Board reviewed the 2016 Strategic Plan and evaluated progress made over the last 7 years. The Board discussed how partnerships with other local, regional, and state organizations can be strengthened, how to advance strategic funding opportunities, and a vision for a Trail Town program in Central Ohio. The discussion will provide guidance to staff as they propose an update to the Strategic Plan. The Board will review the draft updates at their regular May 17<sup>th</sup> meeting.
- COG Trail Development and Partnership Working Groups met February 16<sup>th</sup> to discuss the Trail Count Data processing project and MORPC's Technical Assistance Program. The Working Group will meet again on April 20<sup>th</sup>.
- COG Marketing and Operations Working Groups met February 14<sup>th</sup> to discuss the April 22<sup>nd</sup> Celebrate Trail Day event and the Outdoor Trails Pass. The Working Groups will meet again on April 18<sup>th</sup>.
- The Trail Town Framework contract with Cycle Forward will be extended to update the framework to include a focus on not only rural communities, but also suburban and urban communities in Central Ohio. This work will begin in April 2023.

### Central Ohio Blueways:

- The Central Ohio Blueways Advisory Panel met on March 8<sup>th</sup> to continue discussion surrounding Water Trail designation and potential considerations for the Partnership Agreement drafts. Discussions so far have focused heavily on environmental considerations and questions surrounding the potential magnitude of the designation's increased usage. The next Advisory Panel meeting is scheduled for April 12<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 a.m.

### insight2050:

#### *LinkUS Mobility Initiative*

- Together with the Programming Department, insight2050 staff is engaged in ongoing committee and working group meetings for the LinkUS initiative.

#### *RAPID 5*

- MORPC is engaging with RAPID 5 on its Central Ohio Greenways and Blueways programming. Team members continue to provide transitional support to RAPID 5, which includes assisting with processing speaker requests and presentation needs. MORPC team members are also assisting with developing a resource library of data, resources, insights, and information about pertinent topics, including land use, multi-modal transportation systems, sustainability, economic development, etc. Stay up to

## Regional Housing Strategy (RHS):

### *Outreach*

- Together with BIA, MORPC hosted an event on March 23<sup>rd</sup> bringing together MORPC local government members and BIA members. The event highlighted the work of local housing builders and included a panel discussion on resilient development and facilitated conversations among participants.
- MORPC is leading the Advocacy & Partnerships Task Force of the newly formed Regional Housing Coalition which will meet in early April. The Coalition will establish a shared regional approach to address affordability, livability, and economic competitiveness in Central Ohio. The Task Force will assess the actions of the RHS Implementer's Toolkit for effectiveness at a regional scale, along with the champions who will lead them. The Task Force and the Coalition will help Central Ohio communities with regional coordination of housing efforts and support for local policies and initiatives.

### *Implementation Assistance*

## Sustainability

### Sustainability Advisory Committee:

- The next meeting will be hosted by City of Westerville on April 19<sup>th</sup> at 2:30 p.m.

### Sustainable2050:

- MORPC held a Sustainable2050 meeting on March 24<sup>th</sup> which included a presentation from SWACO's Executive Director, Joe Lombardi, and an introduction by MORPC of the Sustainability Toolkit for members, which is currently under development. The team is also encouraging coordination with members on federal funding opportunities for EV infrastructure and the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. Membership and tier status certification is open to MORPC members. ### Water Resources Program:

#### *Sustaining Scioto Board*

- Members of the Sustaining Scioto Board will have an opportunity to participate in a Field Day at the next Board meeting scheduled for April 26<sup>th</sup>. This event is organized by the Agricultural and Rural Communities Outreach Team. The Field Day will focus on water quality practices in the watershed and members will be able to tour a site and learn more about water conservation practices.

- Agricultural and Rural Communities Outreach Team: The Team met on March 16<sup>th</sup> with members finalizing Field Day plans scheduled for April 26<sup>th</sup>. The Team welcomed its newest member, Lauren Hirtle with the Ohio Ecological Food and Farm Association. Ms. Hirtle also provided an overview of policy work at OEFFA. The working team will meet again on May 18<sup>th</sup>.

### *Ohio EPA Water Resources Planning Work*

- The MORPC team continues to verify and update where necessary facility planning area boundaries and water quality management plans in the ten-county area have been developed. Data collected will inform the development of an interactive map.

## Energy & Air Quality:

### *Energy & Air Quality Working Group*

- The Energy and Air Quality Working Group will hold its next meeting, virtually, on March 28<sup>th</sup>. Members will hear from the Ohio EPA on PM2.5 proposed revisions, as well as updates on air quality programming, energy programming, and grant opportunities.
- The Subcommittee on Power Siting Issues held its third meeting on March 3<sup>rd</sup>. The group reviewed the first draft of the resource hub and engagement strategy on MORPC's approach to educate, engage, and empower communities on SB 52 and all aspects regarding utility-scale solar development. The Subcommittee heard from representatives at the Ohio Power Siting Board, discussed the general site selection process for utility-scale solar projects, took an in-depth look at SB 52, and held a Q&A from subcommittee members. The next meeting will be held mid to late April focusing on the PILOT provisions granted to utility-scale solar projects in Ohio.

### *Energy Planning*

- The City of Columbus just earned SolSmart Gold designation. In doing so, Columbus is spurring solar market growth by increasing transparency and access; making going solar easier in their community. Congratulations to Mayor Ginther and the Sustainable Columbus team.
- The second round of the Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op will kick off Wednesday, April 19<sup>th</sup> from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at IMPACT Community Action (IMPACT CA). The co-op is a collaborative effort among the City of Columbus, Solar United Neighbors (SUN), MORPC, and IMPACT CA. This event will celebrate the successes from last year's co-op, hear from SUN about the benefits of joining this solar co-op, and provide time for conversation between folks who are interested with homeowners who have gone solar.
- Residents for a Sustainable Central Ohio (RSCO) first quarter meeting was rescheduled to mid/late April. Each represented community will discuss the highlights of current sustainability programming and their priorities for 2023.
- Federal Funding opportunities are a priority as the team continues to coordinate across departments and with regional partners on identifying opportunities for clean energy, EV charging, and sustainability.   - MORPC, Ohio EPA, and Franklin County Public Health continue to co-locate six new PurpleAir sensors with Ohio EPA's regulatory reference monitors to verify their performance and get them into the community for data collection.
- Education and Outreach
  - MORPC has reviewed the recently released the 2022 World Air Quality Report by IQAir, which reports on the status of PM2.5 pollution around the world. The report is valuable for highlighting global pollution issues and the need for more data and action to reduce pollution levels and protect our most vulnerable communities. However, the report identifies Columbus, Ohio as the most polluted major city in the U.S. based on the report's 2022 pollution calculations, which is misleading. MORPC continues to seek clarification on the report's methodology and has identified areas for further consideration that could lead to the mischaracterization of Central Ohio's air quality. MORPC has prepared a statement sharing more information about why the information does not seem accurate. This statement will be made available online.
- National Air Quality Awareness Week
  - Air Quality Awareness Week is May 1<sup>st</sup> through the 5<sup>th</sup>, 2023. The theme for this year is "Working Together for Clean Air". MORPC works in coordination with other MPOs across the state to promote consistent messages and themes throughout AQ Awareness week. We localize the information while keeping in line with the national themes. Information will highlight resources that increase air quality awareness and encourages people to take action and incorporate air quality knowledge into their daily living.
  - The U.S. EPA proposed particulate matter (PM) standard revision was published in the Federal Register in February. This has triggered a 60-day public comment period, which ended on March 28<sup>th</sup>. MORPC engaged with our Sustainability Advisory Committee and working group leadership, members, and others, in a process to review and provide comments. ## Data, Mapping & Modeling

### Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC):

- The Regional Data Advisory Committee met on March 7<sup>th</sup> to welcome new members: Liz Curtis (ESCCO), Kier Scott (WDBCO), and Kristy Wedel (Abbott). The Committee had a

very full agenda, with a presentation from the Governor's office regarding new cyber security initiatives and an update on the success of MORPC's Data Day event held on March 1<sup>st</sup>. Members also discussed the updated draft of the 2023-2025 Regional Data Agenda and began the next steps to collect specific recommendations for future working group objectives. The Committee will meet again on May 9<sup>th</sup>.

- Regional Data Agenda Update Working Group
  - The Group met on February 21<sup>st</sup> and March 2<sup>nd</sup> to further refine the recommended agenda items for the 2023-2025 Regional Data Agenda. The Group will meet over the next four months to determine the most actionable and regionally impactful objectives for the RDAC working groups to pursue. Recommendations for objectives will be collected through March 24<sup>th</sup>, with finalized versions being considered during a special RDAC meeting to be held May 9<sup>th</sup>.
- Capacity Building & Partnerships Working Group
  - Discussion about the data resource for local partners was finalized as a panel during Data Day, with panelists from Rise Together, the Affordable Housing Alliance of Central Ohio, MORPC, and Catholic Social Services.
  - Data Day took place on March 1<sup>st</sup>, at the Ohio University / Dublin Integrated Education Center in Dublin. The event was sold out, in-person, with over 200 diverse professionals from around the region taking part either in-person or online. Exit survey results indicate most of the day's sessions were very highly rated by attendees with an average rating of 4.25 out of 5 stars. Planning for a future Data Day has already begun.
  - The Working Group will meet again on April 26<sup>th</sup>.
- Local Government Resources Working Group
  - The Data Policy Resource Library tool was introduced as a beta version at Data Day. Survey feedback suggested that the library was easy to navigate, but would benefit from greatly expanded content, and a dedicated webpage may be warranted. Next steps include determining the best path forward to scale and support the library as a Regional Data Objective. The Working Group will meet again on March 28<sup>th</sup>.
- Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG) Steering Committee
  - A RIDG Steering Committee meeting was held on March 16<sup>th</sup>. The new Steering Committee Chair, Rob Moore of Scioto Analysis, welcomed members, followed by a discussion of the first General Meeting and to spur ideas for subsequent meetings. The Committee will meet again on May 16<sup>th</sup>.
- Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG)
  - The quarterly RIDG was held on March 22<sup>nd</sup>. Members were introduced to the new Steering Committee Chair, Rob Moore. MORPC staff updated members on RDAC changes, including the current status of the Regional Data Agenda. Staff also presented the new Data Policy Resource Library and asked for feedback. The topics for presentation were Ohio's New Poverty Metric presented by Rob Moore, and an

introduction to Web-Hooks by Langdon Sanders, City of Dublin. The next meeting is scheduled for June 28<sup>th</sup>.

- Central Ohio GIS User Group (COGUG)
  - The Central Ohio GIS User Group (COGUG) held a hybrid meeting on February 22<sup>nd</sup>, with 60 attendees. We reviewed the survey results regarding format and content of the meetings. The format will remain the same with presentations focusing on local projects. The Group will meet again on May 17<sup>th</sup>.

## Data Management:

- Continued to explore ways to standardize data tools and workflows, and to improve data and workflow version control and documentation. The Data Team developed an automated process for georeferencing and publishing the locations of MORPC-managed air quality sensors. The Team is developing quality assurance processes to govern the collection and maintenance of air quality data for efforts related to the recently awarded EPA air quality monitoring grant, which is expected to kick off in May.
- The team continues to work with other departments to evaluate the usability of and extract insights from existing bike/ped counter data. This will help plan for deployment of future counters, monitoring, and analysis of their data.

### *Data Outreach*

- Staff continue to participate in digital inclusion efforts – specifically the Franklin County Digital Equity Coalition and the Regional Digital Inclusion Alliance for the Central Ohio region in support of a statewide digital inclusion initiative.

## Data Analytics, Mapping, and Research:

### *Data & Research Activities*

- The staff reviewed recent migration trends for the 15-county region and found that migration is responsible for about half of the region's growth in the past decade and is expected to be responsible for almost three-quarters of the region's growth through 2050. Over the past decade, about half of net migration has been international. In 2019, most migration was, to or from, other Ohio counties. Other top origins include Pennsylvania, Florida, and Texas; Florida is a top destination.
- Staff reviewed the population projections recently released by the Ohio Department of Development. These predict a 5.7% decline Ohio's population by 2050. Most Ohio counties are expected to decline, however modest growth is expected for some counties in the vicinity of major cities. Central Ohio is expected to see the strongest growth. Staff are working to compare the state projections to MORPC's projections released earlier this year and to understand any differences between the two sets of projections.
- Program, Data, and C&E team members collaborated with CHRR at OSU on an American Population Panel (APP) public opinion poll surrounding transportation needs and experiences which concluded on March 17<sup>th</sup>. Survey results are being analyzed for presentation at MORPC's State of the Region event on March 31<sup>st</sup>. As part of this burgeoning partnership, MORPC is successfully expanding the APP participants to include more racially, geographically, and socio-economically diverse

individuals, with 37% of new survey respondents making the decision to join the APP.

### *Mapping Activities*

- Cultivate GeoSpatial has started the Active Transportation Network project and are in the data discovery phase.
- Staff mapped TIP projects and submitted maps for the draft TIP.
- Inventory and cleanup of data shared on our MOOD site is underway.

### *Modeling Activities*

- Staff created and submitted information for Draft TIP, and work continues on North Knot and LinkUS projects.
- Modeler Diego Galdino recently presented to Ohio Model User Group, “Python-based Tool for Automatic Transit Coding using GTFS for Travel Demand Models.”
- The team is preparing inputs for the Land Use Allocation Model of the MTP, continuing to maintain the Traffic Count Program, and responding to several traffic growth and modeling requests.

**SUBJECT:** Draft SFY 2024 PWP Summary

Annually, MORPC prepares a Planning Work Program (PWP) that outlines the work of the metropolitan planning organization (MPO), the use of regional transportation planning funds, and the regional planning activities that will be undertaken in the coming year. The PWP constitutes MORPC's annual scope of work with ODOT using federal planning dollars. The draft PWP was submitted to ODOT on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and ODOT provided minor comments. This memo and the attachment provide a summary of the full PWP draft. The full draft document is available in the PWP section of our website, <https://www.morpc.org/program-service/planning-work-program>. Any comments can be directed to me at [ngill@morpc.org](mailto:ngill@morpc.org). The final SFY 24 PWP will be adopted at the May meetings.

The total Fiscal Year 2024 budget of all work elements is \$7,912,437 to be spent in SFY 2024 or later. The work elements of the PWP as shown in the summary attached are divided into four sections:

1) Formula-Funded Planning Program Projects (total budget of \$4,194,279 for SFY 2024)

This includes work elements related to the core federally required planning activities. These touch on all areas including Management & Operations, Transit and Human Services Planning, Metropolitan Transportation Plan, Active Transportation Plan, Transportation Improvement Program, Public Involvement, Regional Strategic Initiatives (insight2050, housing, trail planning, RAPID 5), as well as work related to data, mapping, and modeling.

2) Special Studies (total budget \$2,393,158 for SFY 2024 or later)

These are special studies completed with funding outside of the core planning funds. These include work elements related to the Central Ohio Greenways Wayfinding Strategy, Growth and Major Economic Development Planning, Paving the Way, Technical Assistance Program,

Mobility Management, and 5310 designated recipients for enhanced mobility of seniors and individuals with disabilities programs.

3) Ridesharing and Air Quality Projects (total budget is \$1,325,000 for SFY 2024)

This includes transportation services related to Ridesharing (Gohio Commute) and Air Quality Awareness activities.

4) Projects Undertaken by Other Entities

This area is provided in order to report on local and transit transportation planning activities throughout the region. No specific federal funding through MORPC is provided for these activities.
