#### CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT FOR PROSPERITY

#### <u>Advocacy</u>

Team Members participated in the Columbus Chamber 2023 "Meet the Class" event to meet new members of the Ohio General Assembly and other community leaders and members.

#### Gohio Commute

Team Members welcomed a new vanpool that commutes daily from Wellston to Chillicothe. Staff met with Delaware County Transit to discuss ways to incorporate Gohio Commute to enhance transportation offerings in Delaware and surrounding areas. Staff promoted Gohio Commute via:

- Transportation Fair at the Chillicothe VA Medical Center
- State of Ohio Health Fair
- White Castle's Earth Day Fair
- Marketing campaign on Facebook and Instagram.

#### Active Transportation

Work continues with Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) to provide active transportation planning assistance to Franklin Township and help the City of Reynoldsburg develop a Complete Streets Policy. A stakeholder workshop was held at Franklin Township on April 17 that engaged staff from Grove City, Columbus, Franklin County Engineer, Jackson Township, and other important partner agencies in discussions about active transportation challenges and opportunities.

Team Members met with staff from ODOT Traffic Monitoring on April 20 to discuss non-motorized volume data collection and management in Central Ohio and throughout the state.

MORPC hosted a virtual group viewing of the April APBP monthly webinar. The next webinar is May 17, 3 p.m. The webinars are eligible for 1.0 hour of AICP Certification Maintenance credit. Contact Jordan Petrov (jpetrov@morpc.org) if interested in attending.

#### Transportation Safety

Team Members took part in the quarterly OARC Transportation Safety Sub-Committee meeting; assisted Franklin County Safe Communities Coalition with a special safety event at COSI After Dark; took part in the quarterly Technical Records Coordinating Committee Technical Council meeting; and attended in the monthly Franklin County Traffic Fatality Review meeting.

#### Technical Assistance Program

Work continues with all five communities awarded technical assistance services. Initial meetings and conversations with key stakeholders are scheduled or underway.

MORPC and the City of Delaware hosted a collaborative stakeholder workshop on April 26 to review crash trends and safety priorities for the city. Stakeholders supplied input that will inform development of a draft Safety Action Plan for the City.

#### Central Ohio Greenways (COG)

The COG Trail Development Working Group is offering advice to MORPC's technical assistance program, an updated trail count program, and trail vision refinements. The next Working Group meeting is June 15.

The Marketing Working Group is advising website upgrades, social media calendar development, the wayfinding project, and a trail town framework development. The next Working Group meeting is June 14. MORPC signed a contract extension with Cycle Forward to begin the second phase of the Trail Town Framework as well as a contract with Designing Local to begin a Wayfinding Strategy project. COG partners will install five new permanent trail counters along the Ohio to Erie Trail this month.

COG supported the Rails to Trails Conservancy and Green Columbus's April 22 Celebrate Trails Day event. An updated Outdoor Trails Pass was released in partnership with Experience Columbus. The updated pass includes curated route itineraries.

#### Central Ohio Blueways

The Community Development Team held one-on-one conversations with the Central Ohio Blueways Advisory Panel members. The meetings allowed the Advisory Panel members individual time to discuss any thoughts or ideas they may have, as well as provide opportunities to express any concerns. A summary of the discussions will be presented at the May 10 Advisory Panel meeting.

#### Regional Housing Strategy

MORPC hosted a meeting of the Regional Housing Coalition Advocacy & Partnerships Task Force on April 3. Approximately 50 attendees helped identify regional-scale actions from the Regional Housing Strategy, along with several new priorities which have emerged since the RHS was released in 2020. The results of the workshop will be summarized in a report back to the Coalition conveners, and ultimately will help create a regionally coordinated approach to address affordability, livability, and economic competitiveness in Central Ohio.

Team Members discussed the Regional Housing Strategy and the Regional Housing Coalition with various audiences including the Ohio Realtors, Ohio State University undergraduate and graduate students, and several MORPC member communities.

For those interested in a housing/growth workshop for your community's elected officials, staff, or community leaders, MORPC is accepting requests for presentations and workshops. #### Sustainability Advisory Committee

The Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC) met at the City of Westerville Electric Division on April 19. The Westerville Green Team provided updates on their sustainability initiatives which support greenspace, waste reduction, electric vehicle charging and energy programming for residents and businesses. The MORPC Team provided updates on federal funding opportunities, policy, and ongoing programs. The next SAC meeting is June 21.

#### Sustainable2050

Member Earth Day events and activities were highlighted on MORPC's website and social media pages. Membership and tier status certification is open to MORPC members. #### Sustaining Scioto Board

The April 26 Sustaining Scioto Board meeting was a Field Day focusing on water quality practices in the watershed. The Agricultural and Rural Communities Outreach Team organized the Field Day.

#### Ohio EPA Water Resources Planning Work

Team Members continued to verify, and update where necessary, facility planning area boundaries. Water quality management plans in the ten-county area have been developed. Data collected will inform the development of an interactive map.

#### Energy & Air Quality

The Subcommittee on Power Siting Issues met April 18. The meeting focused on the PILOT provisions granted to utility-scale solar projects in Ohio, in which the developer makes annual service payments to local and county tax districts.

The 2022 World Air Quality Report by IQAir generated a lot of questions and interest around Central Ohio's air quality. Over the past month, MORPC participated in five media interviews. The interviews highlighted that the study is not consistent with available data from Ohio EPA, which indicates continued improvement and attainment with federal standards. The Ohio EPA and MORPC Teams look forward to a meeting with IQAir to discuss the study and methodology.

Air Quality Awareness Week was May 1-5. The theme was "Working Together for Clean Air". MORPC worked in coordination with other MPOs across the state to promote consistent messages and themes throughout AQ Awareness week. Team Members localize the information while keeping in line with the national themes. Information highlighted resources that increase air quality awareness and encourage people to act and incorporate air quality knowledge into their daily living.

MORPC successfully engaged with internal and external stakeholders in a process to review the U.S. EPA proposal to revise the particulate matter (PM2.5) standard and submitted comments on March 28.

#### **Energy Planning**

The second round of the Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op kicked off April 19. The Co-op is a collaborative effort among the City of Columbus, Solar United Neighbors (SUN), MORPC, and IMPACT Community Action. Residents interested in solar and live in Columbus, Franklin County, and surrounding areas can join with other residents in the region to secure better pricing.

Residents for a Sustainable Central Ohio's (RSCO) first quarter meeting was April 26. Each represented community discussed the highlights of current sustainability programming and their priorities for 2023.

#### Neighborhood Air Monitoring Project

MORPC, Ohio EPA, and Franklin County Public Health are testing the performance of PurpleAir sensors with Ohio EPA's regulatory reference monitors to prepare them for data collection. The data collection for the current project is wrapped up at the end of April and a final report will be released this summer. Staff is preparing to kick off the U.S. EPA Air Monitoring grant in early summer and is focused on developing the required Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP).

#### Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC)

The Regional Data Advisory Committee recruited six professionals to join three working groups, bringing added capacity and more diverse perspectives for the work ahead.

- The Regional Data Agenda Update Working Group met April 18 to determine the most actionable and regionally impactful objectives for the RDAC Working Groups to pursue in the next three years.
   All recommendations moving forward from the March 7 RDAC meeting will be considered during a special RDAC meeting on May 9. The next Working Group meeting is May 16.
- The Capacity Building & Partnerships Working Group met April 26. Members continue conversations around how to develop a resource for social sector non-profits and added two new members.
- The Local Government Resources Working Group continues to add content to and refine the new Data Policy Resource Library tool. Next steps include determining the best path forward to scale and support the library as a Regional Data Objective. The Working Group meets the last Tuesday of each month at 3 p.m.
- The Central Ohio GIS Users Group is informally exploring the potential utility of WAZE for local
  municipalities as well as assessing the costs and benefits of utilizing ESRI cloud storage. The group
  is also exploring the potential for a persistent group chat tool which would be easily accessible to
  most members. The next meeting is May 17.

#### Data Management & Outreach

Team Members continued to explore ways to standardize data tools and workflows and to improve data and workflow version control and documentation. Staff is working to improve the organization and metadata completeness of our assets in ArcGIS Online.

Team Members collaborated with third-party efforts to plan for growth in Licking County, including Framework Licking County and an LCATS scenario planning study.

MORPC met with CURA leadership and staff to discuss overarching organizational objectives and potential areas for collaboration, with an emphasis on how the organizations may better coordinate to fulfil our roles as co-partners with NNIP, and better serve local communities. Many areas of potential collaboration were identified.

#### Data & Research Activities

Team Members continued to streamline the process for obtaining residential building permit data and to improve the completeness of that data.

Staff is developing an "Actionable Insights" report, based upon the findings of the "Leaders Listen" American Population Panel (APP) public opinion pol. The poll addressed the region's transportation needs and experiences. The report will provide more depth than the initial insights shared during MORPC's State of the Region event. As part of this burgeoning partnership, MORPC is working with its partners at the Center for Human Resource Research (aka CHRR) and The Columbus Dispatch to expand the survey series into additional topical domains and sustain these activities into the future.

#### Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

April is Celebrate Diversity Month. MORPC hosted a panel discussion on "Advancing Diversity and Fostering an Inclusive Workplace."

Team Members took part in the Central Ohio Diversity Consortium Meeting on April 14. These meetings provide opportunities for learning and information-sharing between members to help organizations deploy their DE&I strategy in meaningful and impactful ways.

MORPC convened two employee DE&I trainings focused on the Undesign the Redline housing exhibit which were facilitated by the Columbus YWCA.

Team Members continue to participate in digital inclusion efforts, specifically the Franklin County Digital Equity Coalition and the Regional Digital Inclusion Alliance for the Central Ohio region in support of a statewide digital inclusion initiative.

Staff engaged with the African American Male Wellness Agency as MORPC prepares to serve as a sponsor again this year and host a resource table at the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary walk.

#### **DRIVE INVESTMENT**

#### Interregional Connections

Staff took part in an April 13 press conference with the City of Fort Wayne and other partners to announce the application for the Midwest Connect passenger rail line in the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) Corridor ID Program. Announcements are expected by the FRA in late summer or September.

#### Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Throughout April, Team Members incorporated changes resulting from the TIP public comment period into the SFY 2024-2027 TIP which was submitted to ODOT on May 1.

#### Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Team Members made the following progress on the 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan:

- Continued development of the 2050 population and employment forecasts at the zone level
- Continued review of local plans to collect candidate projects
- Continued development of 2023 benchmark data and project evaluation criteria and methodology

#### **Mobility Management**

Region 6 Mobility Managers held the quarterly Regional Mobility Plan meeting and finalized the yearly regional survey. MORPC hosted the April Franklin County Mobility Advisory Committee meeting. The subcommittee aimed at creating an emergency ride program was established during the meeting.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient (Enhanced Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities)
Team Members assisted with a 5310 vehicle transfer from Share Mobility to Delaware County Transit (DCT).
DCT will use this vehicle for their purchased transportation contract with Sourcepoint through the 5310 program as well as their Flex on-demand service.

#### US 23 Connect Study

Staff took part in meetings with ODOT and their consultant team to support the development and review of study and communication materials in preparation for upcoming Community Partner and public meetings.

#### LinkUS Mobility Initiative

LinkUS partners held an internal workshop to discuss the principles of the Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI) component of LinkUS. MORPC and COTA submitted a TSI proposal for the Ohio Engineering Technical Conference in October. Team Members began work on a TRAC application for the West Broad Street BRT corridor.

#### Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO)

County-level subcommittee meetings wrapped up in early April. Team Members reviewed the CORPO Dedicated-Funds policy and made recommendations for updates to the policies for the FY 2024-2025 funding cycle. The CORPO Committee will act on the revised policy at the May 1 meeting. The committee will also be asked to adopt the FY 2024 Planning Work Program and the FY2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program.

Staff met with a Federal Highway Administration representative to kick-off the CORPO Safety Action Plan, which is the result of a \$200,000 award from the federal Safe Streets and Roads for All program. The CORPO Safety Action Plan will be developed over the course of the next year.

#### MORPC-Attributable Funding

Team Members transmitted new funding commitments and updates to previous funding commitments to ODOT Districts 5 and 6 for programming.

#### Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

The Public Works Integrating Committee for District 3 (Franklin County) approved the applicant manual for the SFY 2025 infrastructure funding round in April.

#### Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC)

The next TRAC application cycle is May 1-31. To be eligible for TRAC funding, a project must have a total cost greater than \$12 million and add capacity to a transportation system.

#### Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

Two new CAPs were created for Violet Township and South Bloomfield. Team Members are finalizing the 2023 CAP updates and will showcase the projects on MORPC's CAP website.

#### Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)

Staff completed and submitted the semi-annual narrative, survey, and financial reports for the Economic Adjustment Assistance grant.

#### **Brownfield Assessments**

Asbestos and universal waste studies were initiated for property owned by the City of Powell. The studies are a necessary step in eventual demolition and development.

#### **Energy Planning**

Federal Funding opportunities are a priority as Team Members continue to coordinate across departments and with regional partners on identifying opportunities for clean energy, EV charging, and sustainability.

MORPC is co-leading on applications for both the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant and the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Discretionary Grant. Fourteen Sustainable2050 members submitted letters of support for the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. For more information, contact Brian Filiatraut at bfiliatraut@morpc.org.

#### Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

The Natural Assistance Resource Council (NRAC) met April 5 for a scoring session on Round 17 final applications. # Meeting Called to Order - Erik Janas (Franklin County), MORPC Chair

Chair Erik Janas called the Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to order at 2:19 p.m.

### Metropolitan Planning Organization Report

 Programming – Nick Gill, MORPC Interim Senior Director of Programming & Transportation Study Director

Nick Gill presented the <u>Metropolitan Planning Organization Report</u>. MORPC submitted the draft Planning Work Program (PWP) to ODOT at the beginning of March. ODOT did not have any significant comments. The draft is available on MORPC's website and will be presented for adoption next month.

The final draft of the 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) was available for review and comment through April 10. COTA's short range plan is part of the TIP and they are continuing to have comment opportunities throughout the month. The final TIP will be presented for adoption by the Transportation Policy Committee in May.

The LinkUS Transit Supportive Infrastructure Committee, to be made up of jurisdictions throughout the COTA service area, is charged with building a Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI) Capital Improvements Program (CIP) to use the potential funding that could be made available through the proposed LinkUS Funding Strategy. MORPC held initial meetings with communities on this last year and is bringing the communities together again this spring to continue developing the program policies that will guide the development of the CIP. The TSI committee structure is expected to be formalized through COTA board action in May.

The six Central Ohio projects submitted to the Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) received funding.

The 2023 Safe Streets for All NOFO was issued last week. Application deadline is July 10. To receive implementation funding, you must have a safety action plan or elements of a safety action plan in place.

# <u>2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Update</u> – Nick Gill, MORPC Interim Senior Director of Programming & Transportation Study Director

Nick Gill presented the <u>2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Update</u>. The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is a long-range vision that sets the stage for the funding we want to go after. The MTP is updated every four years.

Current activities include 2050 population and employment forecasts, compilation of candidate projects, and development of project evaluation criteria. Upcoming activities include an interactive map available in May, strategy and project evaluation, and draft strategies and projects. The final plan will be adopted in May 2024. Improvement Program (TIP)"

As was presented during previous meetings, the TIP is a four-year program of projects and strategies that state and local governments have selected from MORPC's long-range transportation plan as priorities for Central Ohio's transportation system. It contains a listing of all regionally significant projects and projects that will require the authorization of funds by FHWA or FTA. For each project, the list describes the scope of the project and the amount and type of funds committed to each phase of the project by state fiscal year (SFY). The TIP may be updated through formal amendments or administrative modifications.

MORPC's TIP is a component of the Statewide TIP (STIP). MORPC adopts an updated TIP every two years. Coordination with the MPO member governments and transit agencies began in January with an announcement of the beginning of the update process. In March, MORPC announced the availability of the final draft TIP and held an open house for the TIP on March 28th. The Transportation Policy Committee was regularly updated about the process through monthly reports and a presentation of the draft TIP.

From March 10th to April 10th, MORPC conducted a public involvement process for the Final Draft SFY 2024-2027 TIP, which included the open house on March 28th. Staff received several comments during the open house which were answered. Comments were also received via email. Comments on specific projects were passed along to specific project sponsors. None of the comments significantly changed the final draft TIP.

The final SFY 2024-2027 TIP was due to ODOT on May 1st and will be available at <a href="www.morpc.org/tip">www.morpc.org/tip</a>. In order to remain coordinated with the statewide process and MORPC's meeting schedules, the Transportation Policy Committee is being asked to adopt the TIP after the final TIP is required to be submitted to ODOT. In the event that the Transportation Policy Committee modifies the TIP or fails to adopt it, this will be coordinated with ODOT. ODOT is aware of this situation.

WHEREAS, the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission is designated as the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) by the Governor, acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation and in cooperation with locally elected officials for Franklin and Delaware counties, the cities of New Albany and Pataskala and Etna Township in Licking County, and Violet and Bloom townships in Fairfield County, and Jerome Township in Union County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 United States Code 134, and 49 United States Code 5303, 5305, and 5306, MORPC, as the MPO, has caused the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan dated May 2020 to be prepared; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 United States Code 134, and 49 United States Code 5304, MORPC, as the MPO, has prepared a Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for Fiscal Years 2024 through 2027 dated May 1, 2023, and available at <a href="https://www.morpc.org/tip">www.morpc.org/tip</a>; and

WHEREAS, all projects in the TIP are included in the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) although there are projects in the TIP that are advancing ahead of the time frame shown in the MTP; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 USC 134 and 42 USC 7506, the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan has been reanalyzed based on accepted methodology and has been determined to be in conformity with the requirements of the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990, and said fact is documented in the TIP Appendix 1: *Air Quality Conformity Determination* dated May 1, 2023, and the SFY 2024-2027 TIP projects are consistent with this conformity determination: and

WHEREAS, the TIP includes the Central Ohio Transit Authority's (COTA's) Short-Range Transit Plan (SRTP) with specific details provided in Appendix A of the TIP, which will be adopted by the COTA board at its May 2023 meeting; and

WHEREAS, in compliance with the U.S. Department of Transportation's Title VI regulations, solicitation of citizens' comments on the TIP was made by following MORPC's adopted Public Involvement Process including review by the Community Advisory Committee (CAC), advertisements in the area newspapers, sunshine mailings and an open house meeting; and

WHEREAS, in response to the Federal Transit Administration's guidelines on private sector participation, private transportation operators in the region have been involved in the planning process through representation on the Transportation Advisory Committee, the CAC and/or the Transportation Policy Committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 USC 134, the financial plan for the TIP demonstrates that it can be implemented and that it is consistent with funding reasonably expected to be available; and

WHEREAS, the TIP does not become effective until approval is received from the federal and state authorities; and

WHEREAS, the Community Advisory Committee at its meeting on May 1, 2023 and the Transportation Advisory Committee at its meeting on May 3, 2023 recommended approval of this resolution to the Transportation Policy Committee; now therefore

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TRANSPORTATION POLICY COMMITTEE OF THE **MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION**:

- Section 1. That it adopts the Transportation Improvement Program for Fiscal Years 2024 through 2027 dated May 1, 2023, as provided on the MORPC website at <a href="https://www.morpc.org/tip">www.morpc.org/tip</a> and recommends that its members incorporate these improvements into their transportation improvement programming for their governmental units.
- Section 2. That it amends the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan to adjust the time frame of certain projects already included the MTP to match the schedule shown in the TIP and it affirms the consistency between the Fiscal Years 2024 through 2027 TIP and the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan and the determination of conformity between the TIP and the State Implementation Plan (SIP) as documented in TIP Appendix 1.
- Section 3. That it authorizes the Transportation Director to approve administrative modifications to the TIP as provided in Appendix E of the document.

Annually, MORPC submits a Planning Work Program (PWP) that outlines the work of the metropolitan planning organization (MPO), the use of regional transportation planning funds, and the regional planning activities that will be undertaken in the coming year. The PWP outlines MORPC's annual scope of work with ODOT using federal planning dollars. The total Fiscal Year 2024 budget of all work elements is \$8,012,437 to be spent in SFY 2024 or later. The work elements of the PWP as shown in the summary attached to the resolution (T-6-23) are divided into four sections:

- 1) Formula-Funded Planning Program Projects (total budget of \$4,254,279 for SFY 2024)
  This includes work elements related to the core federally required planning activities. These touch on all areas including Management & Operations, Transit and Human Services Planning, Metropolitan Transportation Plan, Active Transportation Plan, Transportation Improvement Program, Public Involvement, Regional Strategic Initiatives (insight2050, housing, trail planning, RAPID 5), as well as work related to data, mapping, and modeling. This includes \$60,000 in carryover from the SFY 2023 core program.
- 2) Special Studies (total budget \$2,433,158 for SFY 2024 or later)

These are special studies completed with funding outside of the core planning funds. These include work elements related to the Central Ohio Greenways Wayfinding Strategy, LinkUS Regional Corridors Planning, Growth and Major Economic Development Planning, Paving the Way, Technical Assistance Program, Mobility Management, and 5310 designated recipients for enhanced mobility of seniors and individuals with disabilities programs.

- 3) Ridesharing and Air Quality Projects (total budget is \$1,325,000 for SFY 2024)
  This includes transportation services related to Ridesharing (Gohio Commute) and Air Quality Awareness activities.
- 4) Projects Undertaken by Other Entities

This area is provided to report on local and transit transportation planning activities throughout the region. No specific federal funding through MORPC is provided for these activities.

SUBJECT: Proposed Resolution T-7-23: "Certification of the MORPC Metropolitan

**Transportation Planning Process**"

In urbanized areas, which have a population of 50,000 or more, federal planning law (49 U.S.C. 5303) calls upon local officials to cooperate with states and public transportation providers in undertaking a continuing, comprehensive, and cooperative (3C) multimodal transportation planning process. This metropolitan transportation planning process is carried out through MORPC as a federally designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO).

Every four years, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) must certify that each MPO serving a transportation management area (TMA) – a designation by DOT of an urbanized area with a population over 200,000 as defined by the Bureau of the Census – is carrying out the metropolitan planning process in adherence with federal statutes and regulations. The Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration last conducted this review, on the Secretary's behalf, at MORPC in 2022 and will conduct another recertification review of MORPC in September 2026.

However, federal regulations also specify that the state and MPO must annually self-certify to the FHWA and the FTA that the planning process is addressing the major issues facing the area and is being conducted in accordance with all applicable requirements.

Resolution T-7-23 self-certifies MORPC's metropolitan transportation planning process and affirms that MORPC, as an MPO, is meeting all requirements in its transportation planning work.

#### **RESOLUTION T-7-23**

### "Certification of the MORPC Metropolitan Transportation Planning Process"

WHEREAS, the Transportation Policy Committee of the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission is designated as the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the Columbus Urbanized Area; and

WHEREAS, 23 CFR 450.334 requires that the state and MPO certify, at least every four years, that the transportation planning process is being carried out in accordance with all applicable requirements, including:

- 1) 23 U.S.C. 134 and 49 U.S.C. 5303 (Metropolitan Transportation Planning requirements);
- 2) Sections 174 and 176(c) and (d) of the Clean Air Act, as Amended (42 U.S.C. 7504, 7506 (c) and (d) and 40 CFR part 93;
- 3) Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2000d-1) and 49 CFR part 21;
- 4) 49 U.S.C. 5332, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age in employment or business opportunity;
- 5) Section 11101(e) of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) (Public Law 117-58, also known as the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law") and 49 CFR part 26 regarding the involvement of disadvantaged business enterprises in USDOT-funded projects;
- 6) 23 CFR part 230, regarding the implementation of the equal employment opportunity program on federal and federal-aid highway construction contracts;
- 7) The provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) and 49 CFR parts 27, 37 and 38;
- 8) The Older Americans Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 6101) prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age in programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance;
- 9) Section 324 of Title 23 U.S.C. regarding the prohibition of discrimination based on gender; and
- 10) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794) and 49 CFR part 27 regarding discrimination against individuals with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, this "self-certification" is separate from the MPO certification done by the Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration, which was last conducted at MORPC in 2022 and will be conducted again in 2026; and

WHEREAS, as a prerequisite to the receipt of federal financial assistance (per 49 CFR Subtitle A, Section 21.7), MORPC is required to provide the Title VI Assurances included in Attachment A; and

WHEREAS, the Community Advisory Committee at its meeting on May 1, 2023 and the Transportation Advisory Committee at its meeting on May 3, 2023 recommended approval of this resolution by the Transportation Policy Committee; now therefore

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TRANSPORTATION POLICY COMMITTEE OF THE **MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION**:

Section 1. That it certifies that the urban transportation planning process is carried out in conformance with all the applicable federal requirements to the degree that is appropriate for the size and complexity of the area.

# PART 1 STANDARD DOT TITLE VI ASSURANCES

The Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) hereby agrees that as a condition to receiving Federal financial assistance from the Department of Transportation (DOT), it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d <u>et seq.</u>) and all requirements imposed by 49 CFR Part 21 - Nondiscrimination in Federally Assisted Programs of the Department of Transportation - Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations") to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which MORPC receives Federal financial assistance and will immediately take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement. Without limiting the above general assurance, MORPC agrees that:

- 1. Each "program" and "facility" (as defined in Sections 21.23(e) and 21.23 (b)) will be conducted or operated in compliance with all requirements of the Regulations.
- 2. It will insert the clauses of Part 2 of this assurance in every contract subject to the Act and the Regulations.
- 3. This assurance obligates MORPC for the period during which Federal financial assistance is extended to the program, except where the Federal financial assistance is to provide, or is in the form of personal property or real property or interest therein or structures or improvements thereon, in which case the assurance obligates MORPC or any transferee for the longer of the following periods:
  - (a) the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which Federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, or
  - (b) the period during which MORPC retains ownership or possession of the property.
- 4. It will provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the Secretary of Transportation or the official to whom they delegate specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other sponsors, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants or Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Act, the Regulations, and this assurance.
- 5. It agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Act, the Regulations, and this assurance.

THIS ASSURANCE is given in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining Federal financial assistance for this Project and is binding on MORPC, its contractor, subcontractors, transferees, successors in interest and other participants in the Project. The person whose signature appears on this resolution is authorized to sign this assurance on behalf of MORPC.

# PART 2 CONTRACTOR CONTRACTUAL REQUIREMENTS

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees as follows:

- 1. **Compliance with Regulations**. The contractor shall comply with the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the Department of Transportation (hereinafter "DOT"), Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations"), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- 2. **Nondiscrimination**. The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, national origin, gender or sex (including pregnancy, gender identification or expression, and sexual orientation), age (including federally protected 40 years or older), disability or other handicap, low-income status, limited English proficiency, religion, genetic information, gender identification, creed, military status (past, present, or future), medical conditions, or marital/familial status in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by Section 49 CFR 21.5 of the Regulations, including employment practices when the contract covers a program set forth in Appendix B to part 21 of the Regulations.
- 3. Solicitations for Subcontracts, including Procurements of Materials and Equipment. In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under this contract and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, national origin, gender or sex (including pregnancy, gender identification or expression, and sexual orientation), age (including federally protected 40 years or older), disability or other handicap, low-income status, limited English proficiency, religion, genetic information, gender identification, creed, military status (past, present, or future), medical conditions, or marital/familial status.
- 4. **Information and Reports**. The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations or directives issued pursuant thereto and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC), the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), or U.S. DOT to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations, orders, and instructions. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the contractor shall so certify to MORPC, ODOT or U.S. DOT, as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- 5. **Sanctions for Noncompliance**. In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, MORPC shall impose such contract sanctions as it, ODOT or the U.S. DOT may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - a. Withholding of payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies, and/or
  - b. Cancellation, termination, or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- 6. **Incorporation of Provisions**. The contractor and subcontractor(s) shall include the provisions of paragraphs 1 through 5 in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations or directives issued pursuant thereto. The contractor and subcontractor(s) shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as MORPC, ODOT

or U.S. DOT may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance. Provided, however, that in the event a contractor or subcontractor(s) becomes involved in, or is threatened

with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the contractor or subcontractor(s) may request MORPC or ODOT to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of MORPC or ODOT and, in addition, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

## **Executive Director's Report – William Murdock, MORPC Executive Director**

William Murdock congratulated those elected and re-elected to the Executive Committee and thanked those stepping off. Mr. Murdock and the MORPC Team appreciate the Executive Committee and what they do for the organization.

Mr. Murdock gave a recap of the State of the Region and thanked MORPC Team Members Níel Jurist and Amanda McEldowney for their lead. Almost 1,000 attended the event which included U.S. DOT Deputy Director Charles Small, a Drive Ohio panel, award winners, and results of the American Population Panel survey. A <u>recording of the event</u> is available on MORPC's YouTube channel. The date for next year's State of the Region is March 15, 2024.

MORPC is updating our communications strategy for post commission updates. The Member Newsletter now includes the information.

Mr. Murdock thanked those who attended the distracted driving event featuring Michelle May held just before the Commission meeting. Over 1,000 people were seriously injured or killed last year on our roads and distracted driving is part of that. MORPC is advocating for tightening the new distracted driving law and making certain the new law is known. We are planning a safety forum.

One thing we learned from the American Population Panel survey is that we need to work to educate the community about and find locations for electric vehicles (EVs). There is a major shift in the private sector to move to EVs. MORPC is working on this through a war room effort going after a major grant. We are also seeking outside help. Resolution 02-23 on the consent agenda gives us authority to get that help.

MORPC was part of two major passenger rail applications turned into the Federal Railroad Administration last Monday. The routes are the 3C+D (Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati, Dayton) and the Midwest Connect (Chicago to Pittsburgh through Columbus). We will find out in September if the applications are moving forward. Mr. Murdock thanked those who supplied letters of support.

The Regional Housing Coalition Advocacy & Partnerships Task Force kicked off last week. MORPC is leading the Task Force whose role is to take the Regional Housing Strategy and move it into action.

# <u>Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization</u> – Nick Gill, MORPC Interim Senior Director of Programming & Transportation Study Director

Nick Gill reported the seven Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) county subcommittees met over the last few months. The meetings focused on the 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

Both CORPO area projects submitted to the Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) were funded. The projects are preliminary engineering design for the US 23 and 762 interchange and the SR 13 right-of-way relocation to Mount Vernon.

MORPC, on behalf of CORPO, submitted a request for and received funding for a safety action plan from the Safe Streets for All program. The action plan makes all CORPO communities eligible for implementation funds in future rounds of the program.

The CORPO Transportation Plan is being updated. Team Members are gathering key data.

The next CORPO meeting is May 1 and includes three action items:

- Adopt 2024-2027 TIP
- Adopt annual Planning Work Program (PWP)
- Approve update to policies for CORPO dedicated funds

# <u>Regional Policy Roundtable</u> – Joseph Garrity, MORPC Senior Director of Government and Community Relations

Joe Garrity presented the <u>Regional Policy Roundtable Update</u>. Mr. Garrity thanked members for the letters of support provided for MORPC's advocacy efforts over the last few months. The RTPO funding nearly doubled in the State Transportation Budget. Mr. Garrity thanked Mayors Scheffler and Starr and Greg Lestini for their efforts. Distracted driving became a primary offense. MORPC is working with the bill sponsors for more clarity on enforcement. The law went into effect the first of April and will be enforced starting October 4. The next Regional Policy Roundtable meeting is May 16 with a presentation from Zach Woodruff and an update from Leader Alison Russo.

# <u>Sustainability Advisory Committee</u> – Ben Kessler (City of Bexley), Sustainability Advisory Committee Chair

Ben Kessler presented the <u>Sustainability Advisory Committee Report</u>. Congratulations to the City of Columbus for receiving the Gold SolSmart designation.

MORPC submitted a comment letter to the U.S. EPA regarding strengthening of the PM2.5 particulate matter standards.

Team Members are investigating the methodology of IQAir's report naming Columbus as the most polluted major city in the country. The region is meeting federal air quality standards and hasn't exceeded the PM2.5 standard over the last 12 years. Given the relatively low level of industry emissions and traffic congestion compared to other larger metros, the lack of large-scale wildfires which have severe impacts, and the likely inconsistency in data collection across the nation, it is unlikely that Columbus is the most polluted city in the United States.

MORPC is collaborating with members and partners to apply for funding from the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary grant and the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. The CFI grant supports publicly accessible EV charging stations and charging along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors focused on the highway system. The application deadline is May 30. Contact Brian Filiatraut if interested.

Phase 1 of the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Program focuses on planning grants. MORPC is co-leading with the City of Columbus and Ohio EPA, on a regional approach to conduct a regional greenhouse emissions inventory, develop goals and strategies, and position the region for Phase 2. Phase 2 is the implementation. You must be included in Phase 1 to apply for competitive grants in Phase 2.

The Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) is an opportunity for local governments to fund planning, energy audits, energy efficiency and more. Formula funding is available for eligible local governments (14 Central Ohio communities are eligible). The pre-award information sheet is due April 28. The full application is due January 31, 2024. Competitive funds are available for those not included in the formula funding (small-medium sized communities). Concept papers are due June 5 and full applications are due August 7.

SUBJECT: Proposed Resolution 05-23: "Authorizing the executive director to file

applications with, execute agreements with, and receive funds from the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Ohio Department of Transportation"

Annually, MORPC submits an application to the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) for planning funds to continue the metropolitan planning program, as currently defined by the Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act, also known as the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law." Some of these funds are allocated to MORPC on a "formula" basis, and others are allocated at the discretion of MORPC and other agencies. The appropriate portions of the grants and the local shares are included in the agency budget for 2023.

For State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2024, which begins on July 1, 2023, MORPC is requesting \$3,355,423 of new combined Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) planning funds, and \$419,428 of new ODOT matching funds. The MORPC local share for these grants is \$419,428. These are the "formula" funds supporting the base transportation planning.

Historically, MORPC has encouraged ridesharing and vanpools. In SFY 2024 MORPC will be using \$750,000 of MORPC Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) funds for the ridesharing program.

Other discretionary special projects include \$400,000 in MORPC STBG funds for Supplemental Planning that will include seven activities:

- 1. Project Expedition SFY 2024 Augment the efforts of the TIP project to ensure the timely completion of projects funded with MORPC-attributable funds.
- 2. Traffic Monitoring Augment traffic counts received from local governments by taking traffic counts, including bike and pedestrian counts, at other key locations to maintain the regional model and for other purposes. Also, enhance availability of data on the MORPC website.

- 3. Data Products and Services This includes soliciting services and data products that supplement Work Elements 60514-2000 and 60524-2000 (transportation data-related elements). It includes technical tools and services for promoting data sharing and availability and supporting the Regional Data Advisory Committee.
- 4. Assistance to Members Provides planning data, travel demand forecasting, and transportation analysis assistance to members upon request for studies conducted by or for local governments.
- 5. Interregional Connections support Resources for staff working on Interregional Connections.
- 6. Conduct resiliency research and planning to prepare the transportation system for a changing climate.
- 7. Coordinate with other regional activities such as the Regional Sustainability Agenda activities that further the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Goals.

As Central Ohio is designated a "maintenance" area for ozone and for fine particulate matter, MORPC will continue its planning and education efforts for air quality. \$575,000 of CMAQ funding will be used for Work Element 66734-1000 for FY 2024.

In FY 2015, a new special project work element was included to administer the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 funding for the Columbus urbanized area. MORPC as the designated recipient will receive an annual allocation from FTA for staff administration. From FY 2023, approximately \$149,079 remains and will be carried forward into FY 2024. The FY 2024 funds will be \$169,079 and are included in Work Element 67414-3000.

MORPC has utilized FTA Section 5310 funding to provide Mobility Manager support throughout Central Ohio. This was continued in FY 2023. From FY 2023 approximately \$115,000 remains and will be carried forward into FY 2024. The FY 2024 funds will be \$150,000 and are included in Work Element 67424-3000.

In FY 2018 MORPC assumed management of the Paving the Way program which had previously been managed by the City of Columbus through an allocation of MORPC STBG funds. MORPC will continue the Paving the Way program through Work Element 66544-0400 in FY 2024 using \$50,000 of STBG funds.

MORPC will continue the Technical Assistance Program to assist local governments to implement the principles of insight2050 as out lined in strategies in the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan through Work Element 66574-1000 in FY 2024 using \$275,000 of STBG funds.

In the FY 2022 PWP, MORPC began a new work element, 66522-3000, to provide support to the LinkUS corridor planning initiative to assist LinkUS partners in the planning and project development

needed to implement high-capacity transit corridors. Approximately \$40,000 from FY 2023 remains and will be carried forward into FY 2024 in the same work element.

In the FY 2023 PWP, as a result of obtaining funding through ODOT's SPR program, MORPC began a new work element, 66513-1000, to plan and implement a cohesive wayfinding strategy for the region. Approximately \$165,000 from FY 2023 remains and will be carried forward into FY 2024 in the same work element.

In total, including other special projects that began in previous MORPC Planning Work Programs (PWPs) and that were addressed in previous resolutions, transportation-funded elements of MORPC have remaining funds totaling approximately \$8,012,437. A portion may be carried over into SFY 2025. The use of these funds is outlined in the SFY 2024 MORPC PWP that reflects comments from ODOT and FHWA. Attached to Resolution 05-23 is a summary of the SFY 2024 MORPC PWP expected to be approved by the Transportation Policy Committee under Resolution T-6-23.

The Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) has been created as a Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) and is staffed by MORPC. ODOT federal and state funds totaling \$200,936 are being requested to continue the CORPO (plus \$22,326 of new local matching funds). Additionally, MORPC received a discretionary Safe Routes for All planning award of \$200,000 from FHWA and is matching it with \$50,000 to develop a CORPO area Safety Action Plan. A PWP for CORPO has also been developed with the work elements included as an attachment to Resolution 05-23.

Resolution 05-23 authorizes the executive director to submit and execute any required grant applications and related agreements, including the biennial agreements with ODOT for the MORPC and CORPO transportation planning areas. The resolution also ensures MORPC's compliance with the civil rights statutes required for receipt of federal funds.

#### **RESOLUTION 05-23**

"Authorizing the executive director to file applications with, execute agreements with, and receive funds from the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Ohio Department of Transportation"

WHEREAS, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Transportation (U.S. DOT) is authorized to make grants for transportation planning funds consistent with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), also known as the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law"; and

WHEREAS, these funds are administered in Ohio by the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT); and

WHEREAS, the contracts for financial assistance will impose certain obligations upon the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC), including the provision of the local share of project costs; and

WHEREAS, the transportation planning process is also required to be in compliance with the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 (CAAA); and

WHEREAS, it is required by the U.S. DOT, that in connection with filing applications for assistance, MORPC gives an assurance that it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the U.S. DOT requirements thereunder; and

WHEREAS, MORPC has established procedures for the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program, and it is the goal of MORPC, within the requirements of U.S. DOT and ODOT, that DBEs be utilized to the maximum extent feasible when procuring equipment, supplies, and services; and

WHEREAS, to do some of the projects in the State Fiscal Year 2024 MORPC Planning Work Program (PWP) and the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) PWP, it will be necessary to secure matching funds from other agencies and to subcontract work or make purchases per the estimated amounts shown in the attachment; now therefore

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

- Section 1. That the executive director is authorized to file applications with and execute grant agreements on behalf of MORPC with U.S. DOT and ODOT, to aid in financing technical studies and other transportation-related activities.
- Section 2. That the executive director is authorized to enter into a continuing agreement with ODOT to implement 23 U.S.C. §134 and 49 U.S.C. §1607, as may be amended, in the Columbus metropolitan planning area, including designation of MORPC as the metropolitan planning organization responsible for conducting the continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive urban transportation planning process.

- Section 3. That the executive director is authorized to enter into a continuing agreement with ODOT to conduct transportation planning for the CORPO, including designation of MORPC as the Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) for conducting the continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process.
- Section 4. That the executive director is authorized to enter into ongoing agreements of cooperation with the counties, incorporated municipalities, and other entities and special districts within the areas for carrying forward the transportation planning process consistent with IIJA and CAAA.
- Section 5. That the executive director is authorized to execute and file with such application an assurance, or any other document required by the U.S. DOT, effectuating the purposes of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, including amendments.
- Section 6. That the executive director is authorized to furnish such additional information as U.S. DOT or ODOT may require in connection with the application for the PWP.
- Section 7. That the executive director is authorized to set forth and execute affirmative disadvantaged business policies in connection with the project's procurement needs.
- Section 8. That the following estimated funding be requested from ODOT:
  - a. \$3,355,423 of new combined FHWA PL and FTA Section 5303 funding (plus \$419,428 of new MORPC and ODOT matching funds each).
  - b. \$200,936 in ODOT federal and state funds to continue the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (plus \$22,326 of new local matching funds).
  - c. \$750,000 of MORPC CMAQ funds to support MORPC vanpool and rideshare matching program.
  - d. \$575,000 in MORPC CMAQ funds for air quality awareness program.
  - e. \$400,000 in MORPC STBG funds for seven activities.
  - g. \$275,000 in MORPC STBG funds for insight2050 Technical Assistance Program.
  - h. \$200,000 in FHWA Safe Streets for All funding (plus \$50,000 of new MORPC/local match) for CORPO Safety Action Plan.
  - i. \$169,079 in FTA Section 5310 funding for program administration.

- j. \$120,000 in FTA Section 5310 (plus \$30,000 of new MORPC match) funding for the Mobility Manager functions.
- Section 9. That previously approved projects and activities, with remaining budgets totaling approximately \$1,499,079 in various federal, ODOT, and local funds, be authorized to continue.
- Section 10. That the executive director is hereby authorized to enter into any agreements with these or other funding agencies and with any subcontractors or vendors necessary to undertake any of the activities identified in the State Fiscal Year 2024 PWPs for amounts that have been included in the approved budget of the agency.
- Section 11. That the executive director is authorized, if required, to approve one or more extensions of time for performance of services for any of the agreements described in this resolution and to receive funds or issue change orders not to exceed 25 percent of the original total of the agreement amounts without further authorization from this Commission.
- Section 12. That the executive director is authorized to take such other action and execute and deliver such other documents as, acting with the advice of legal counsel, he shall deem necessary and appropriate to carry out the intent of this resolution.
- Section 13. That this Commission finds and determines that all formal deliberations and actions of this Commission concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were taken in open meetings of this Commission.
